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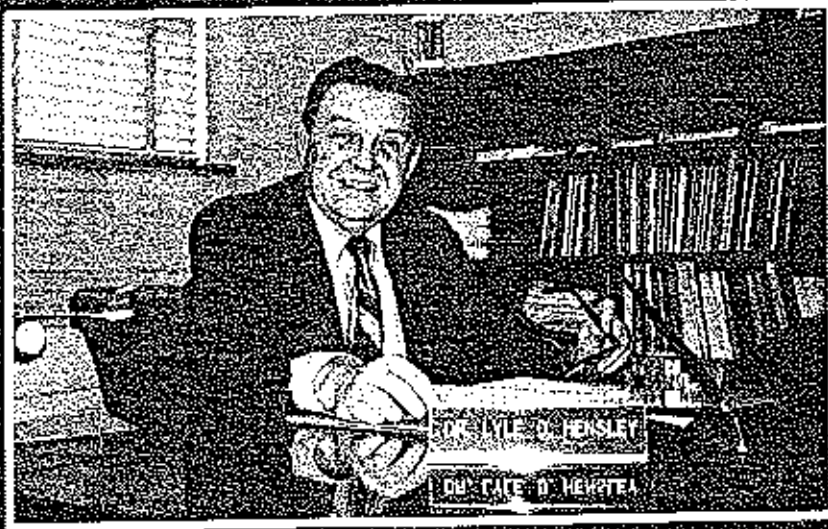

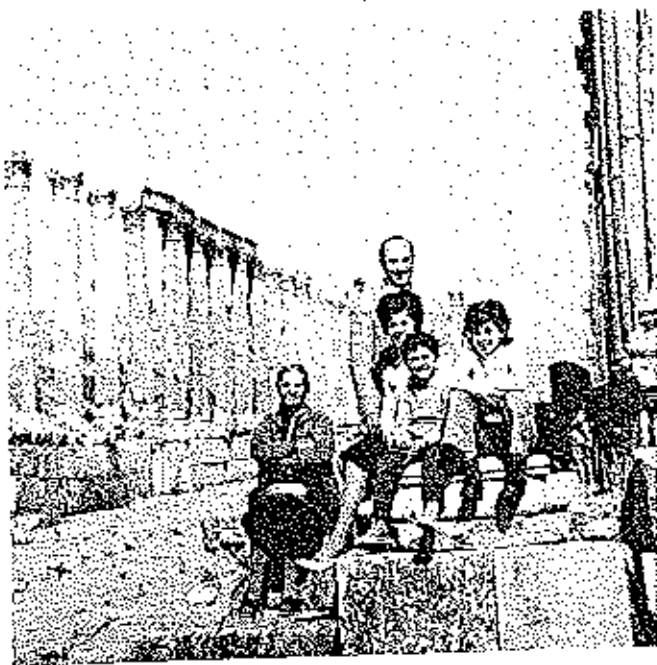
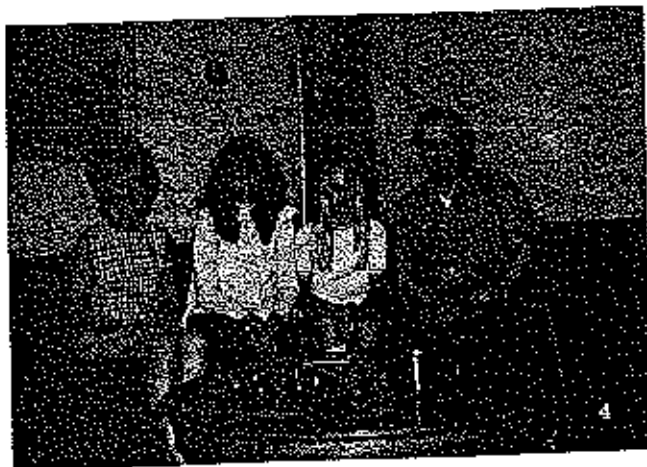
Memories are among our most precious possessions. I congratulate the Yearbook staff on their efforts to make this book a record each of you will cherish.

She was also quite active in several clubs: AFS, Pep Club, Glee Club, and Drama Club.

