A new Building Trades Center, which will introduce a new program into our school curriculum, is under construction. Also because of an increase in enrollment at the South Elementary School several classrooms are being built.

Another achievement of the Board is the initiation of a career education program which will provide High School graduates with a marketable skill or adequate preparation for college.

new "mini conferences" instituted by counselors; vo. ed. bridges gap.

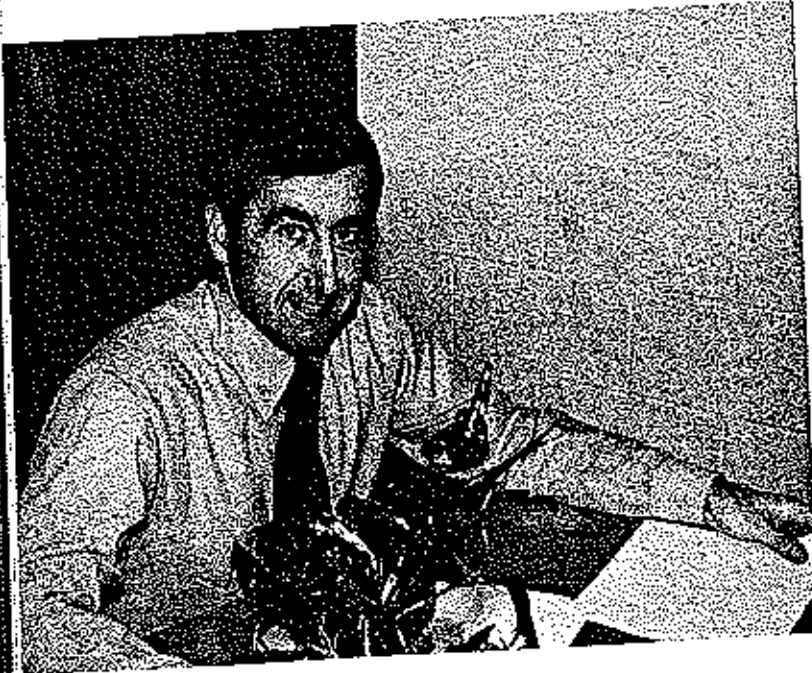

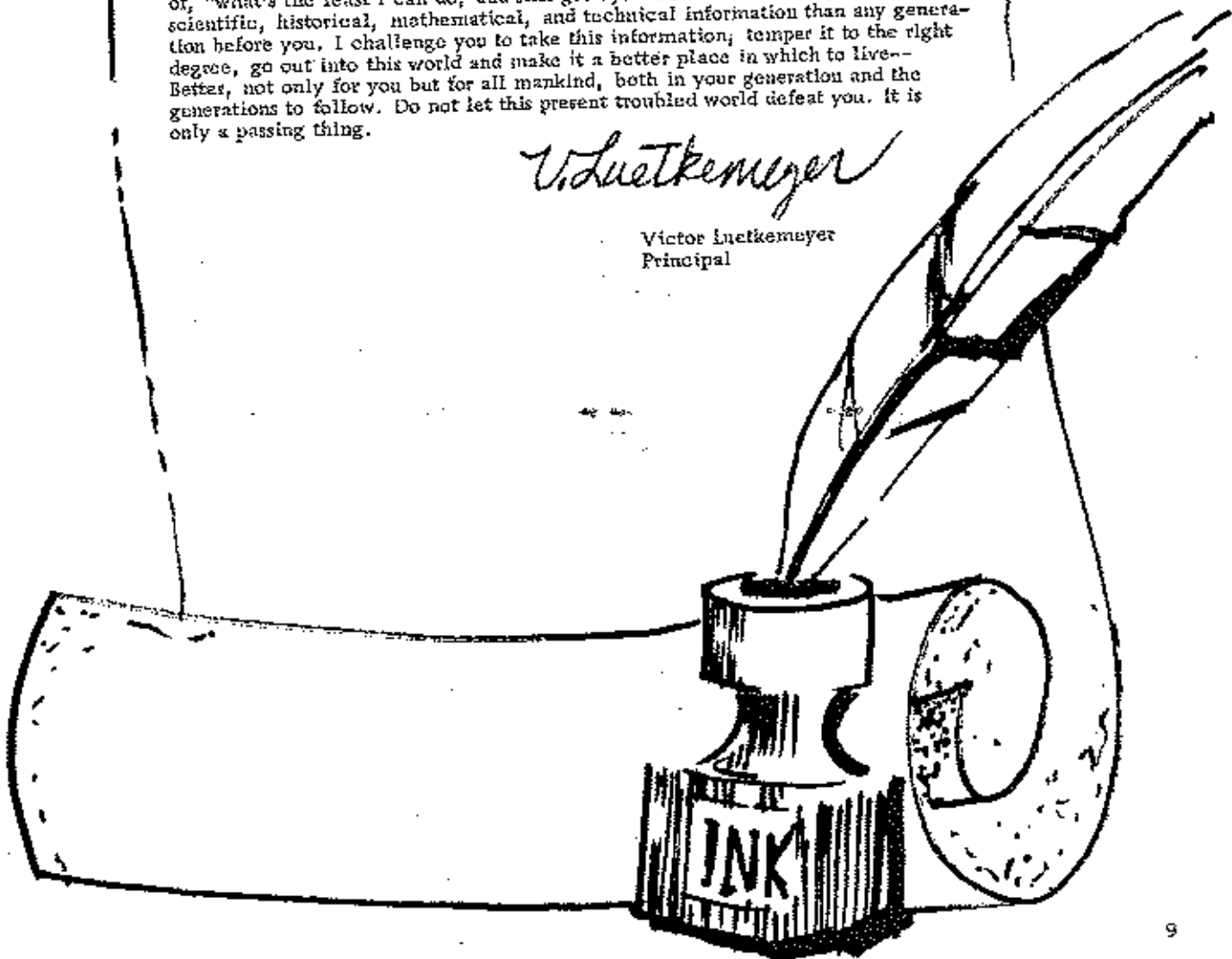
I would like to take this opportunity to challenge the student body of Eldon High School.

