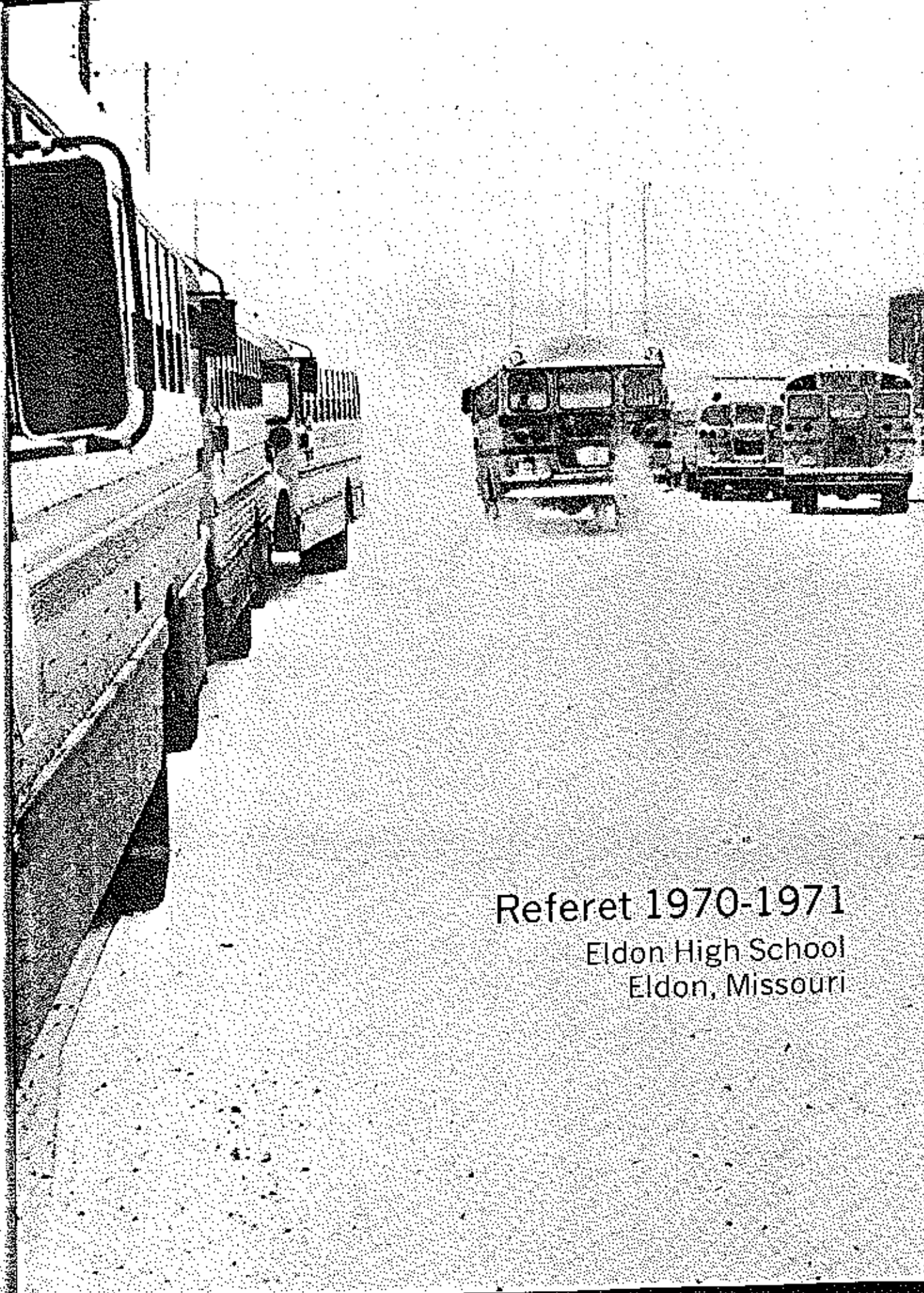

In her extra time she enjoys sewing, cooking, and flower gardening.

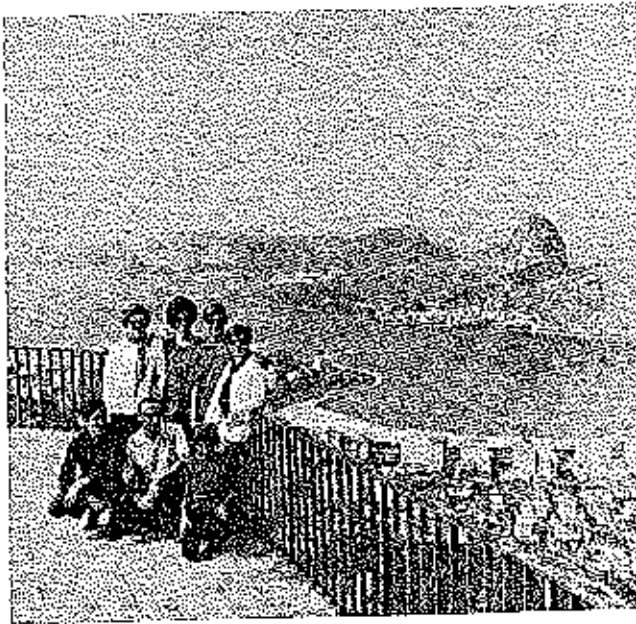
After retirement Mrs. Vernon has tentative plans to travel extensively.

In appreciation for her 25 years of devoted service to E.H.S. and its students we gratefully dedicate this 1971 yearbook.

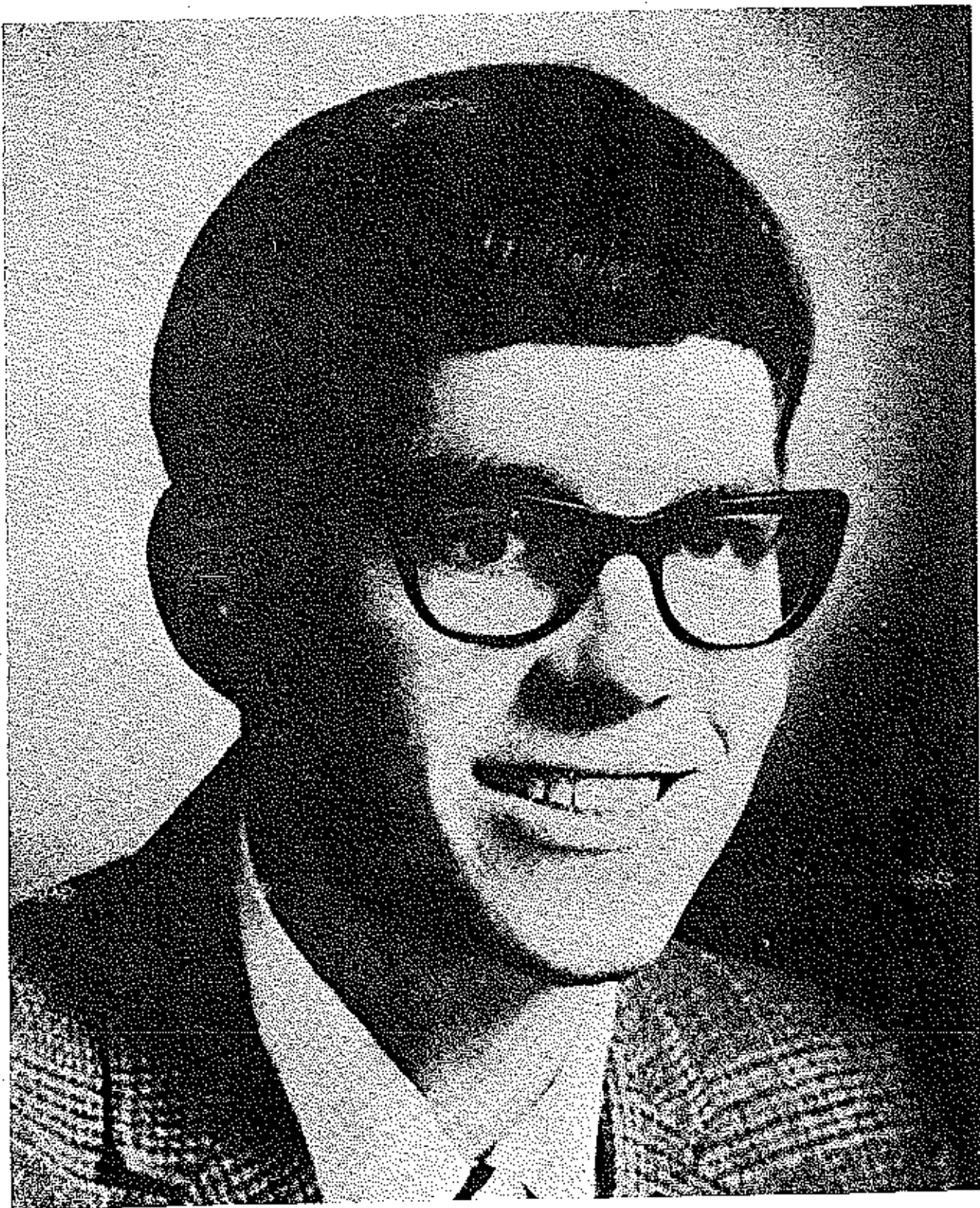
## "Adios, Cecilia!"