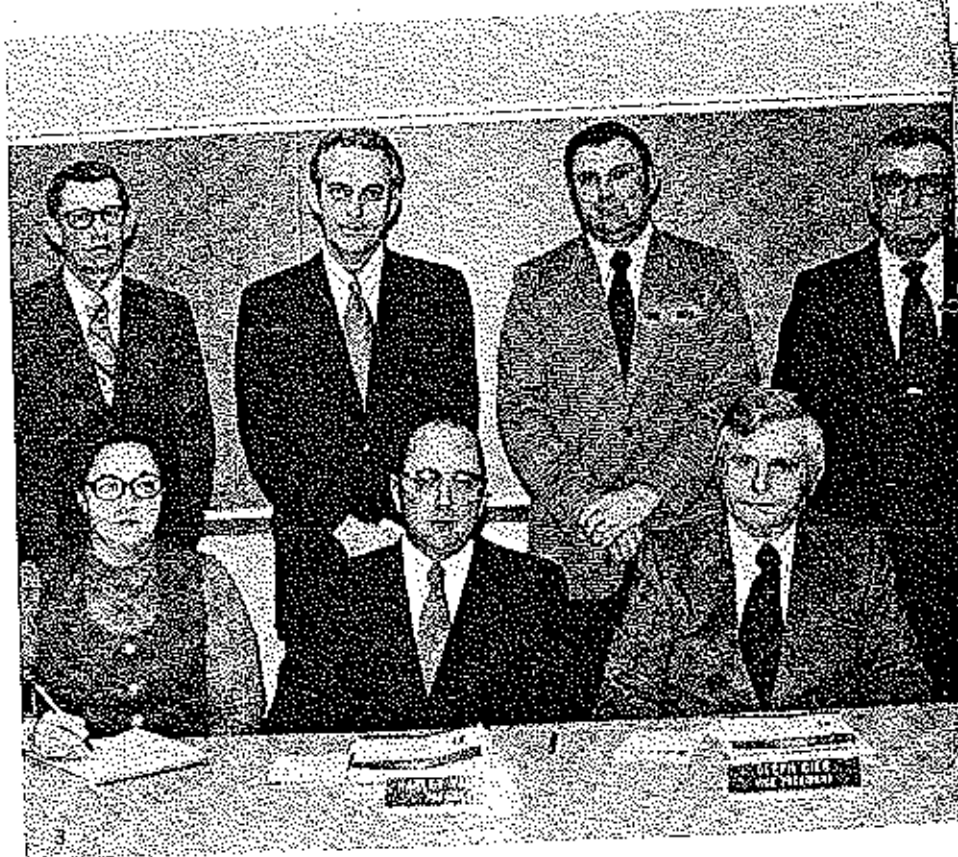
She arrived in Eldon in August 1972 and left New York to return to Jordan on July 14, 1973.

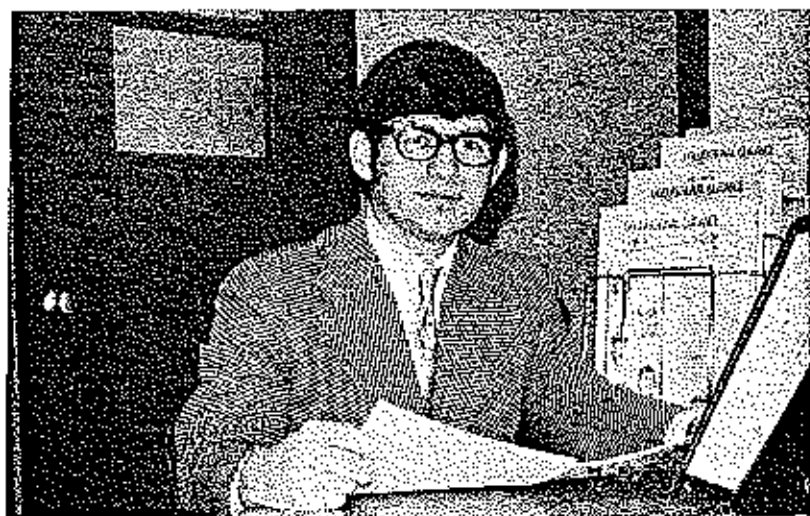
"counselors work to provide placement services for students; TCT is part of program"