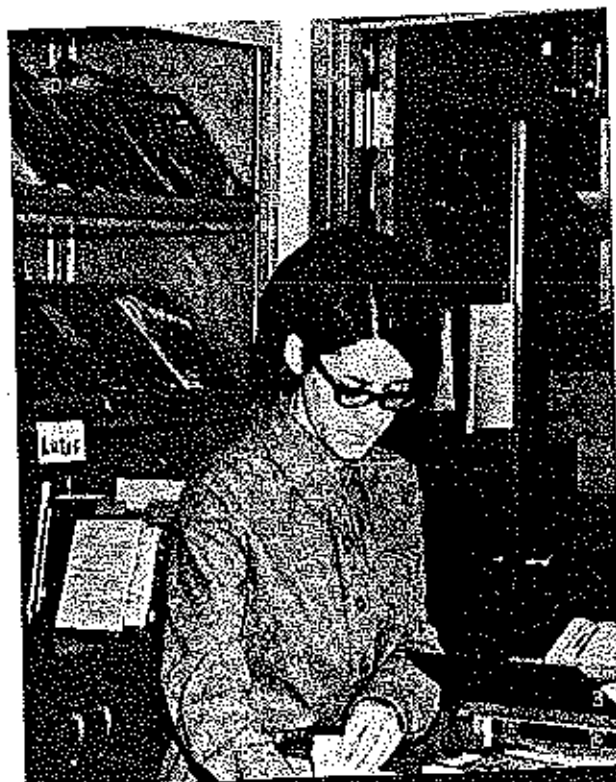
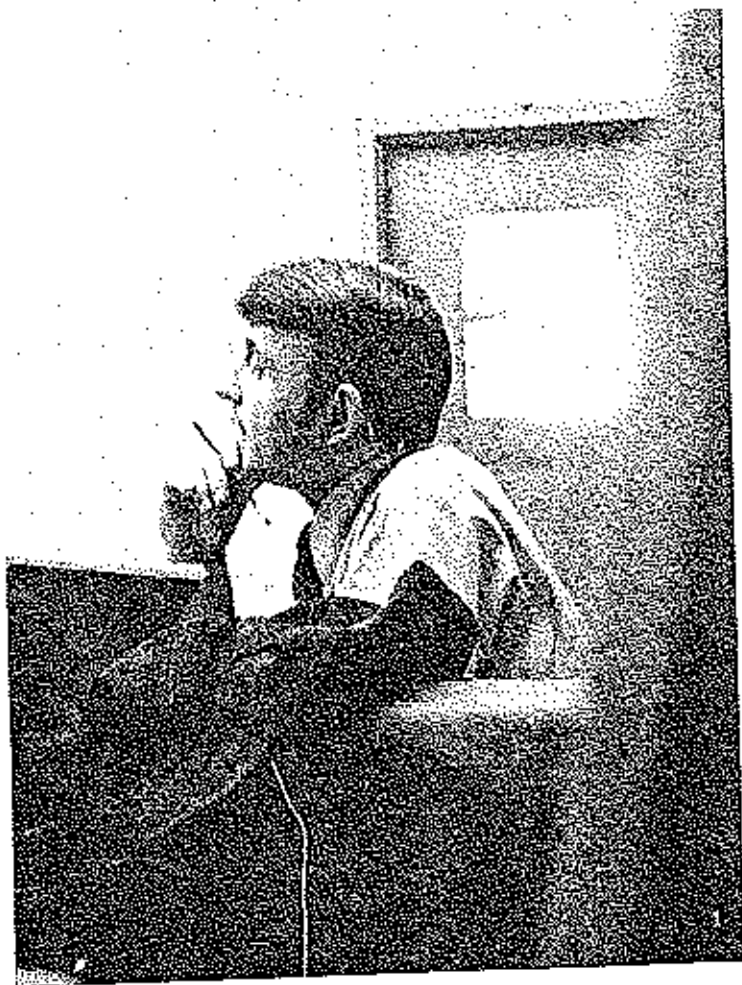
students learn to communicate; and appreciate literature