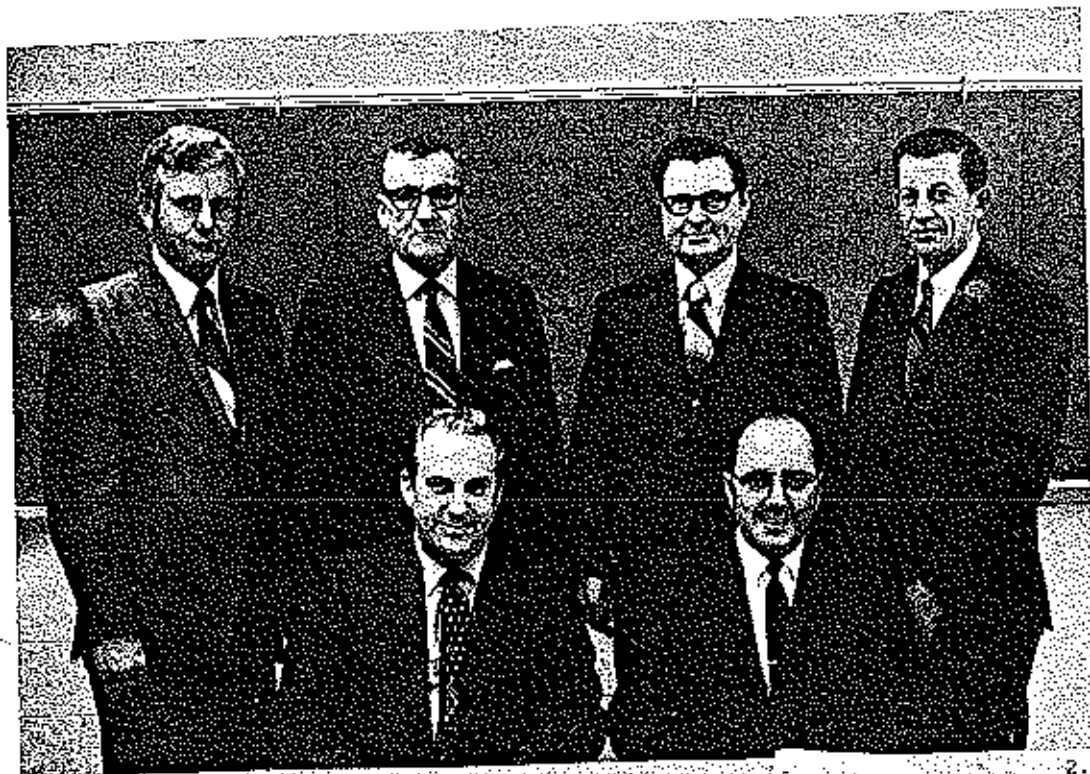
## Board of Education and Administration Provide Equal

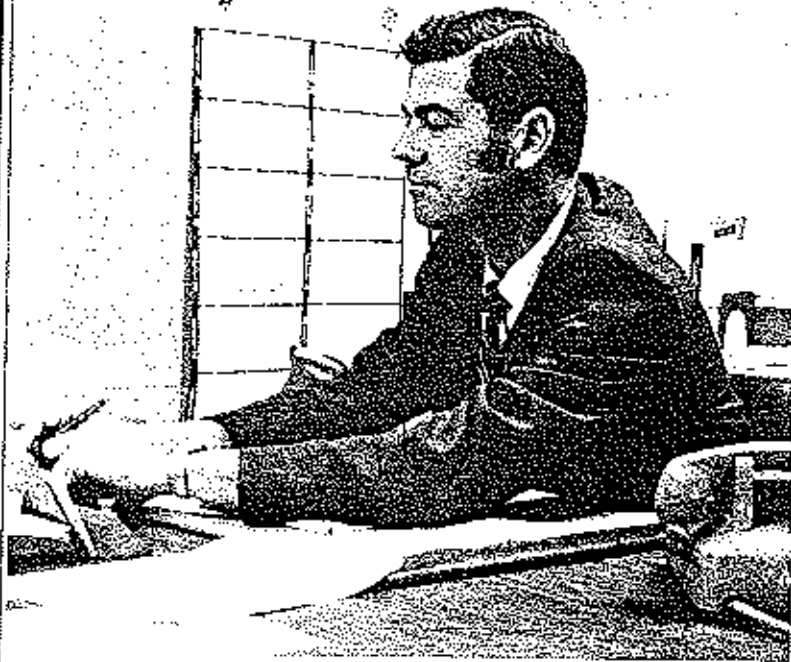

Mr. John Murphy outlines the purposes of Vocational Education: "Vocational Education is the bridge between man and his work. It looks at a man as part of society and as an individual. The objectives of this type of education are to provide an individual with necessary skills to enter his chosen vocation."

Eldon High School provides highly qualified counselors to assist the students in school centered problems or work. The parents may also talk with the counselors about student problems. The counselors give students a chance for self-appraisal by showing them their achievements, in school testing, class rank, and general information about college admissions.

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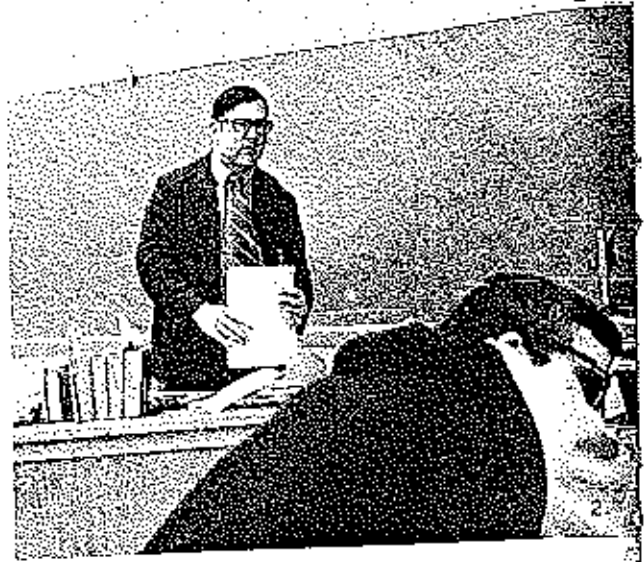

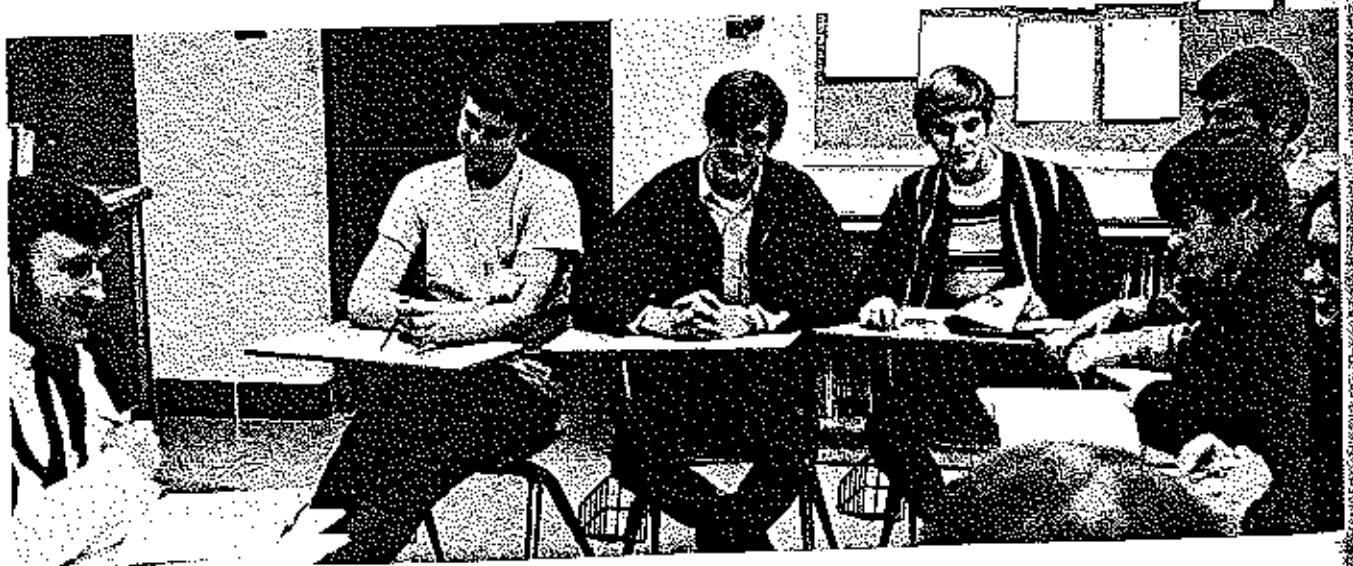
## Social Studies Help Meet Complex World.

The present curricular offerings of the Social Studies Department include American History, World History, Citizenship, Psychology, Sociology, Geography, and Contemporary Issues. The course content of these offerings ranges from a study of man and his environment, to the history of mankind in a world setting, as well as in our contemporary America. The basic purposes of the Social Studies are to give the individual an understanding of himself, and how he relates to the totality of his environment--social, political, economic, moral, and religious. In addition also to this idea of development of a total picture of the individual's relationship to his world, certain basic factors are stressed--such as problem solving, critical thinking, the worth and dignity of the individual, perhaps even nationalism as it involves our nation.

## Language Arts Department Helps Students Communicate.

The Language Arts program works to increase students' ability to effectively communicate. Emphasis is on training students to think logically and in specific, well-supported terms. Skills are intended in simple oral and written communication to meet occupational, family, and community needs. Opportunities are provided for students to discover deeply satisfying experiences in the literature that will develop more mature insights into living in our modern society.

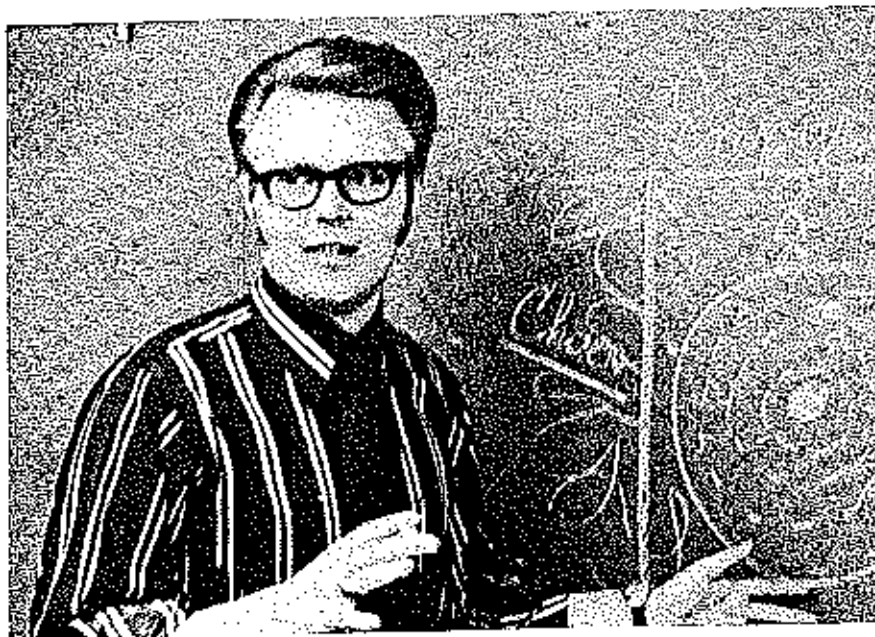
This year English I extensively studied formal grammar and covered some literature.

In English II students surveyed American literature reading *THE SCARLET LETTER* and *HUCKLEBERRY FINN*.

In English III students surveyed English literature from the Anglo Saxon Age through the 20th Century. They studied briefly the history and development of the English language.

English IV students surveyed some of the world's great literature. Three novels were studied *A SEPARATE PEACE*, *THE GREAT GATSBY*, and *CRIME AND PUNISHMENT*.