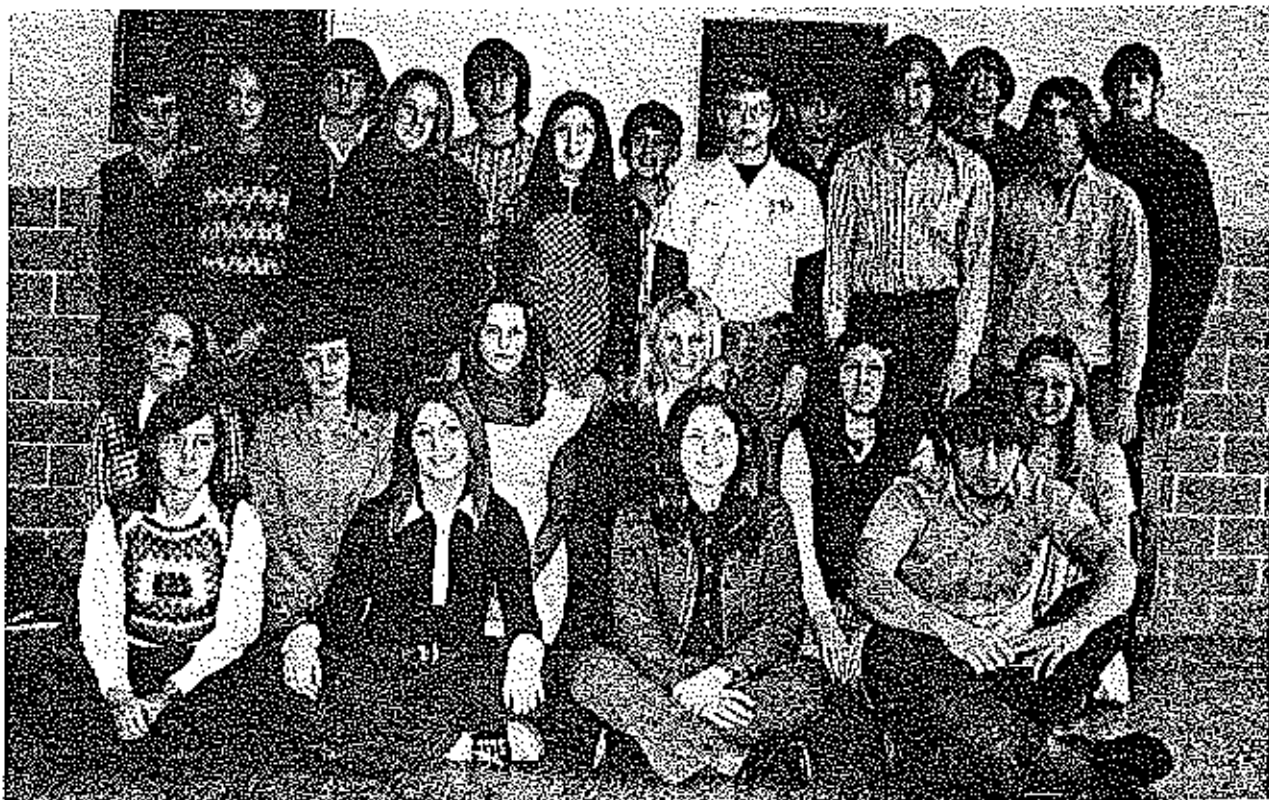

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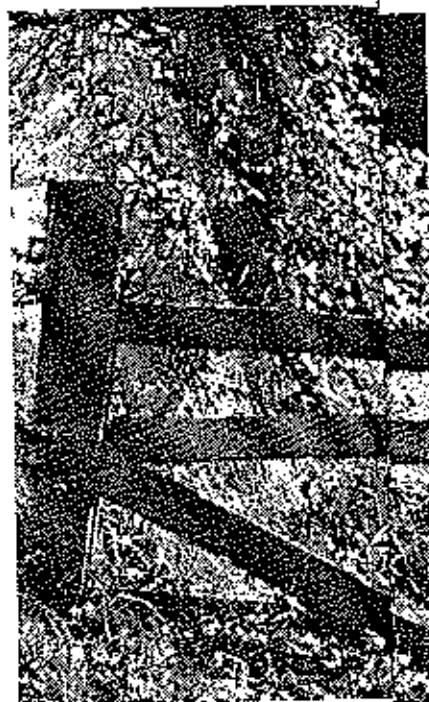