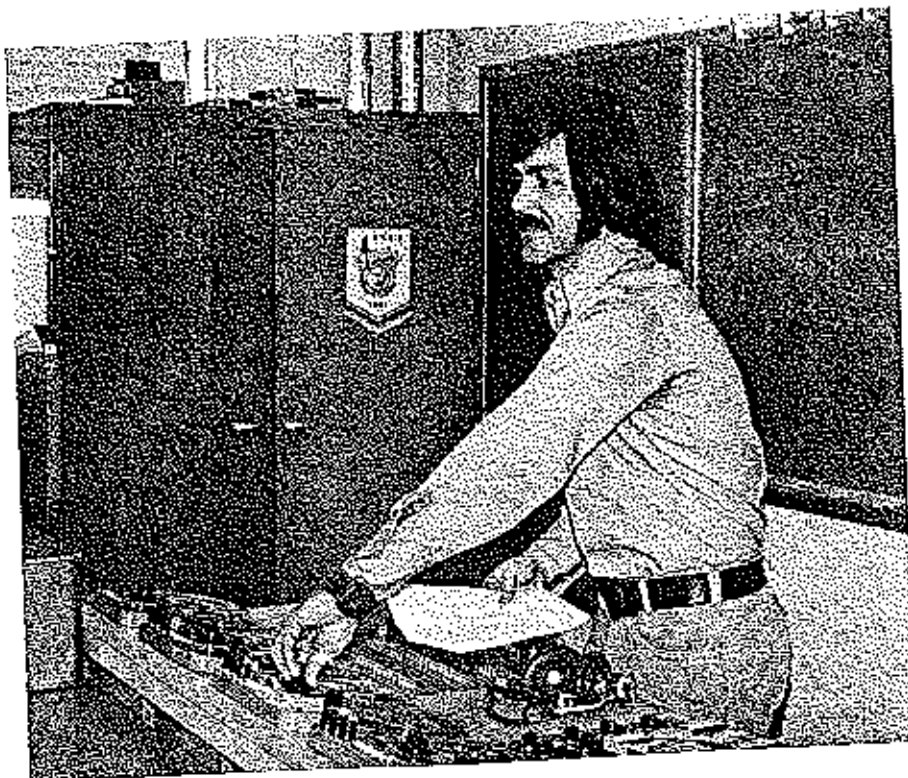

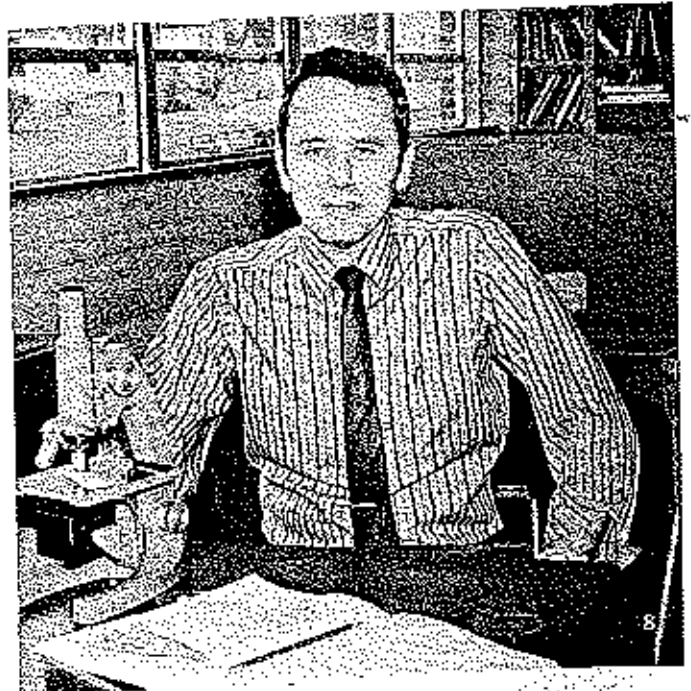

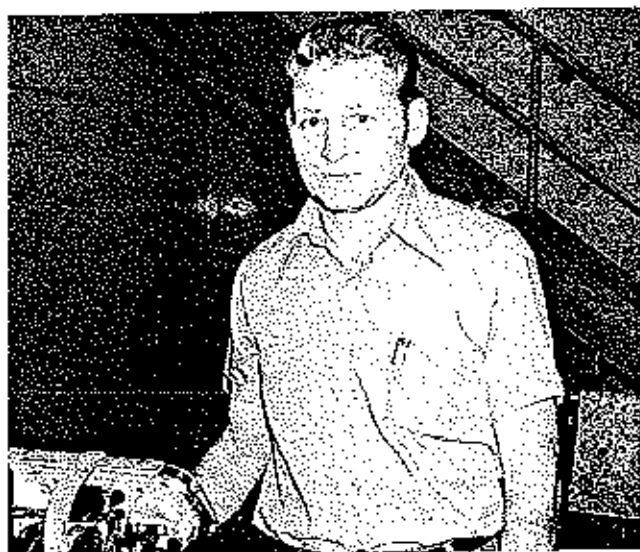


students acquire variety of practical skills.