Other Language Arts Courses offered by the department include Speech, Literature Appreciation, Drama, Journalism, and Spanish.



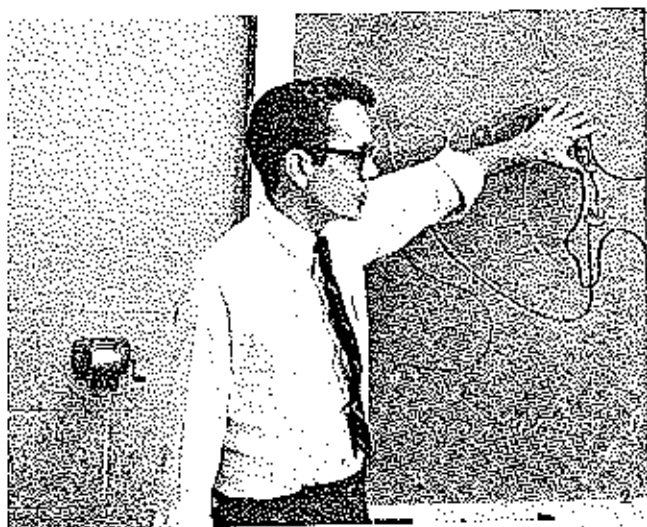

# Math and Science Departments Vary Programs To Meet Need of All E.H.S. Students



The Science Department consists of 4 basic classes, physical science, biology, chemistry, and physics. Its main purpose is to instill in its students the process of logical thinking and scientific experimentation. Physical Science is required of all freshmen and consists of a basic study of chemistry and physics. Biology, the study of life, involves the study of both plants and animals, with lab work and field trips. As a follow-up to this course Advanced Biology is offered. In physics, the students are taught the nature and use of hypotheses and are made aware of modern scientific concepts. The head of the science department sponsors a science club to help supplement in classroom instruction and experimentation.

The mathematics program is varied in purpose to meet the needs of all E.H.S. students. General Mathematics is designed to give the non-college bound student another year of basic math before going on to a course in more abstract mathematics. The Terminal Math course is planned for those students who want more than one course in mathematics, but whose life work does not require specialization in mathematics. Advanced math courses are also offered to bridge the gap between secondary and college mathematics for the students who plan to attend college. Special care is taken to represent materials which will adequately prepare the students for the modern college program in mathematics. Algebra I and II, as well as Geometry, and Trigonometry are offered.

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# Fine Arts Department Provides Creative Self-Expression.

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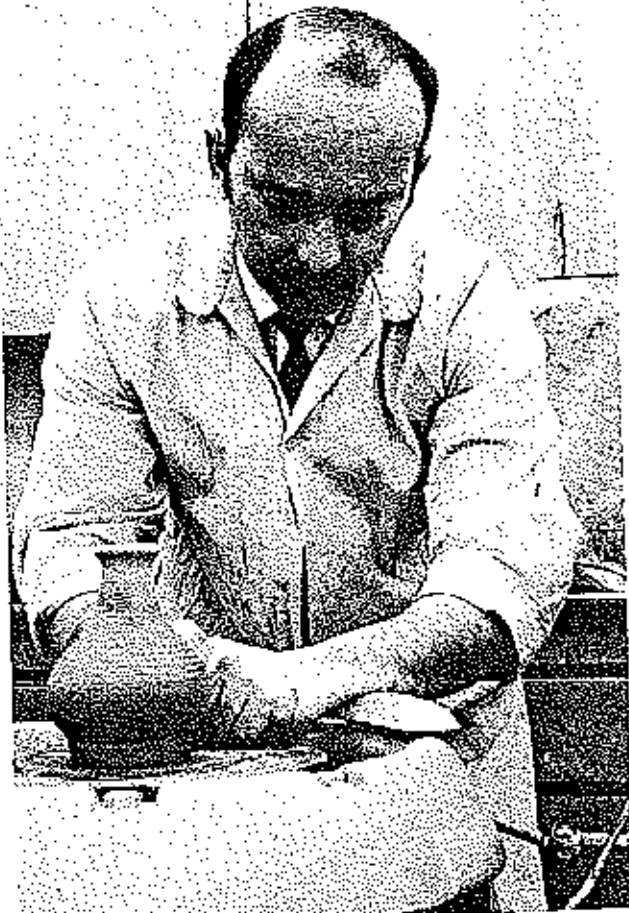
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The fine arts department provides many opportunities for students to discover to what degree they possess aesthetic abilities and awareness. For "... man must feel as well as think, he must create as well as discover or learn."

The fine arts department seeks to lead students into a familiarity with music and art of all periods and styles. It also encourages the development of skills in these two fields. As well as acquainting students with the vocational aspects of fine arts, the department tries to find meaning in them that will enhance understanding in other fields.

Art courses offered this year included Art I, II, and III, with instructions in oil, water color, clay sculptures, chalk, and pencil.

Music courses offered this year included glee with voice training in early morning rehearsals, Band, Fundamentals of music, and mixed chorus. Handel's Messiah, a joint effort of the music department and community singers was the years highlight.

Business Education offers students many opportunities for business skill training. Typing, General Business, Shorthand, Bookkeeping, and Clerical Practice and Secretarial Practice courses are designed to prepare students for business careers. As well as developing specific personal abilities and interests of business students, foundations are laid for advanced study. F.B.L.A., an on campus club, has been formed to supplement classroom activities.

C.O.F. is carried on through co-operation of the school and business establishment in our community. The student attends half a day of school and then reports to his "training station" to work. The program offers training in almost any field of industry.

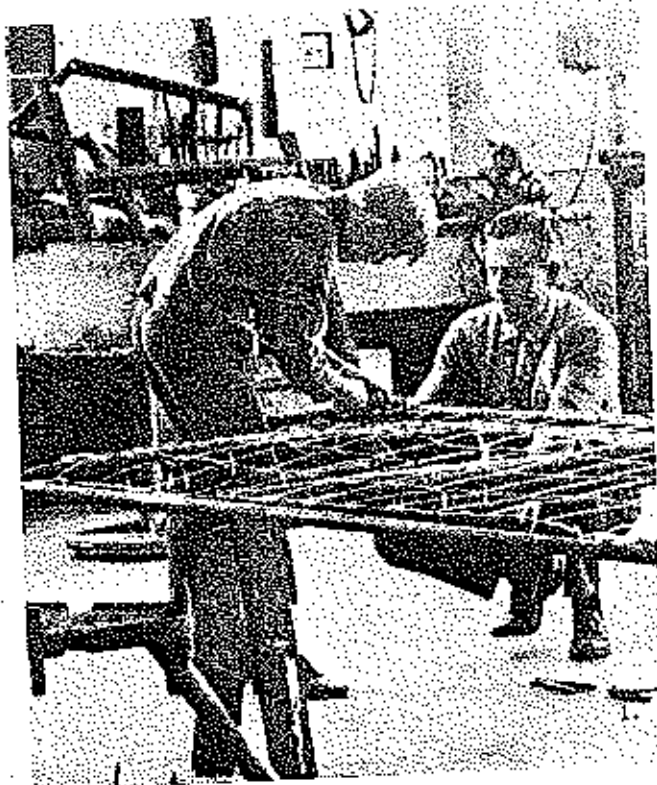

Two vocational programs are quite popular with students.

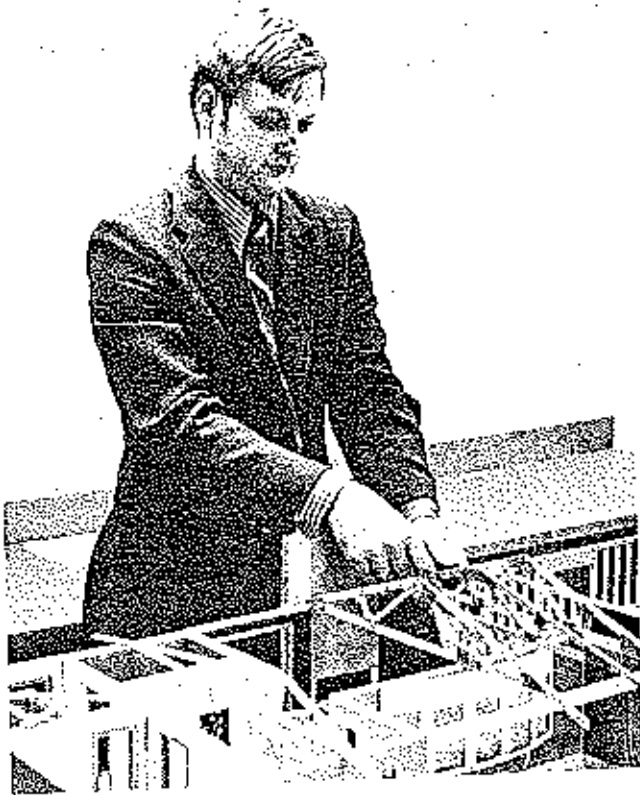
Vocational Agriculture is divided into several segments of study--Animal science, an introductory course with special emphasis on livestock industry; plant science and farm management, a study on farm operations.

The school of home economics is designed to help students develop skill, knowledge, and values necessary to become better members of their present parental families and in preparing to establish their own families in the future. The basic homemaking course must be completed before students may enroll in any of the other semester classes--child care, foods, home nursing, housing and interior design, clothing, family relationship, and consumer problems.

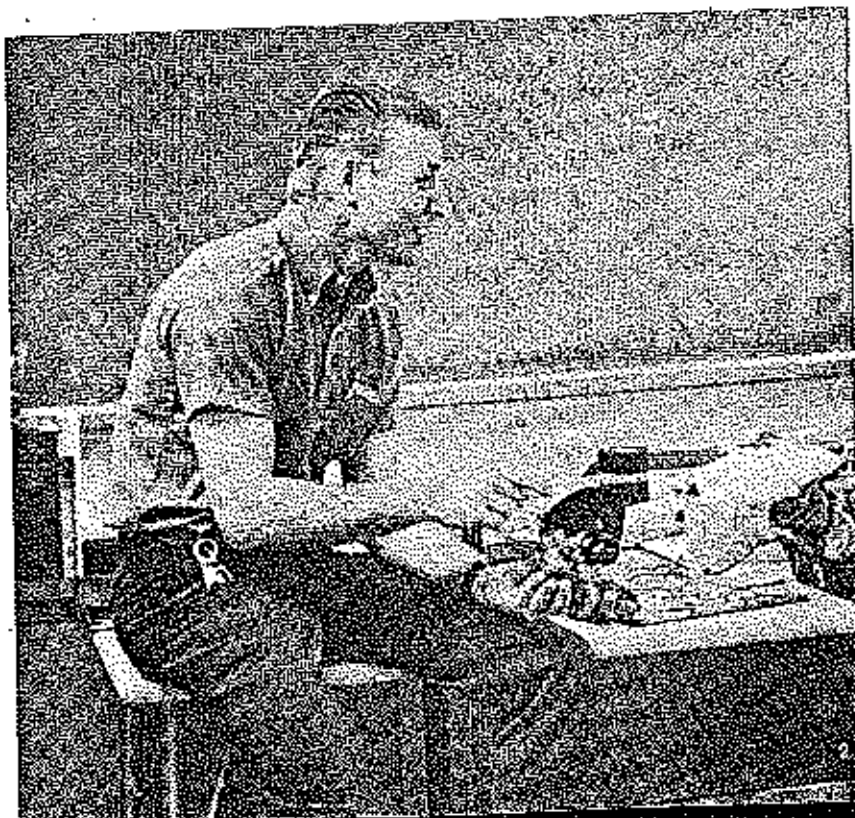
## Industrial Arts Offers Variety.