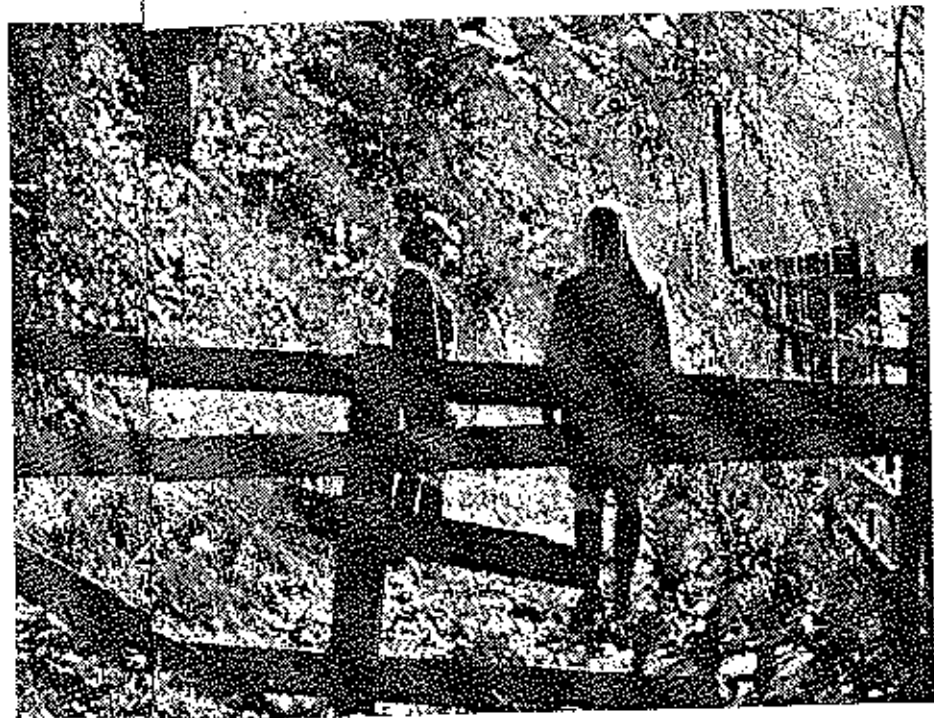

language arts studies teach skills and concepts, and encourage self awareness

The language arts studies teach skills and concepts. Basic communicative skills are taught in grammar, composition, reading, and analysis. The program also aids students in discovering new dimensions of themselves, and developing an understanding of others. Through literature study students enlarge their experience of the world and of themselves, by confronting comfortable, traditional ideas and philosophies, as well as new values and points of view.

The Spanish department tries to provide a basic knowledge of the Spanish language and also of the lifestyles of Spanish-speaking countries. Students are encouraged to speak entirely in Spanish while in the classroom.

The librarian and her assistants help students locate materials needed for research papers and supplementary reports, as well as guiding the students' reading activities.

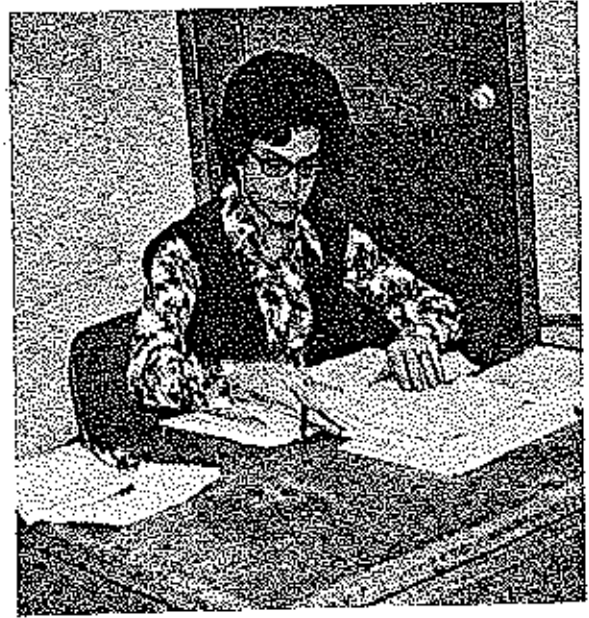

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students learn useful technical skills; learn to be adaptable