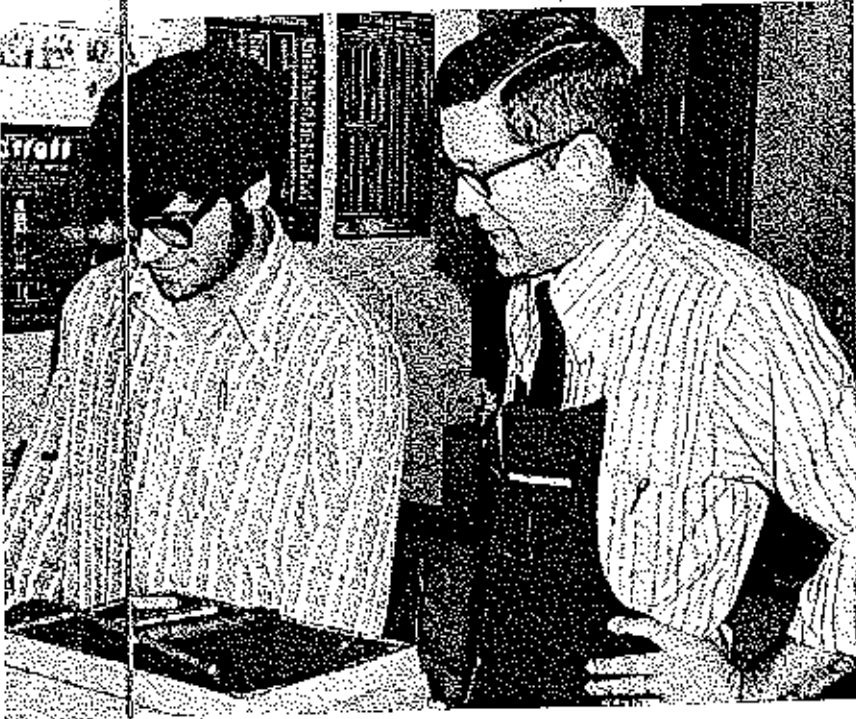

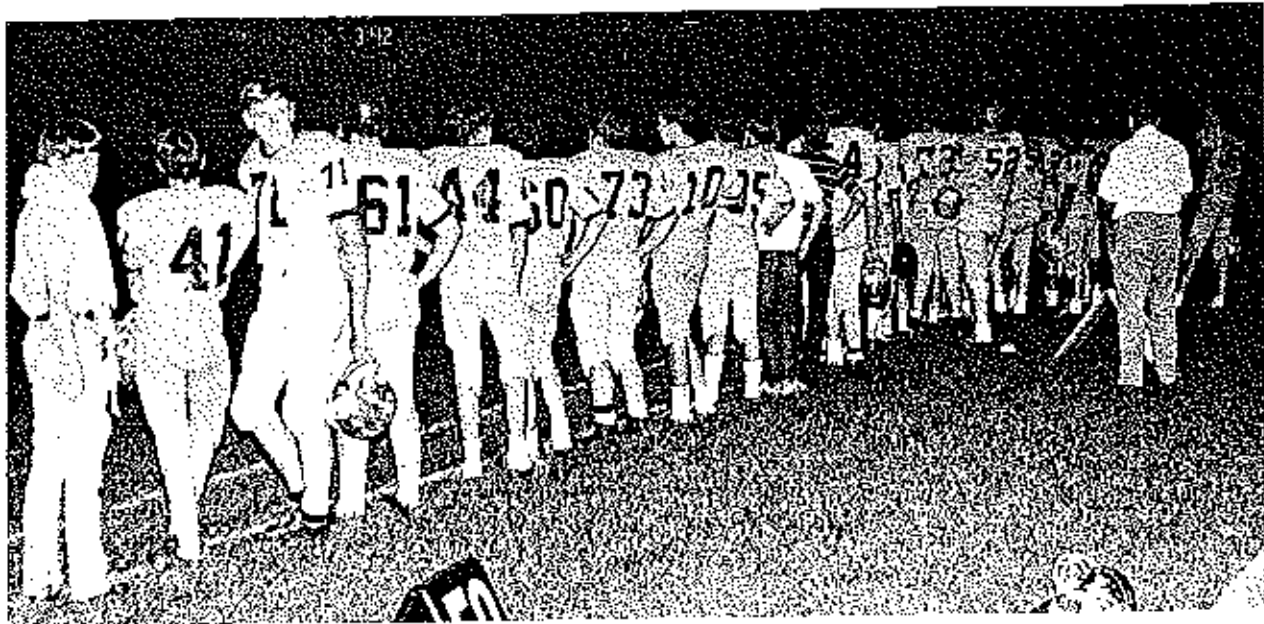

'71-'72 — a year to build



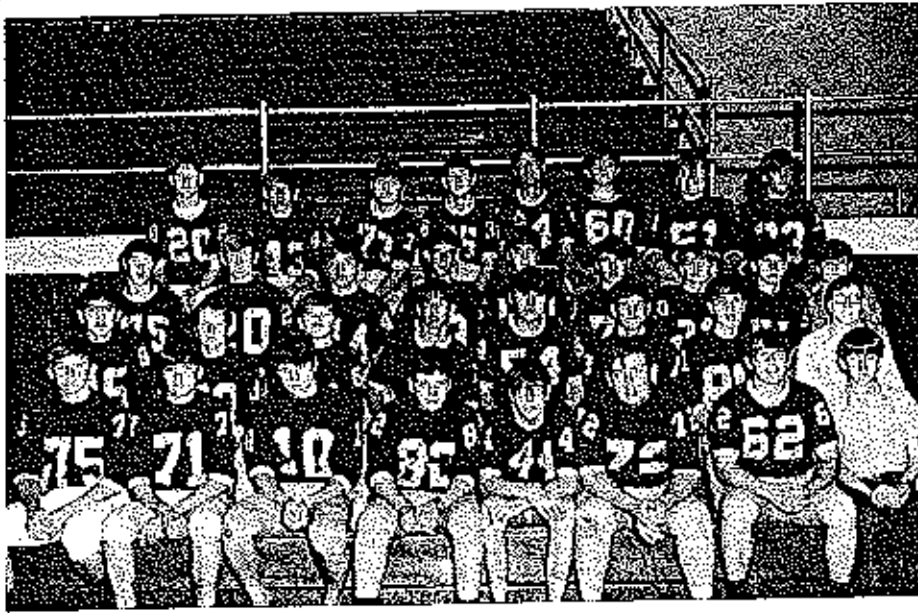

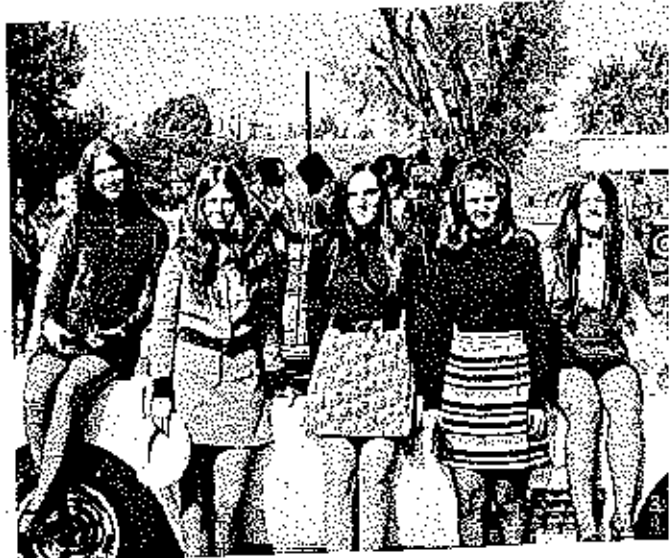

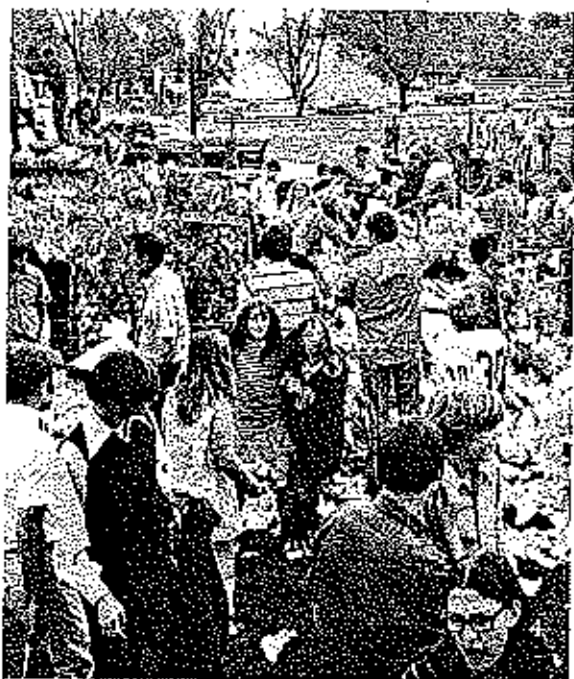

That night, the Eldon Mustangs defeated the Osage Indians 38 to 0. The new queen reigned at the dance afterwards.