During the school year the Industrial Arts Department offers several courses: General Woodworking, Metalworking, Small Motors, General Drafting and Mechanical Drawing. General Woodworking provides the student an opportunity to study, learn and supply the basic elements of furniture construction and cabinetmaking. Metalworking is an exploratory one year course and provides the student laboratory experiences in sheet metal and machine shop. Small Motors covers the fundamental principles of operation of gasoline engines and outboard motors. General Drafting is a first year program which explores the fundamentals of projections, lettering, inking, and sheet and title layouts. Mechanical Drawing is a second year drafting course that covers true length, precision dimensioning, and basic elements of design drafting.

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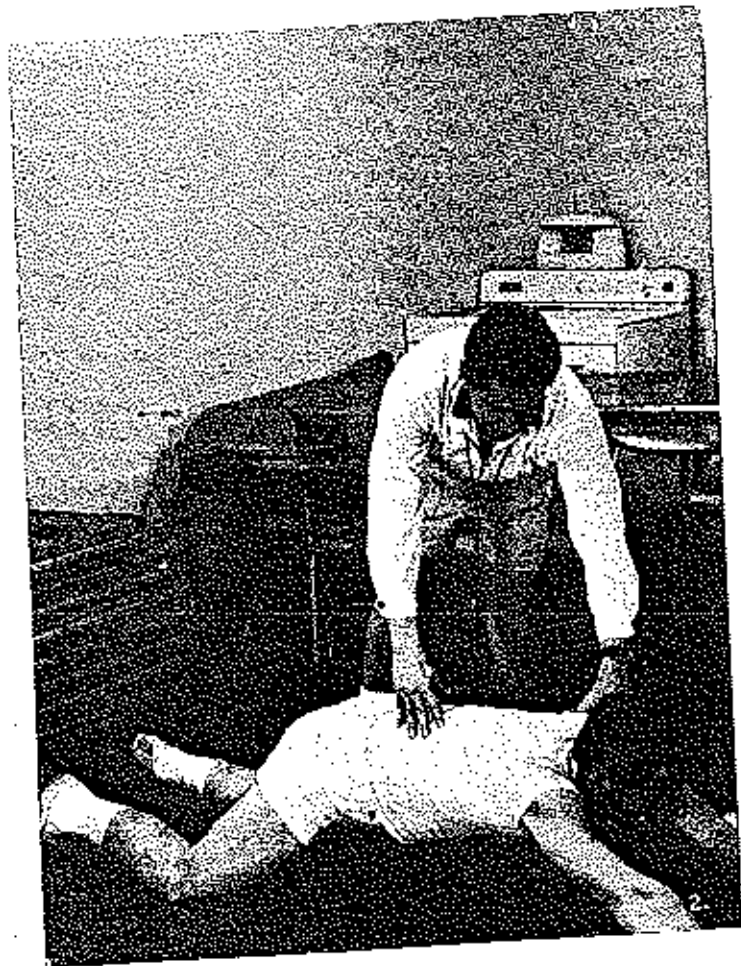


## PE Classes Sharpen Skills

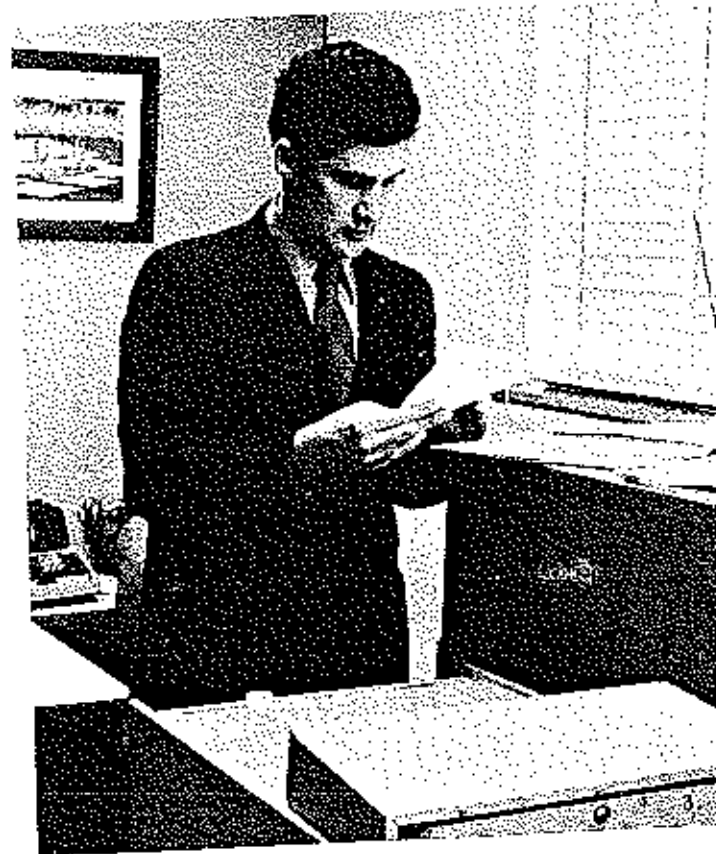


## Cooperative School-Work Programs Give Students Both Classroom and Job Training.

The purpose of the Cooperative School-Work Program is to ease the transition between school and the world of work by developing vocational potential, developing good work habits, and improving individual personality. The program is extended to on-the-job training, part-time, or full-time employment through vocational training while still in high school.

This program began in Mo. during the 1964-65 year and in Eldon in 1968 when Mrs. Atkinson became the school's first Vocational Adjustment Coordinator.

The students have a large classroom curriculum which includes English, Math, Social Studies, Science, Health, Fine Arts, Practical Arts, Typing, and Vocational Training.