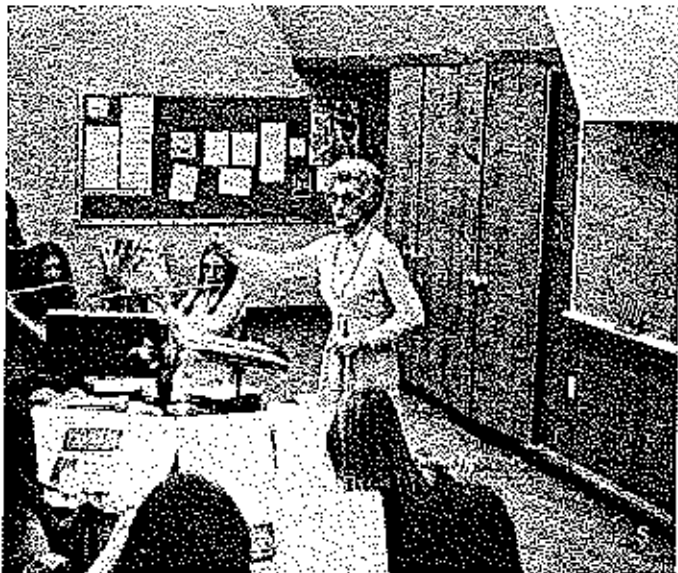

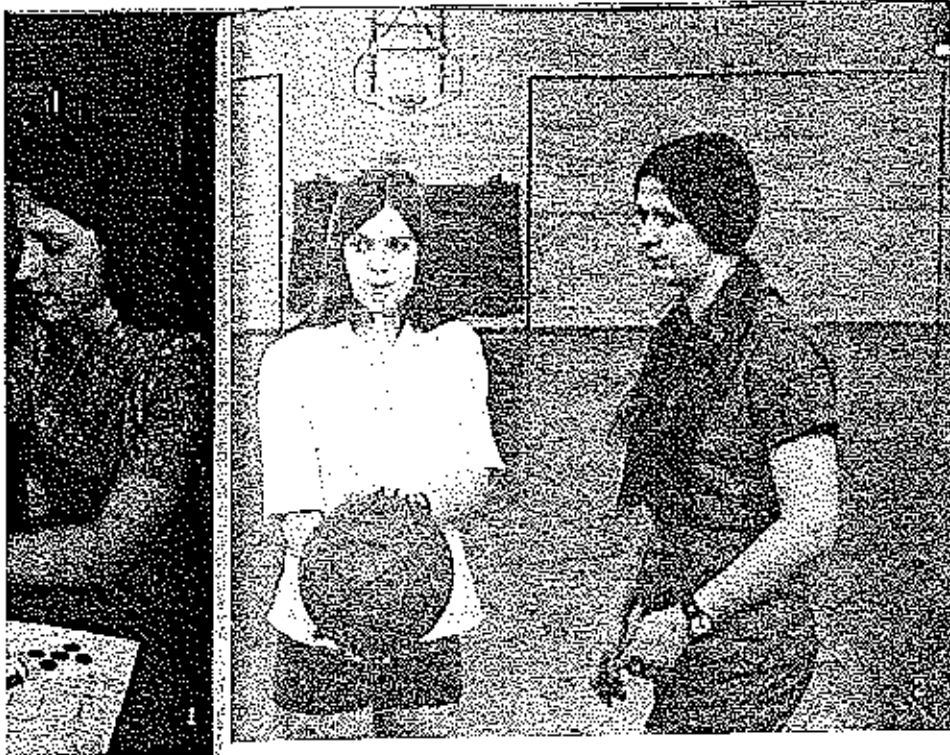

The purpose of the physical education program is to provide students with a general knowledge of sports, exercise, and health education.