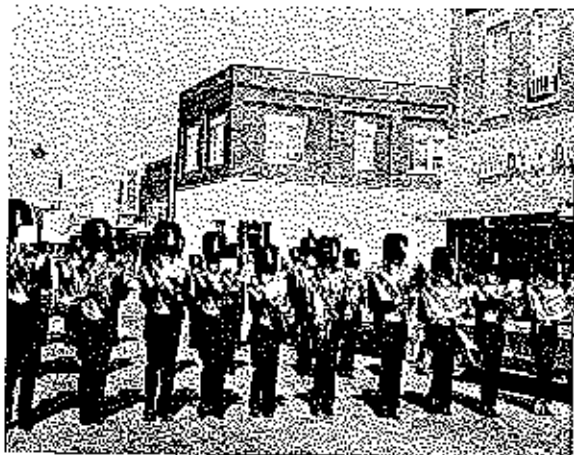

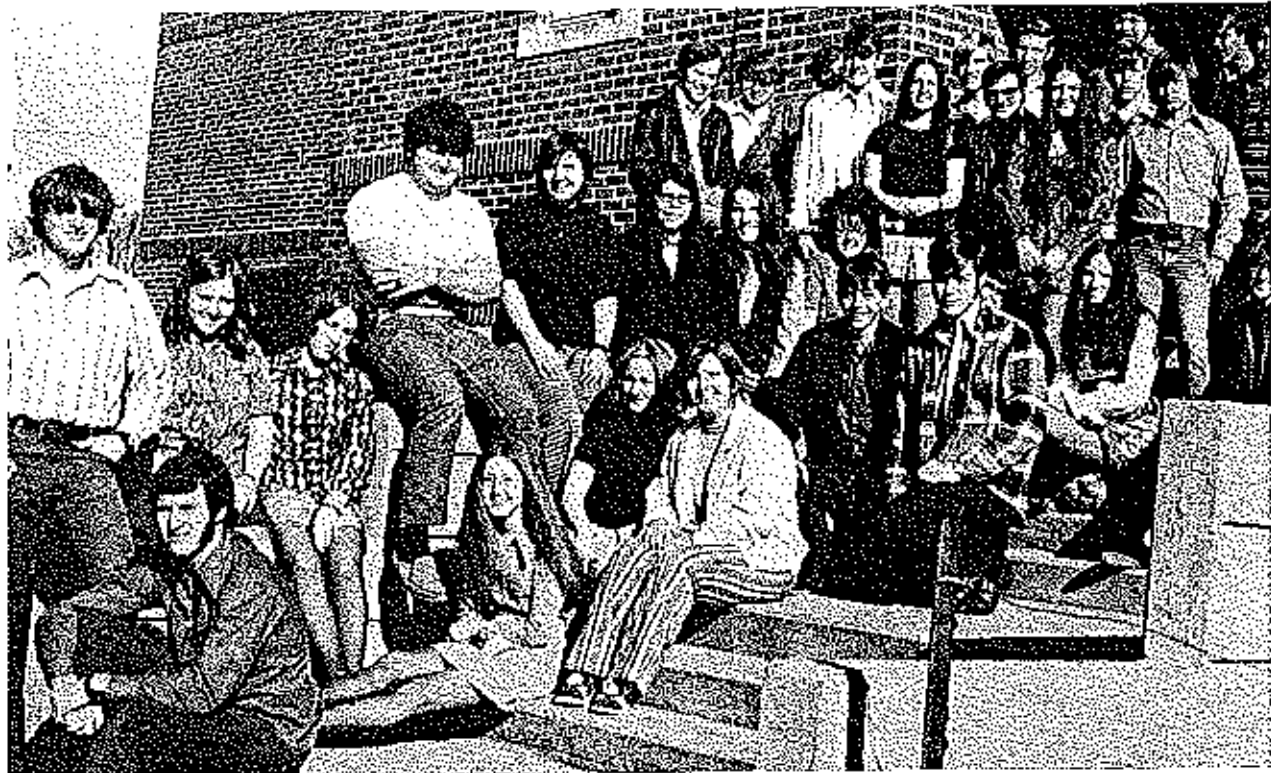

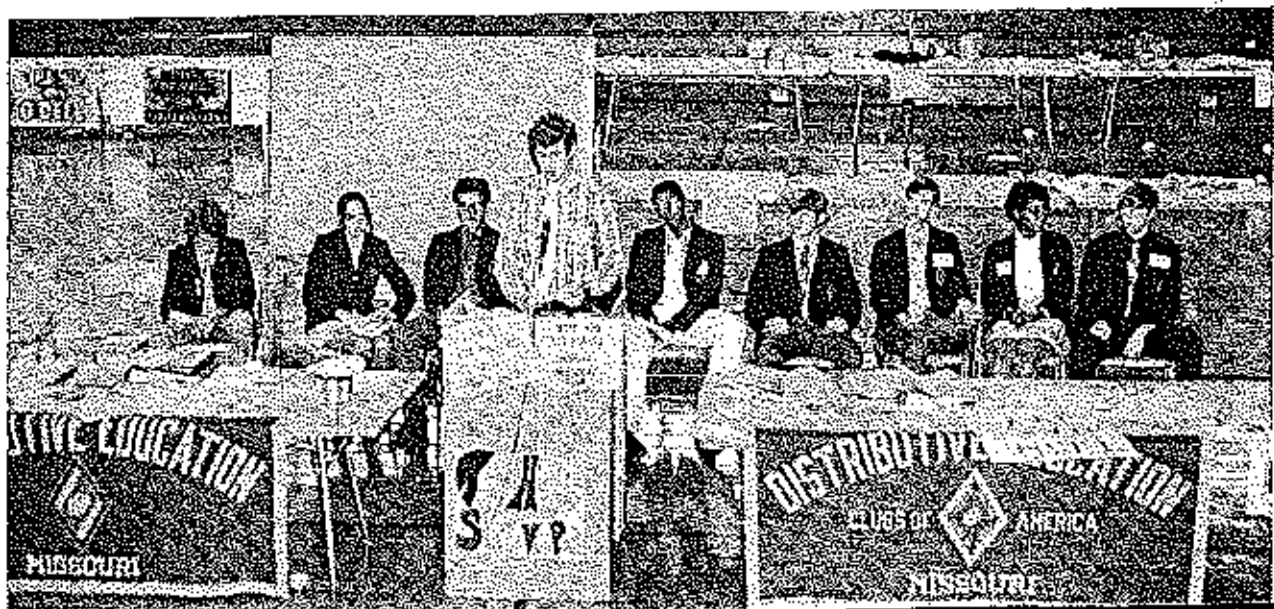

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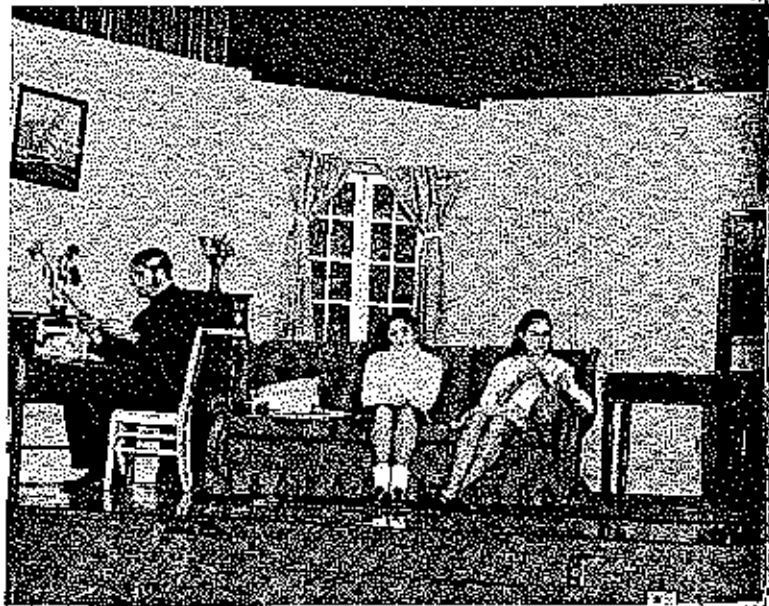
drama department presents two three-act plays:

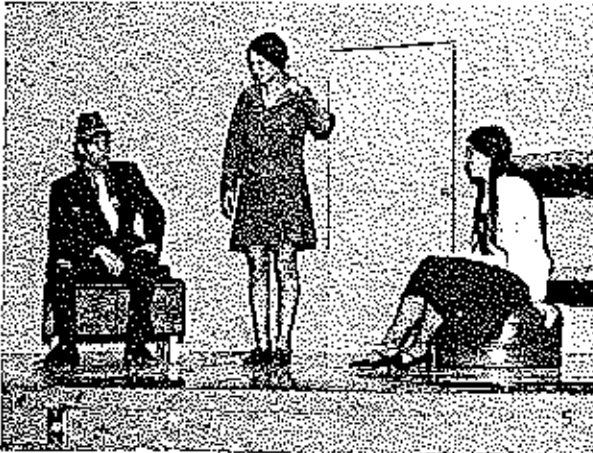
The second three-act play, "Our Hearts Were Young and Gay", was presented on December 3 and 4. It received excellent response from the audience.