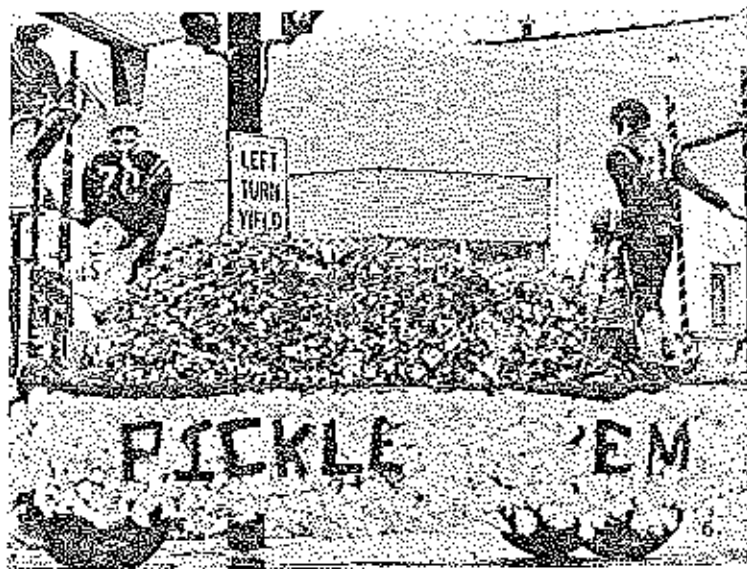
## "Wide, Wonderful World" Rained Out

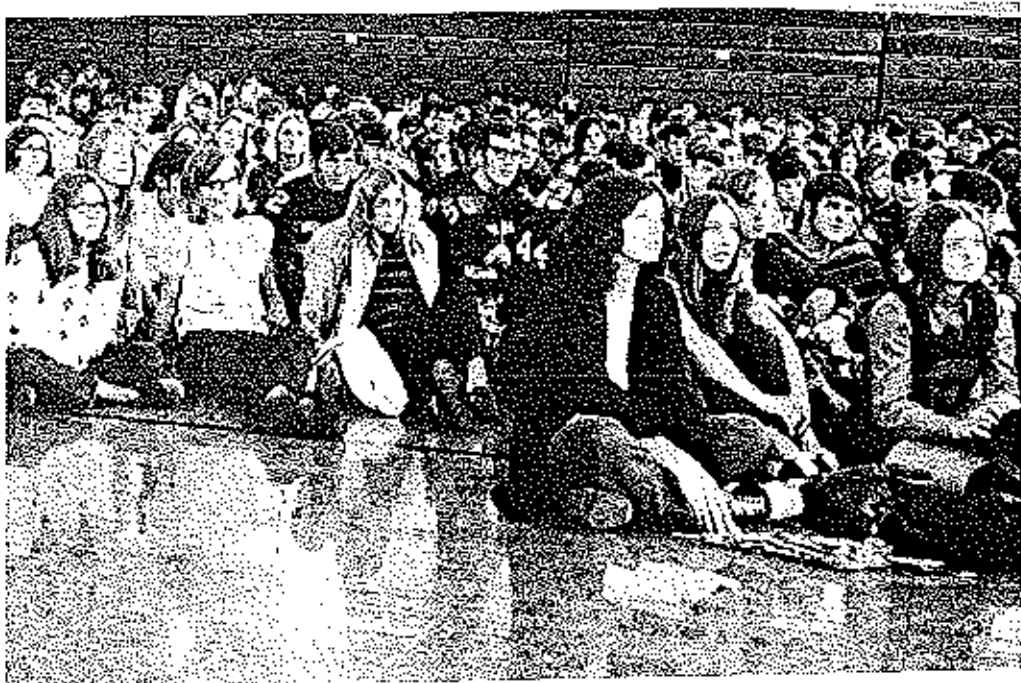

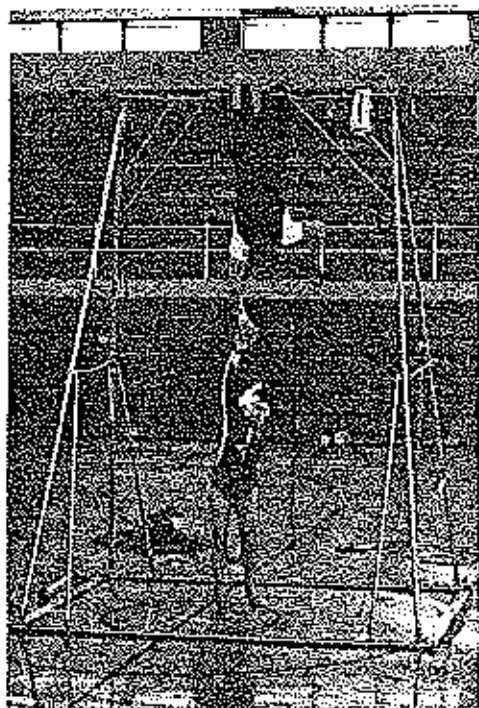

## Entertaining and Educational Assemblies Add Variety to Students' School Days.

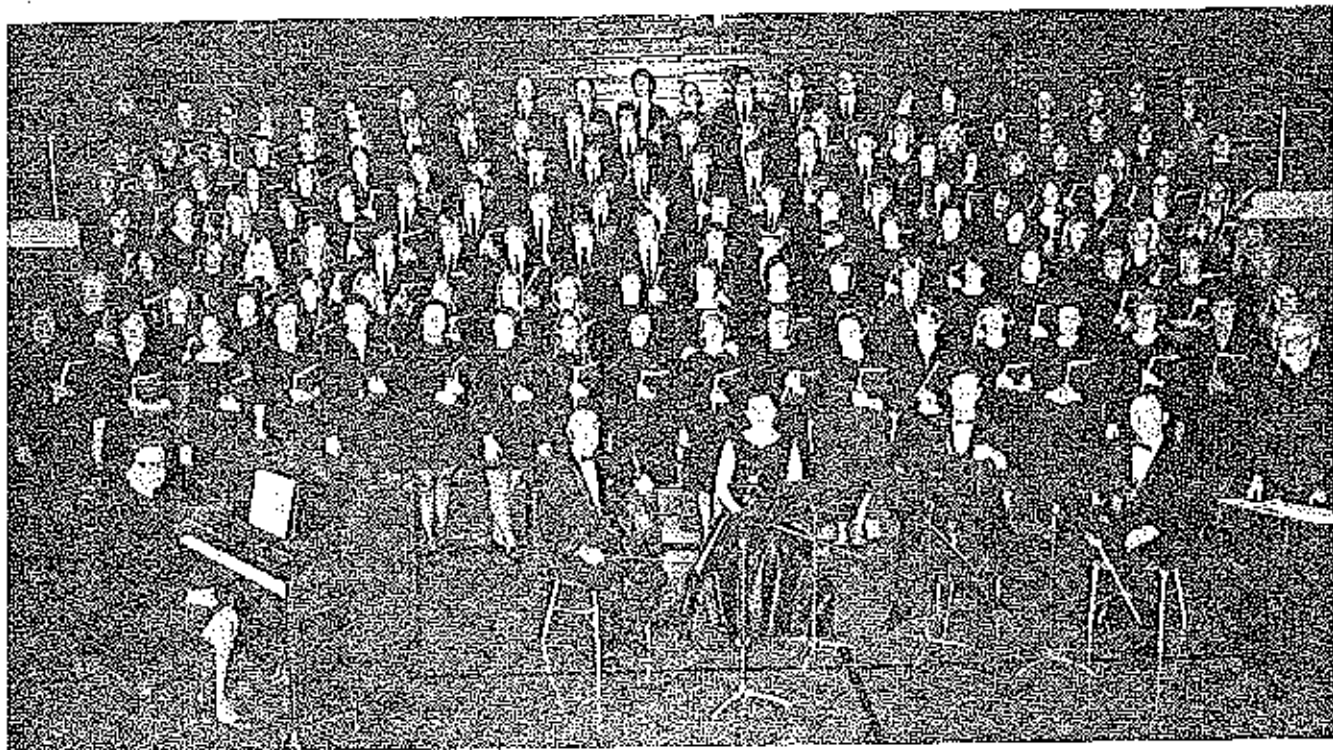
The keynote to the general assembly program this year was variety. Programs ranged from a presentation of Shakespeare to a professional demonstration of gymnastics.

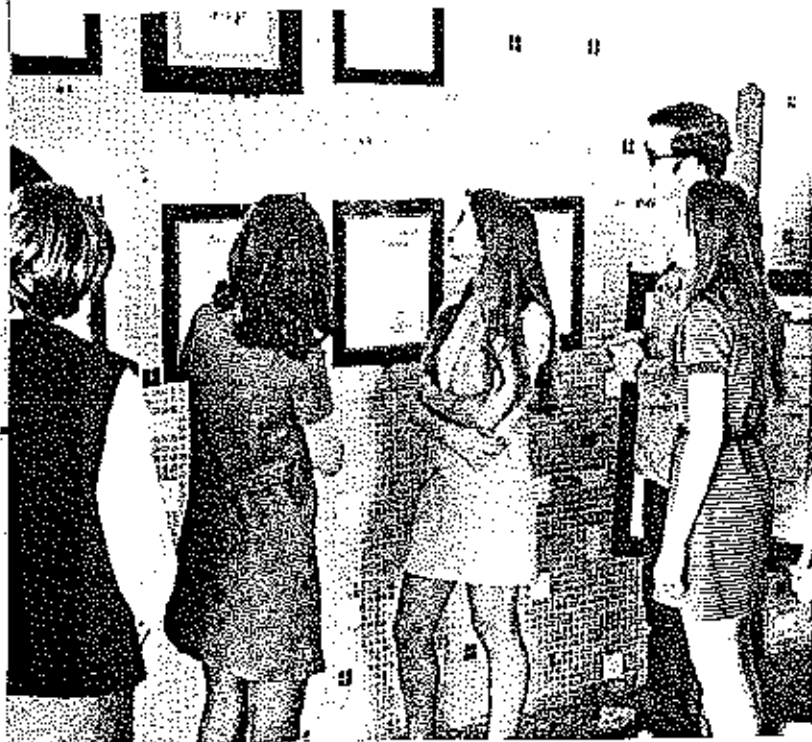

The "Messiah" was written by George Frideric Handel, and performed for the first time at a charity benefit in Dublin, Ireland. The "Messiah" is an oratorio or a story which is set to music. It includes solos, choruses, and orchestral accompaniment. The "Messiah" has a scriptural text but it is not always considered a religious work.

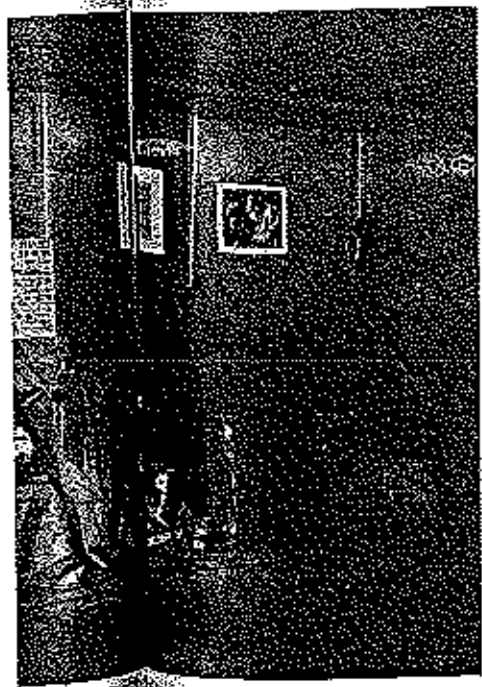
Some 200 years later the Eldon Community Chorus performed this great oratorio for the Eldon Community to usher in the Christmas season.

The chorus was under the direction of Miss Geraldine Haldiman. We were honored to have four out-of-town guest soloists. ## Act Play Dramatizes Murder Trial.

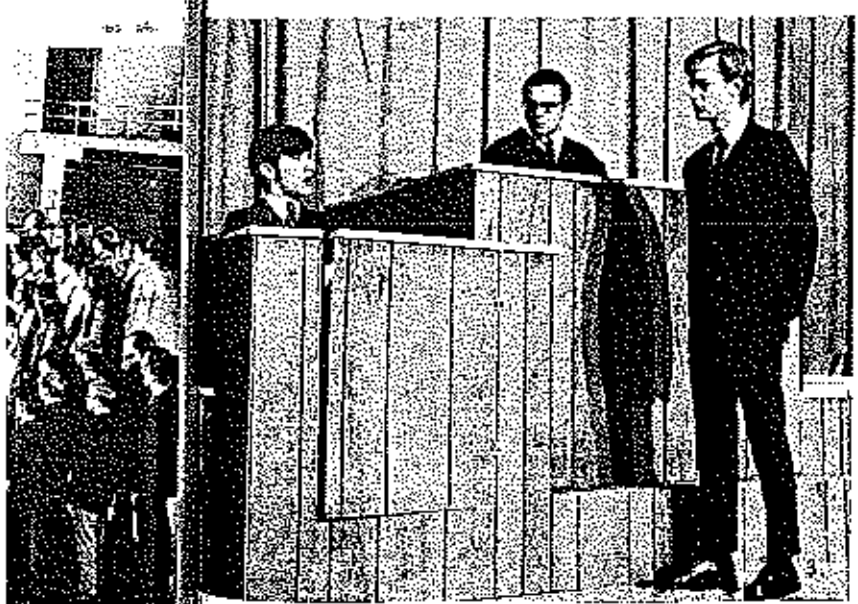

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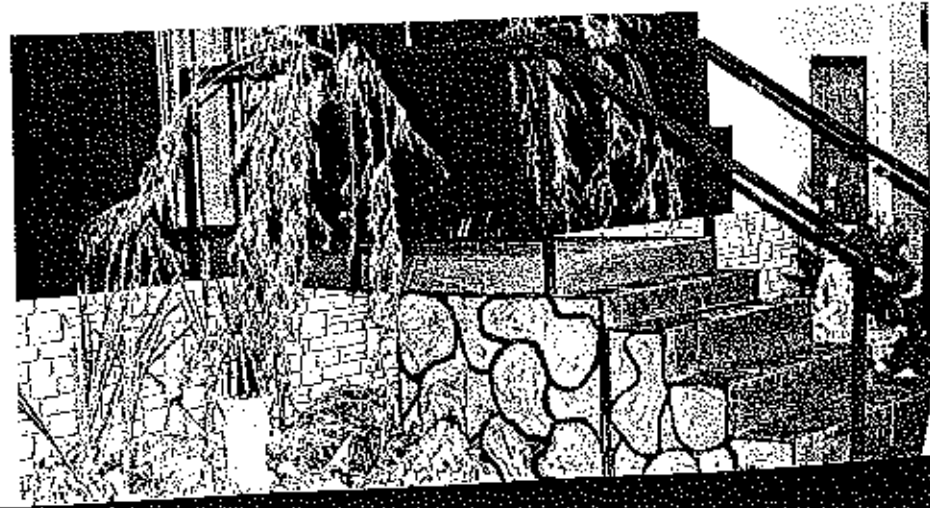
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## Boys' and Girls' State Representatives Chosen To Represent E.H.S.