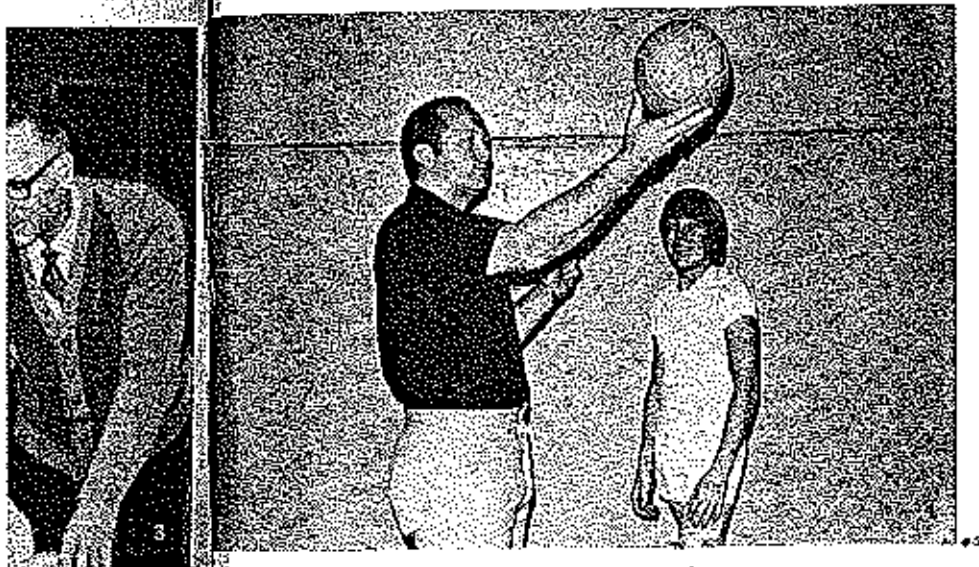

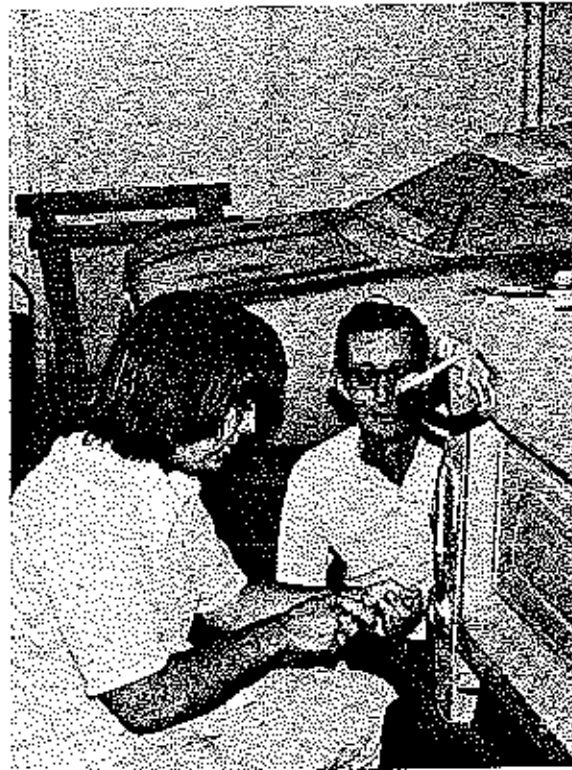
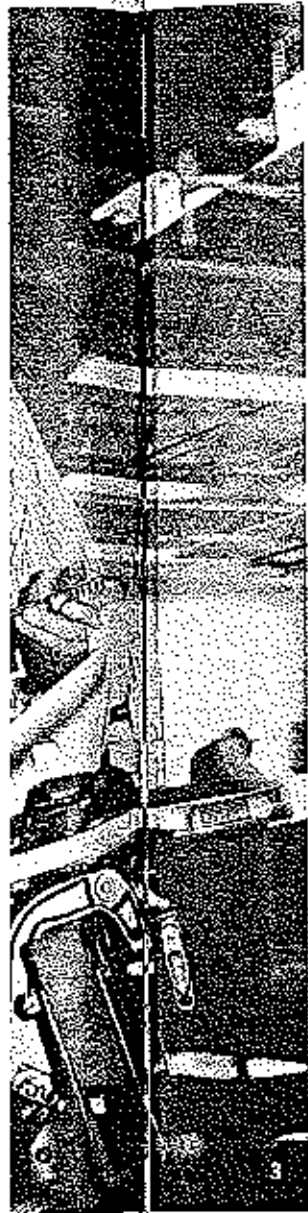
students acquire many skills in vocational classes; food services class added to curriculum

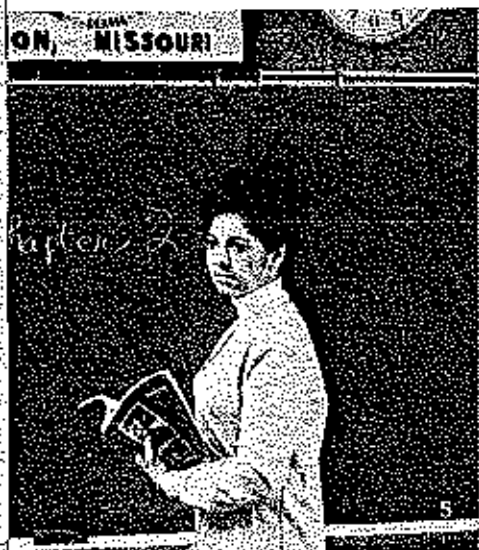
c.o.e. and business classes prepare ehs students to enter the business world.