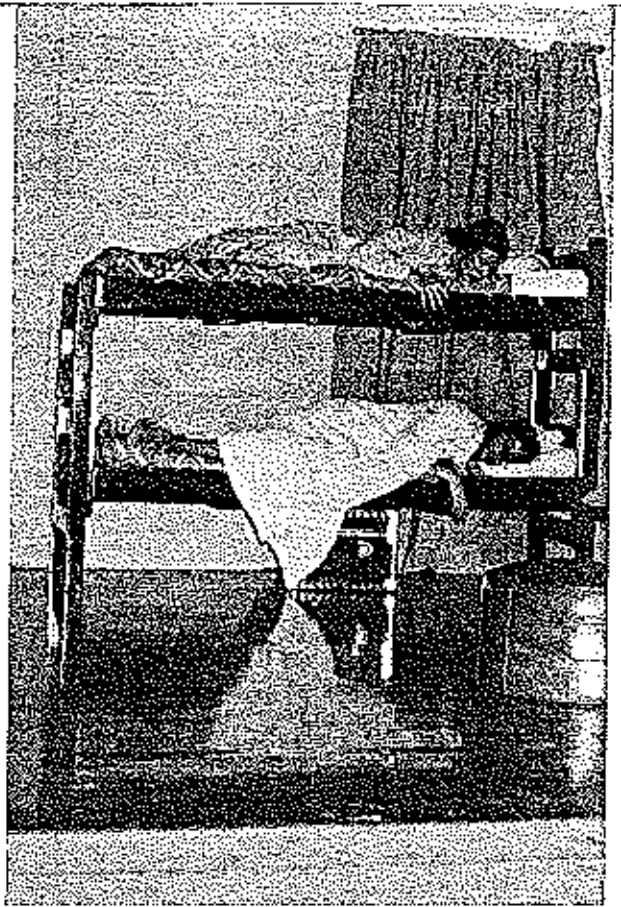

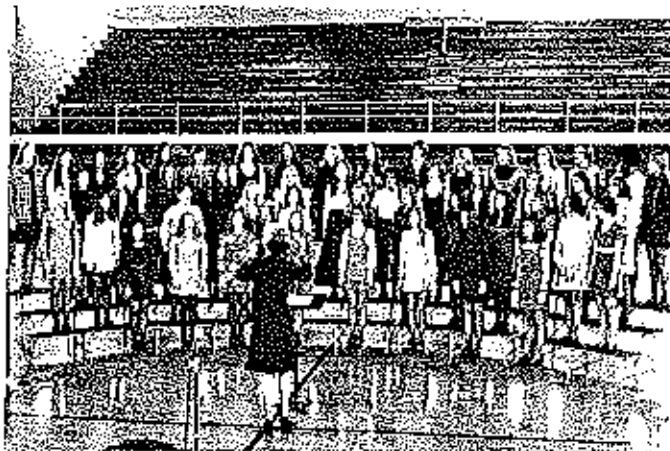

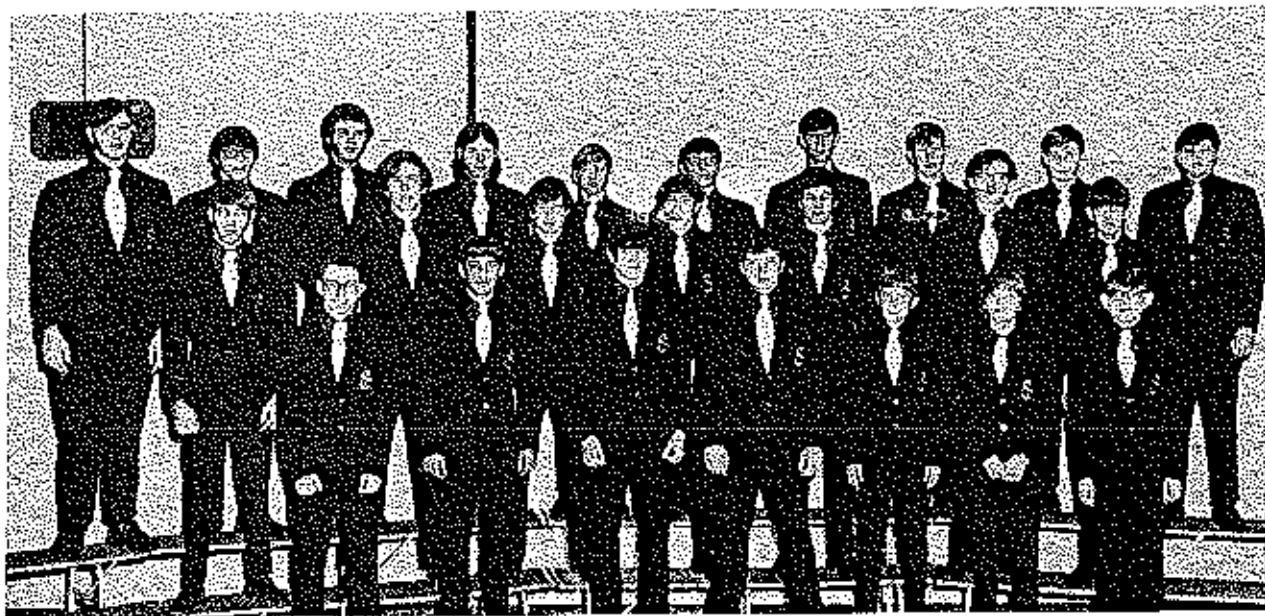
music department has an active year

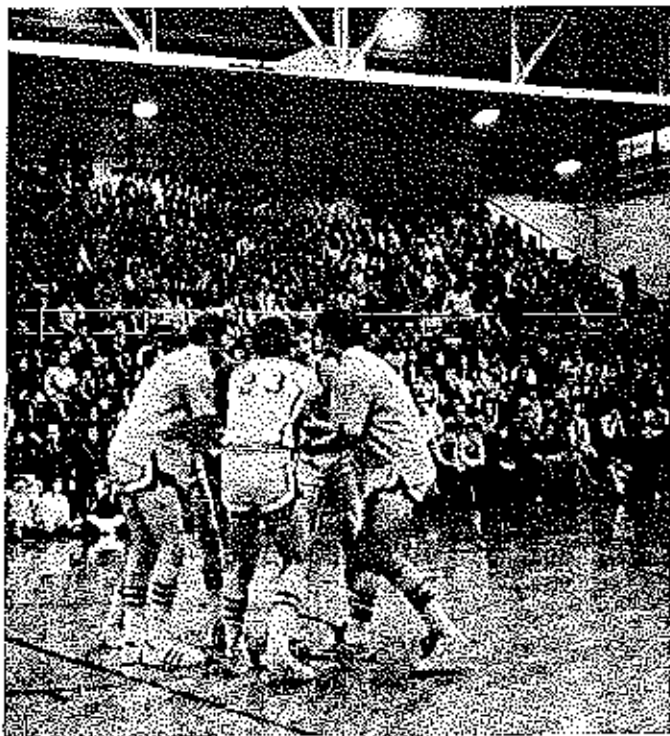

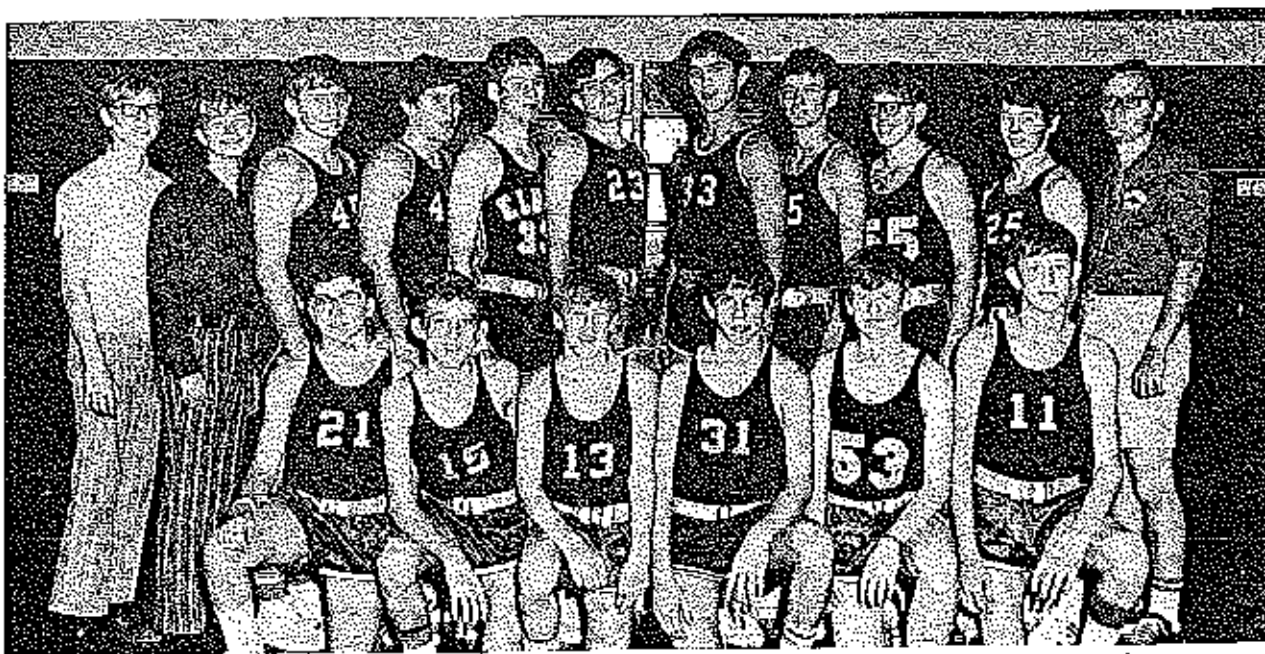