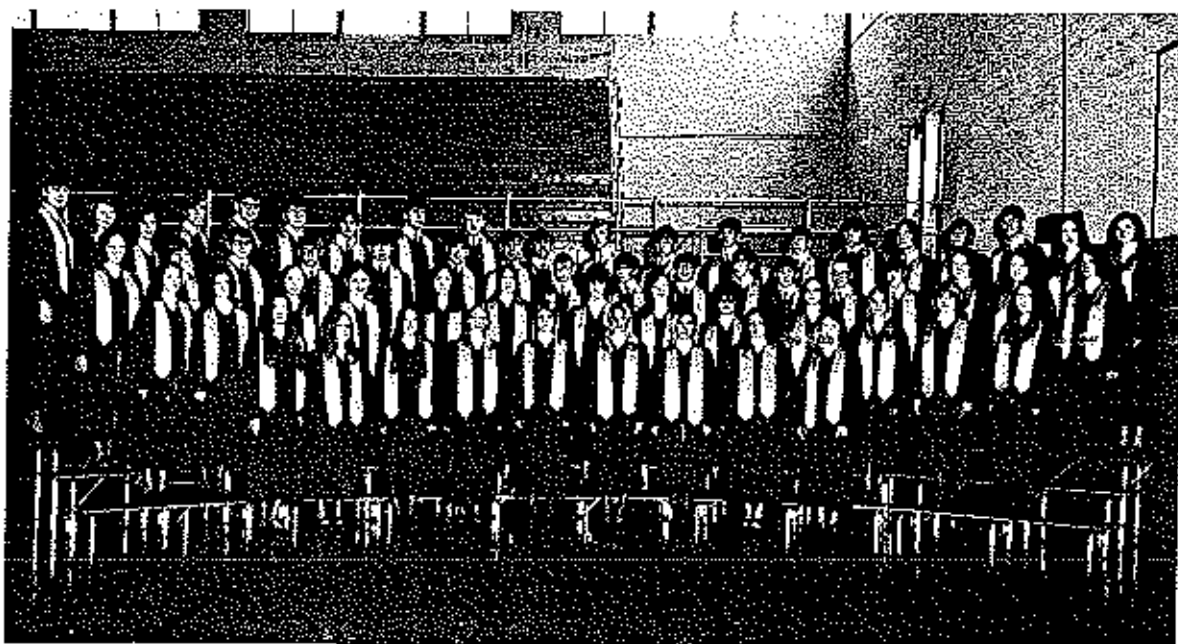


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# Music Department Sees Another Good Year