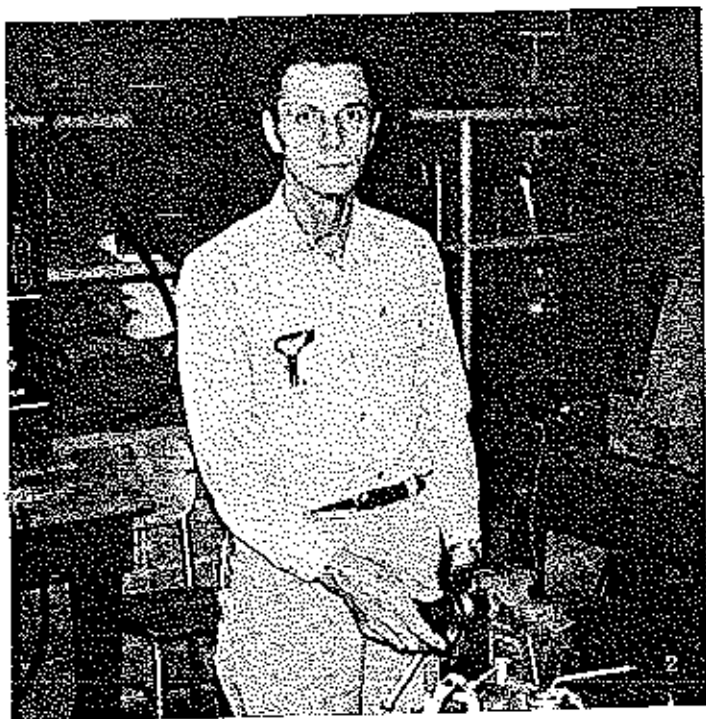

rhonda branch crowned as homecoming queen; mustangs defeat tigers 14-9

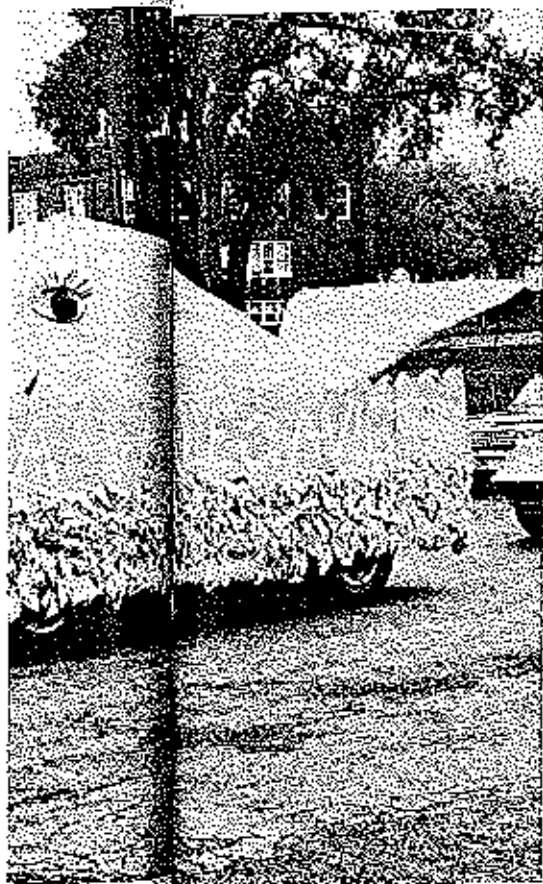
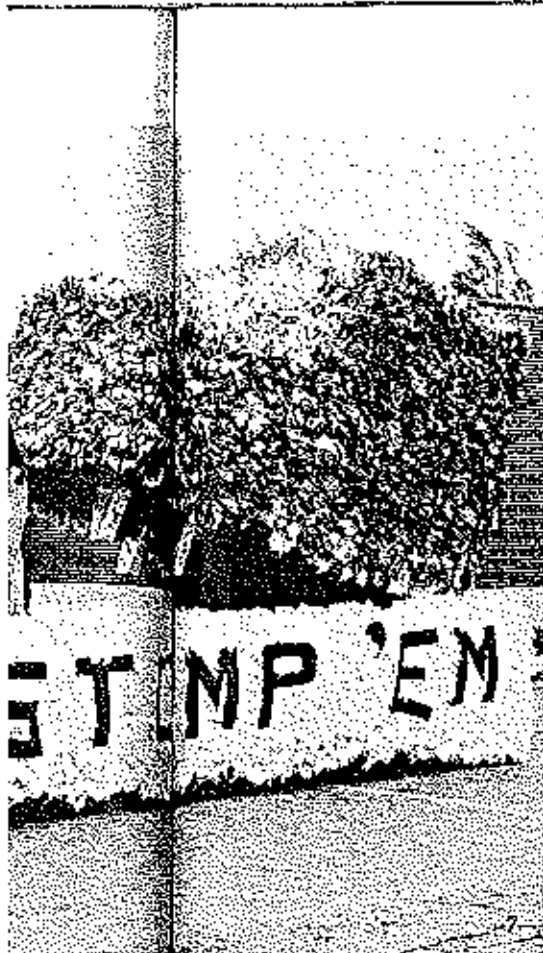