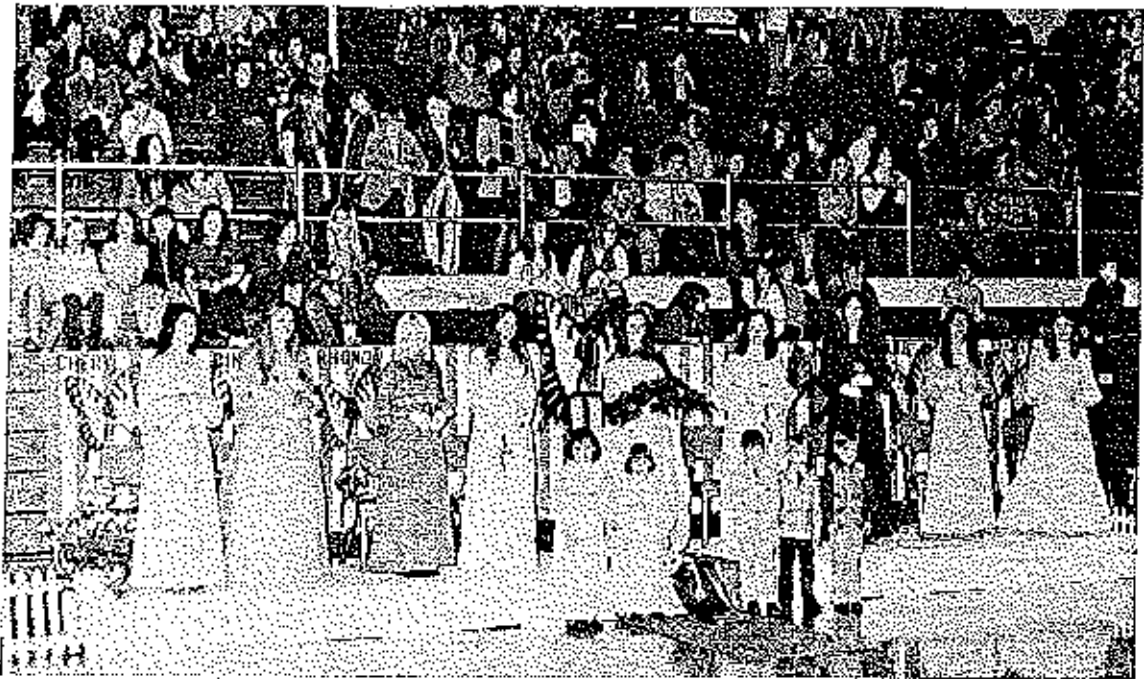


peggy opie crowned queen of popularity & beauty

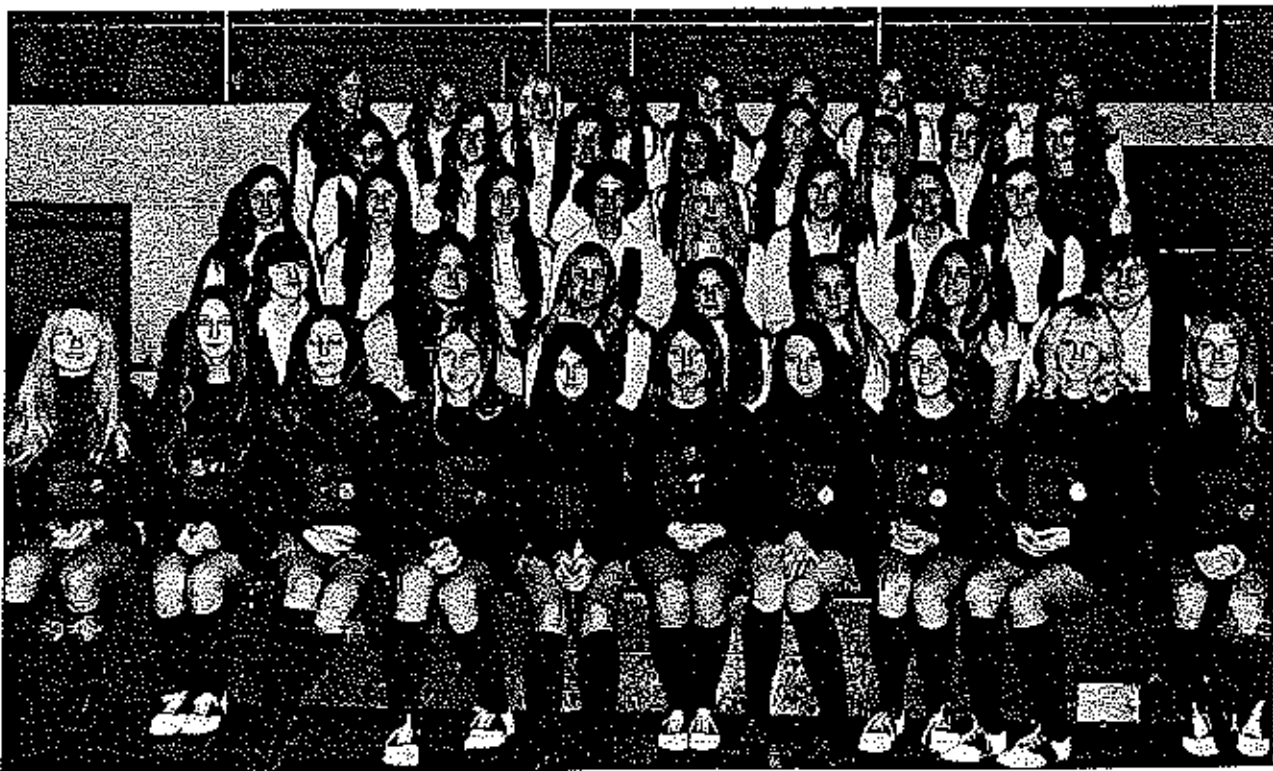
pep club and cheerleaders promote school spirit

were well rewarded this year.