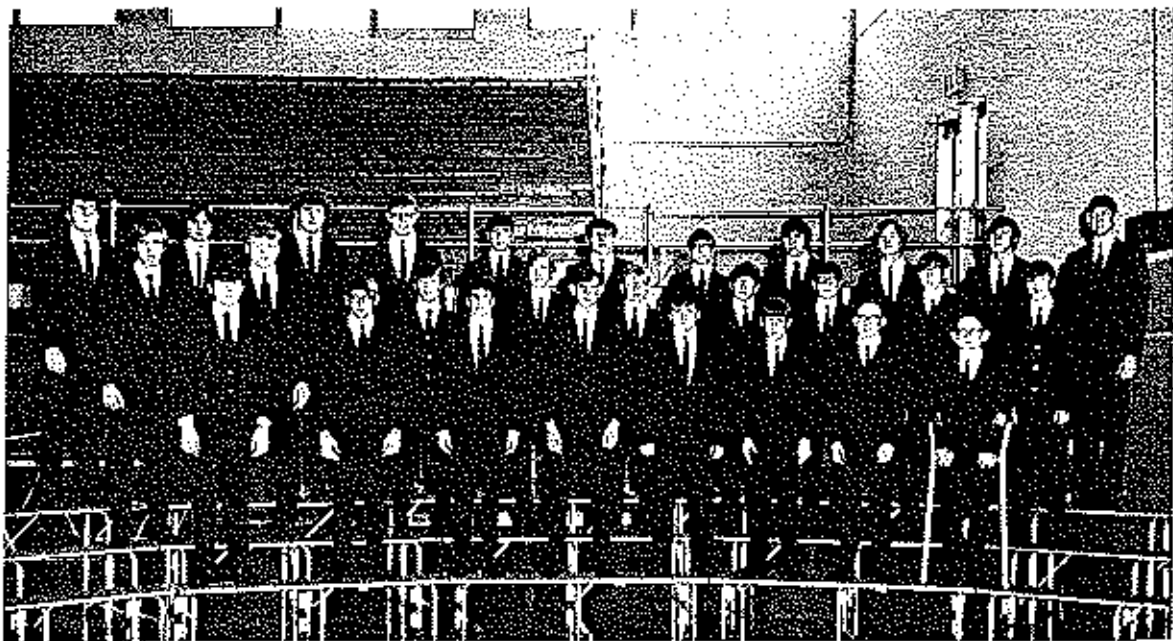

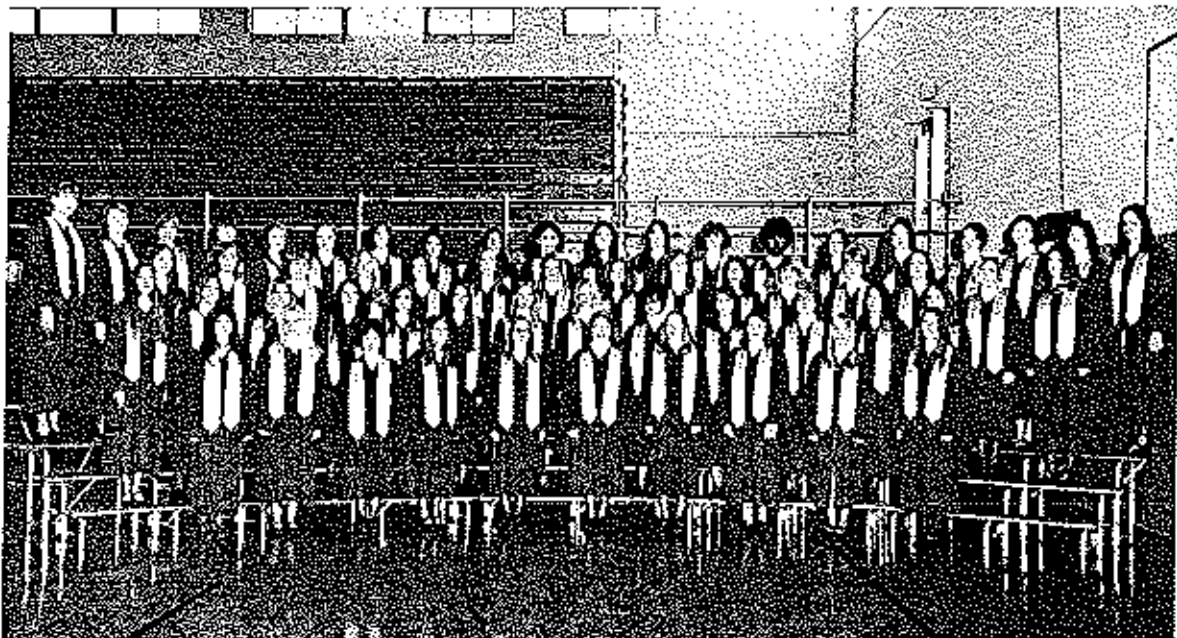

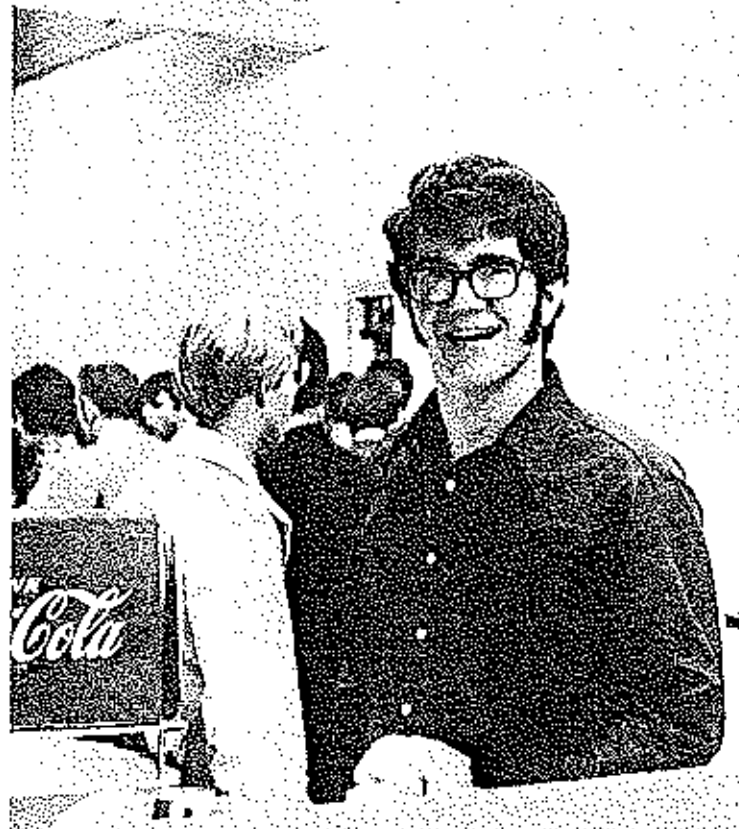
## COE Hosts Two State Conventions

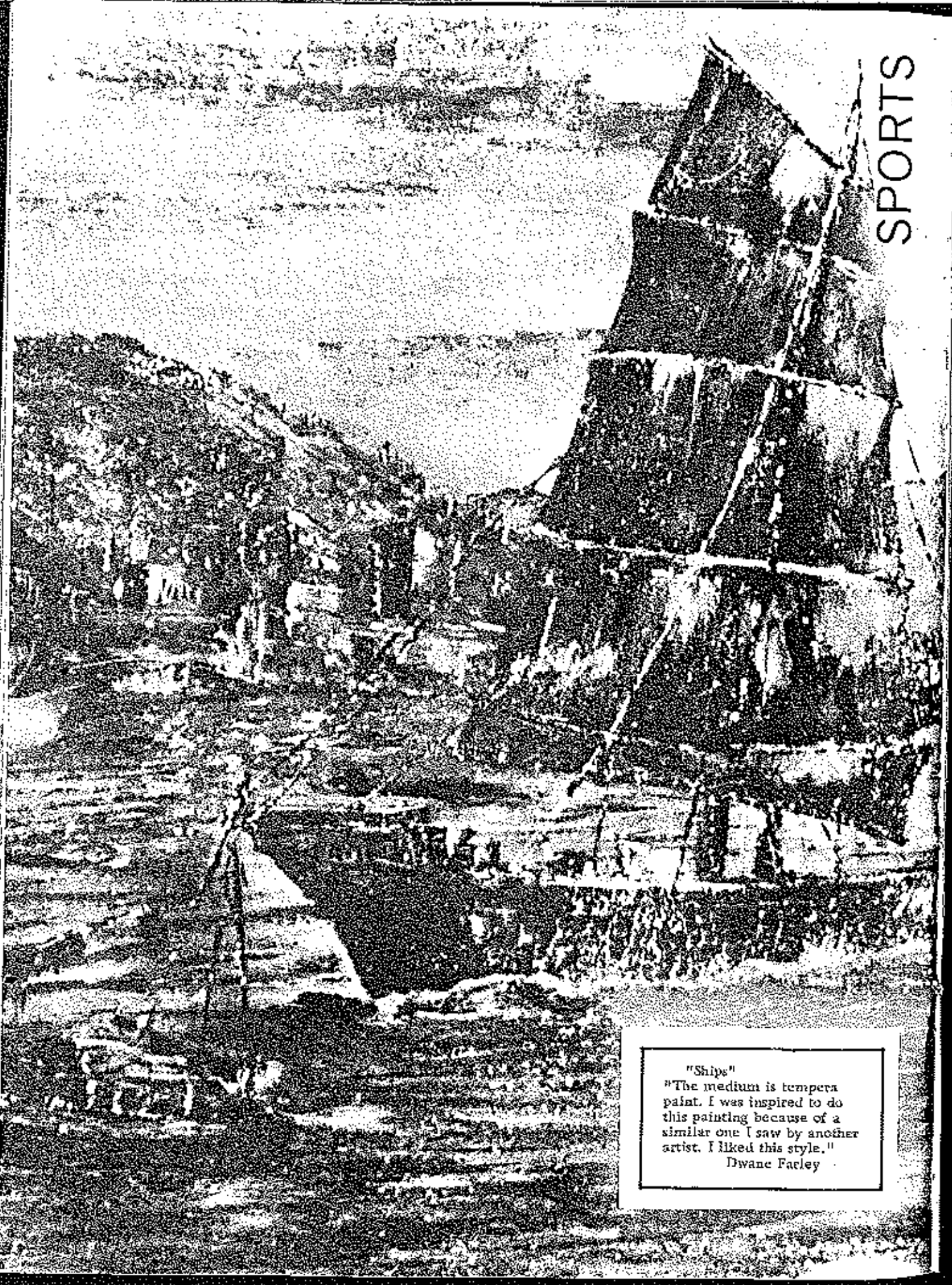

### Mustangs Finish Strong with 7 and 1 Record

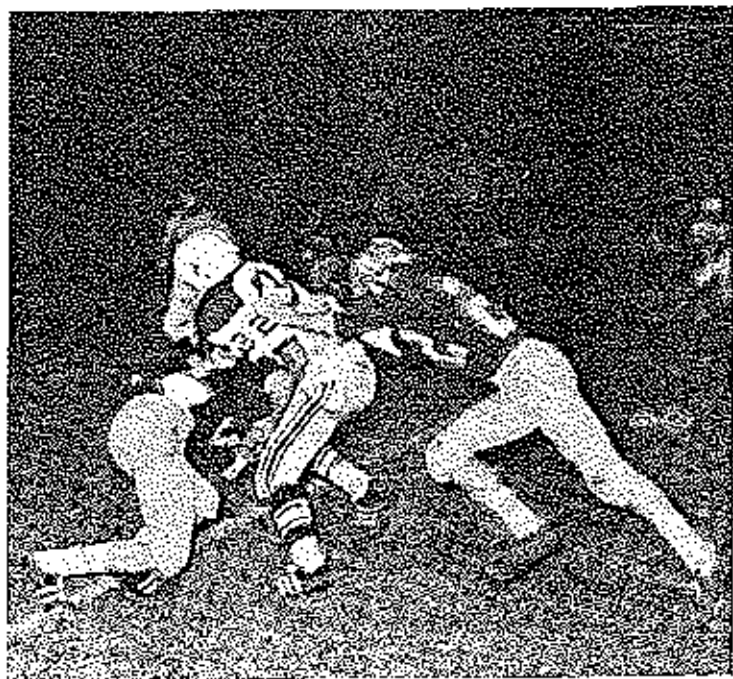
Despite the fact that the Mustang gridironers lost all but one of their offensive starters, the team amassed a strong record of wins, finishing the season with a 7--1 record.

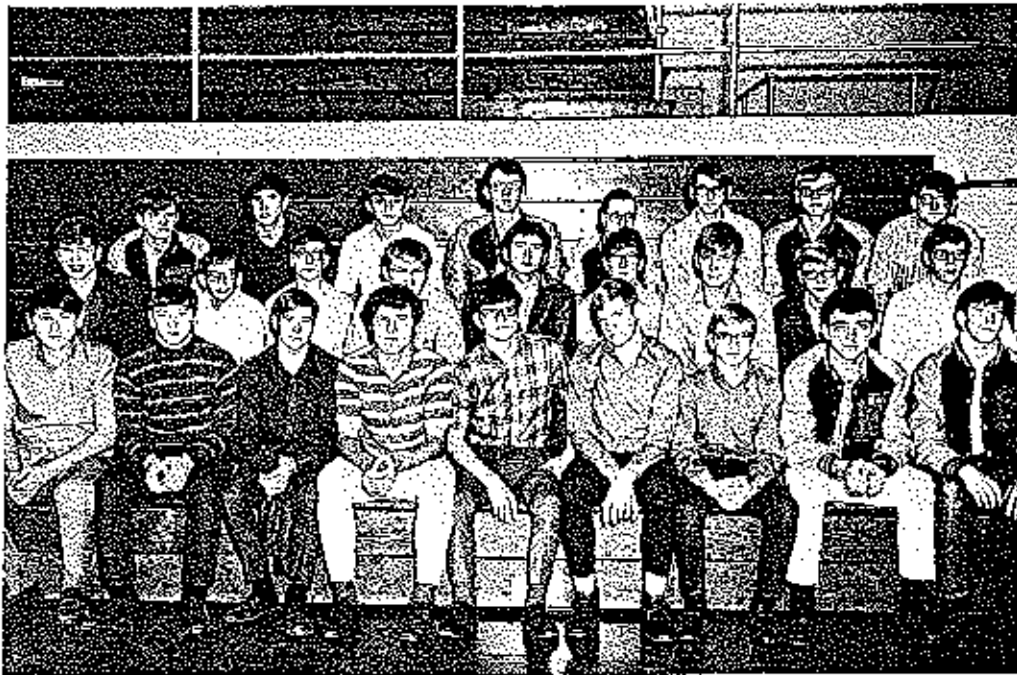
Mustangs Mike Ahart (52) and James Doolin (31) zero in for the kill.

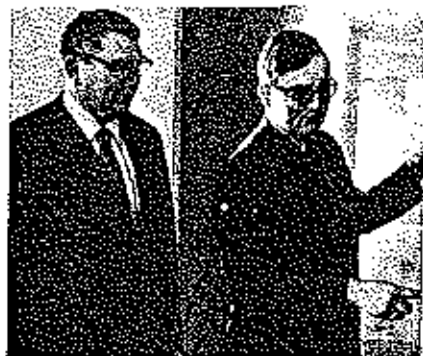
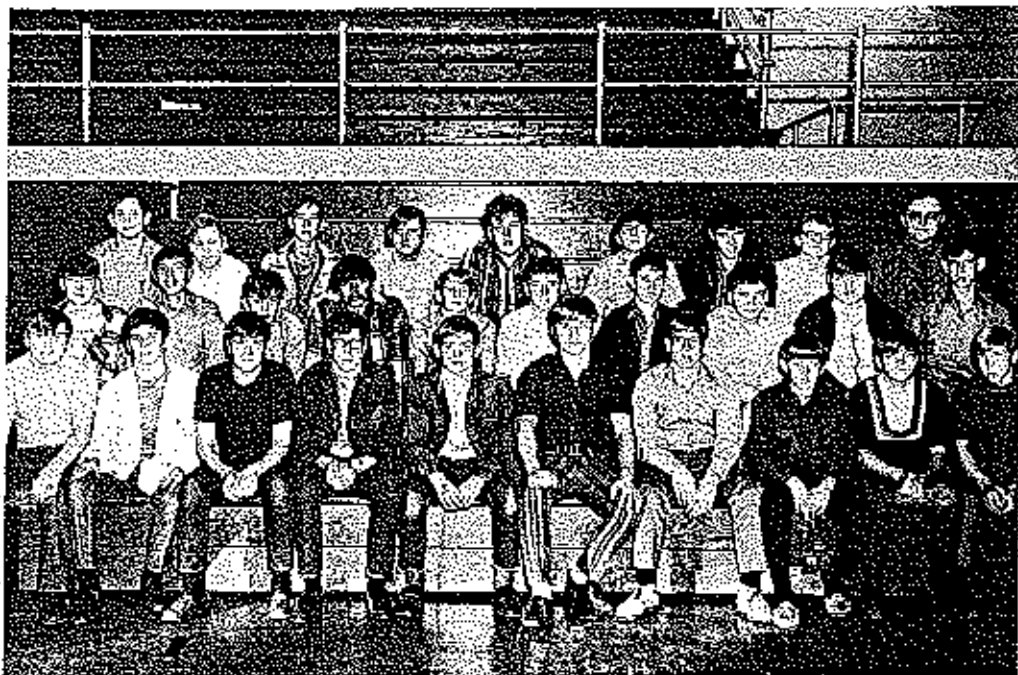