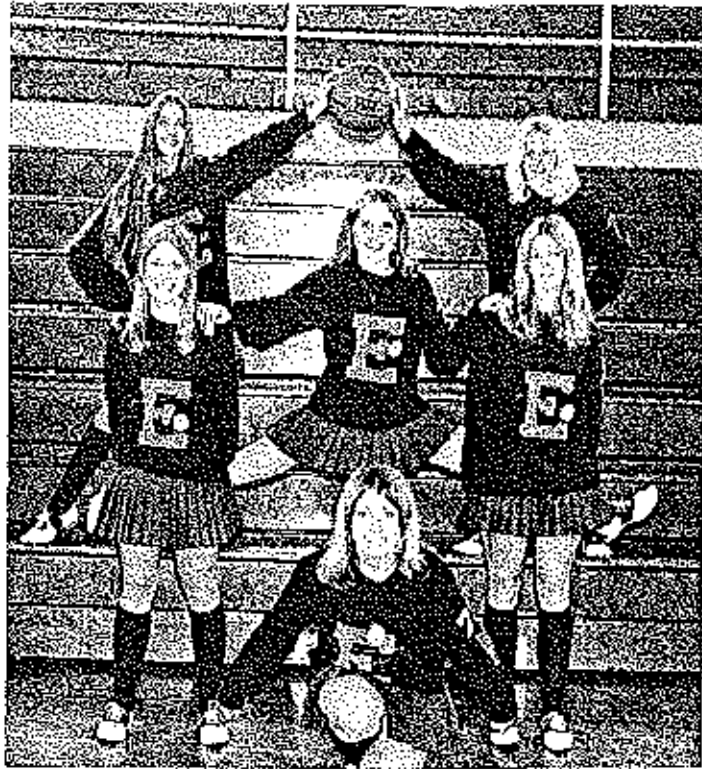
The pep club cheered our varsity football team to a 4-4 record for the year, and the varsity basketball team to a 23-3 record giving us the Tri-County Championship.

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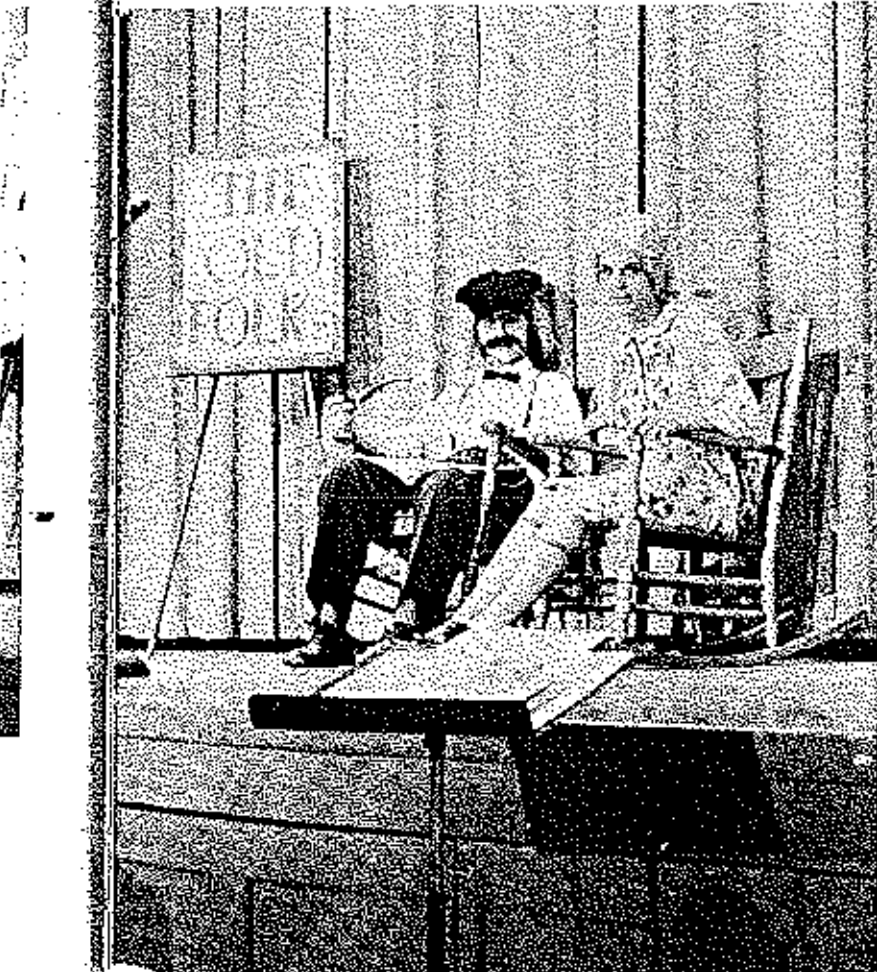

Within these mythical states, the students study the governmental operations at the city, county, and state levels. They elect their own officers and make and enforce laws that are essential to all effective systems of government.

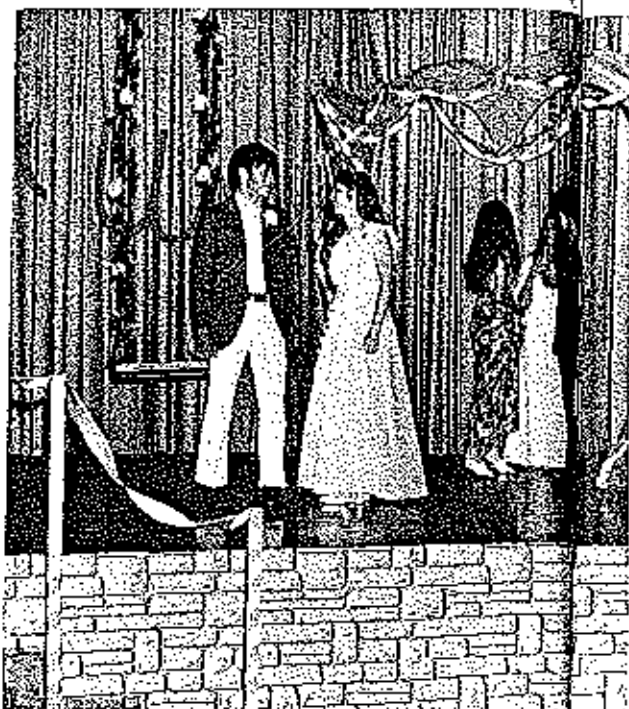
The American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary sponsor the sessions with local organizations sponsoring the individual representatives.