## Ability To Work Together and Ability To Hustle Bring Mustangs Winning Season.



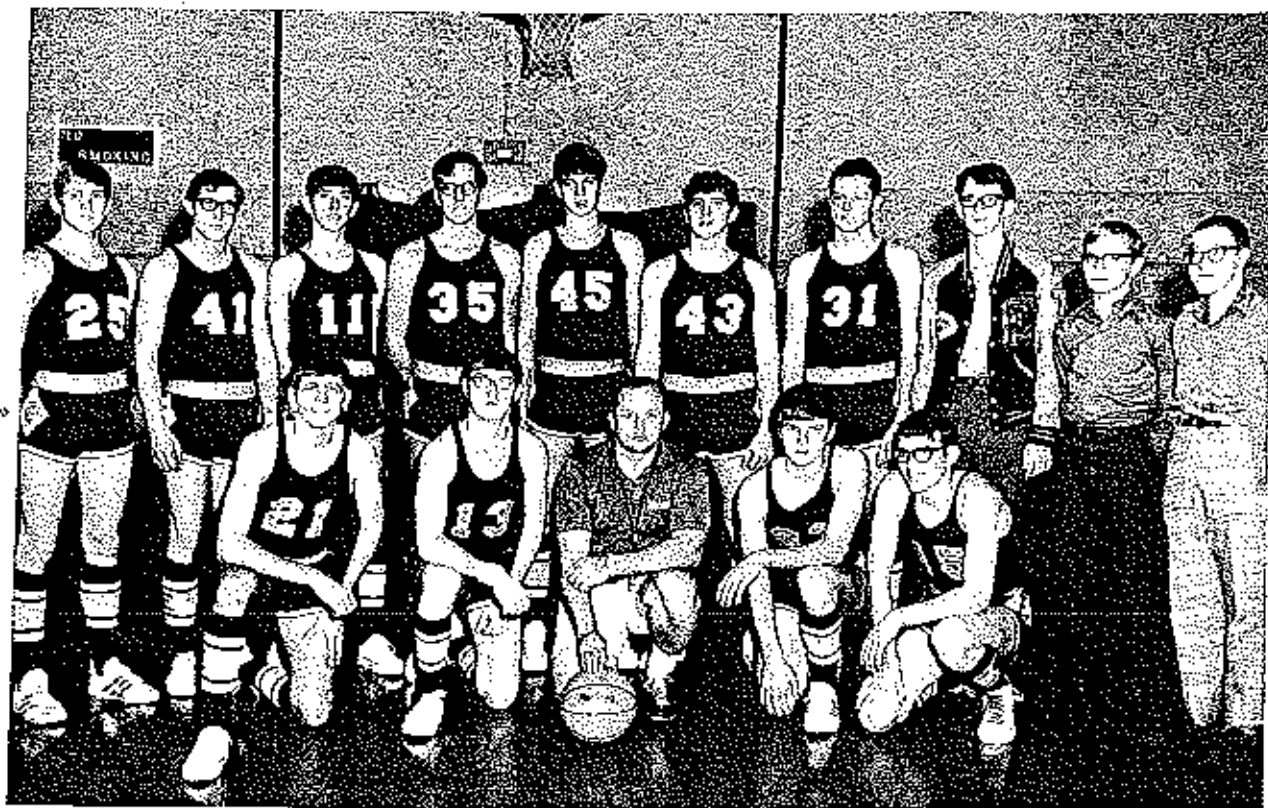
With only three returning lettermen, Larry Wry, David Jenkins, and Danny Wood, the Eldon Varsity basketball team is proud of a 15--9 record.

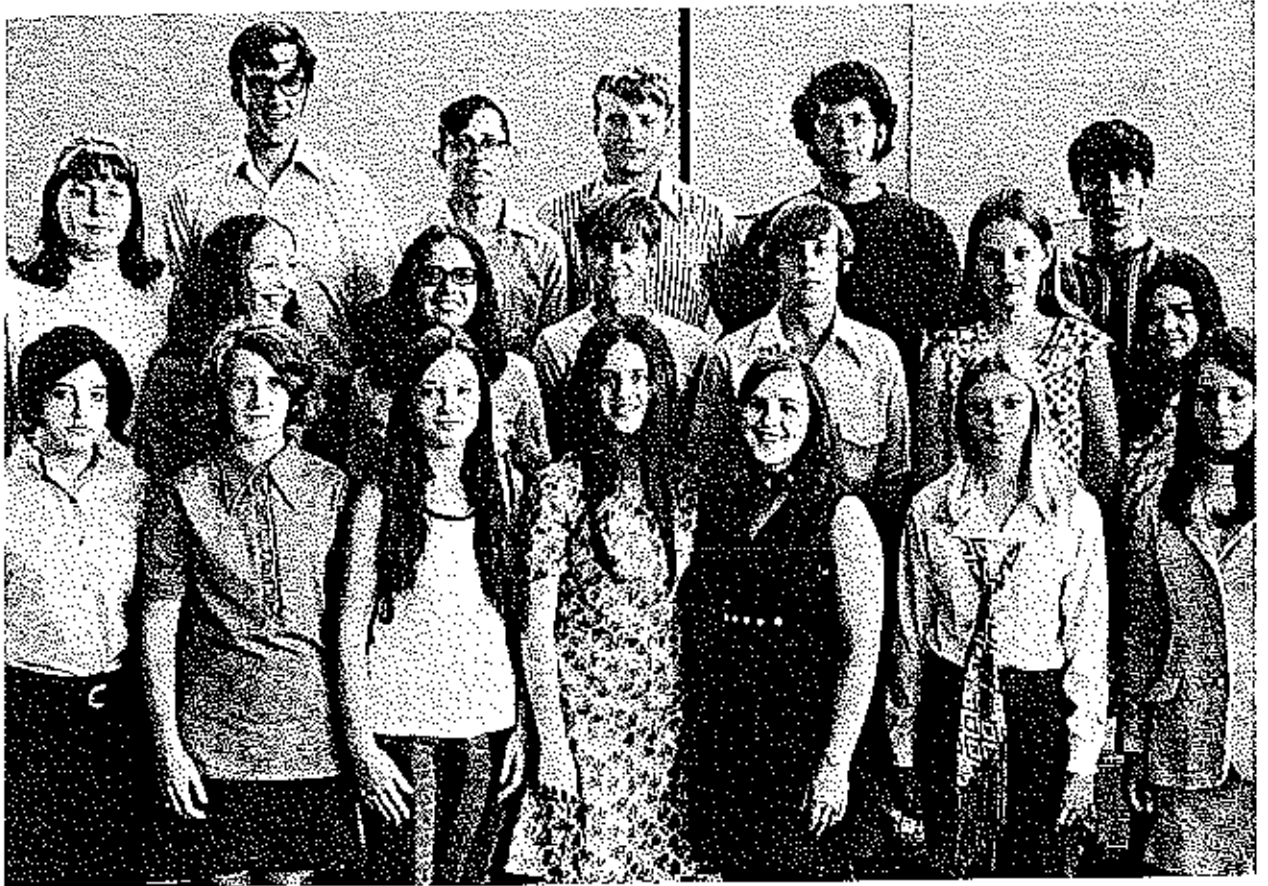
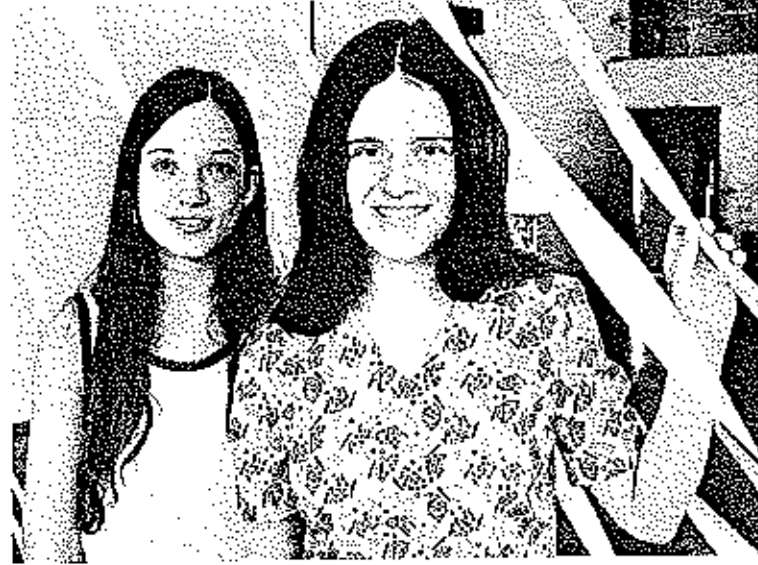
## Seniors Take Awards and Scholarships at Annual Assembly

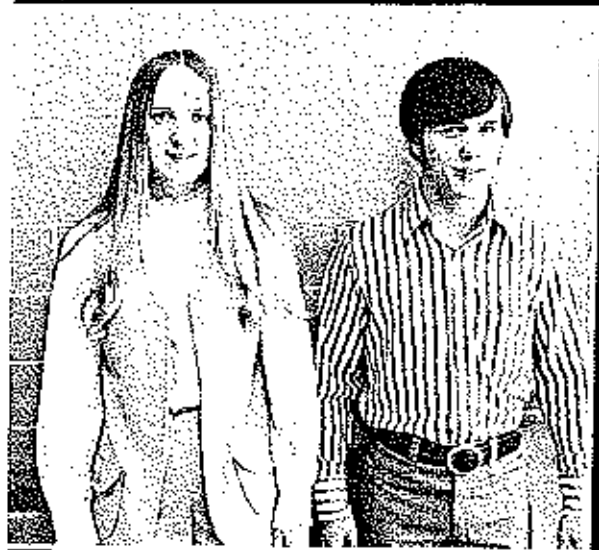

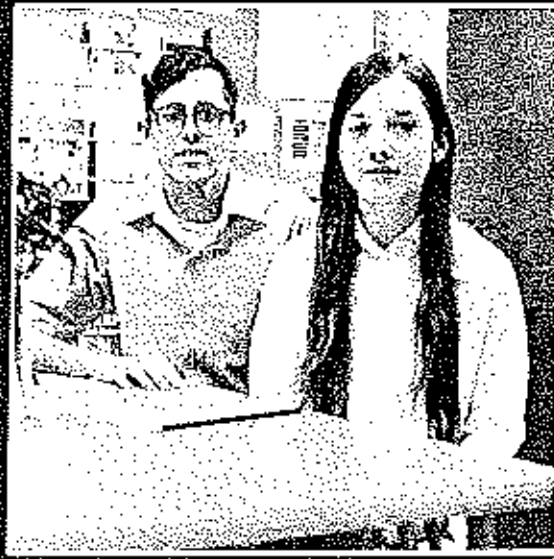