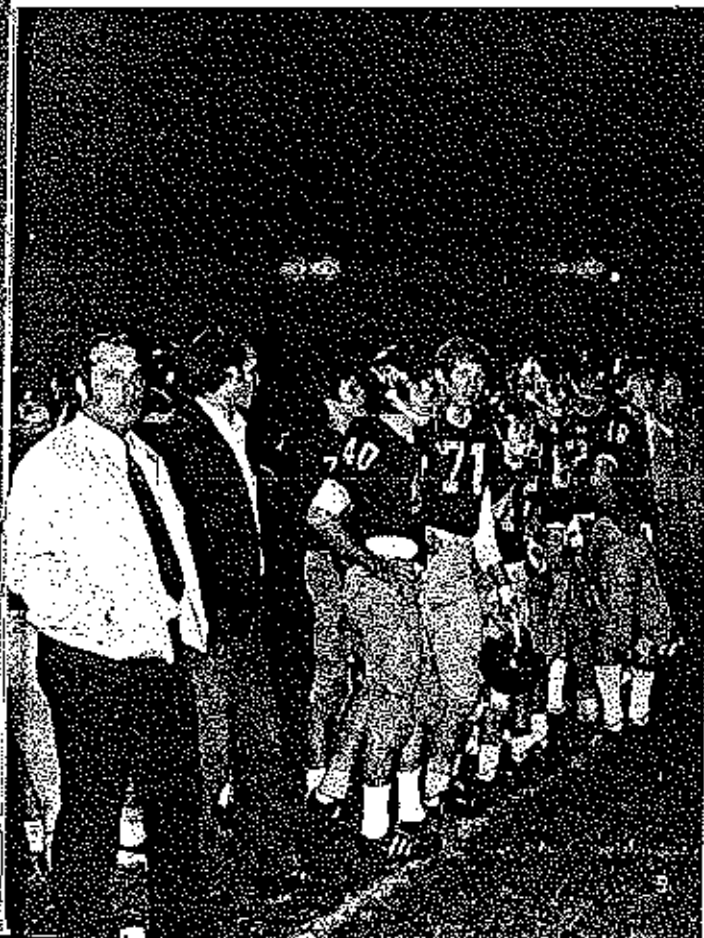


football

mustangs amass a 7-1 record

The Eldon Mustangs amassed a sensational 7-1 record for the '72-'73 football season. Running first in the state ratings early in the year, the Mustangs maintained a strong team to finish second in Tri-County. Most impressive victories for the Mustangs were the 36-0 take from Osage, the 50-0 win over Kemper and the 50-0 victory over arch-rival California. Mustang gridironers rolled up a stupendous 283 season total in only 8 games, while holding their opponents to a crushingly humiliating 99 points. Eldon took its first five games before losing the one game to Camden-ton. Springing back to life, the Mustangs took the last two games, with a 50-0 victory over Iberia and a 71-14 victory over Windsor.

Individual Mustang players achieved distinction, several being named to the All Conference Team. In particular Cully Jobe, Eldon starting quarterback, led Mid-Missouri in pass completions and yardage gained.

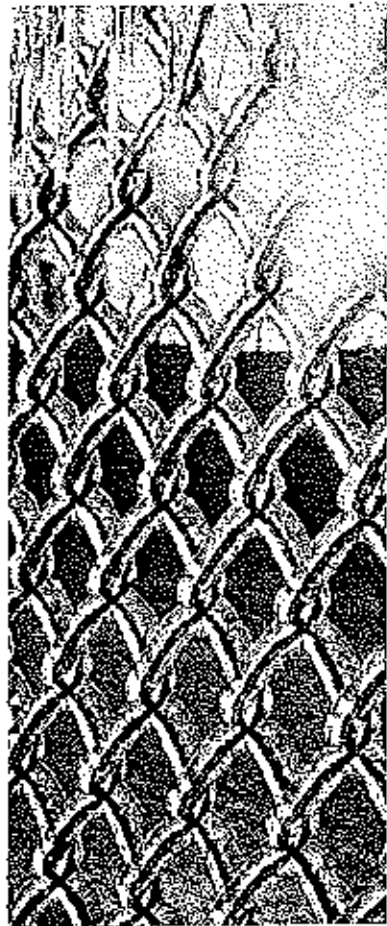
art club encourages student creativity

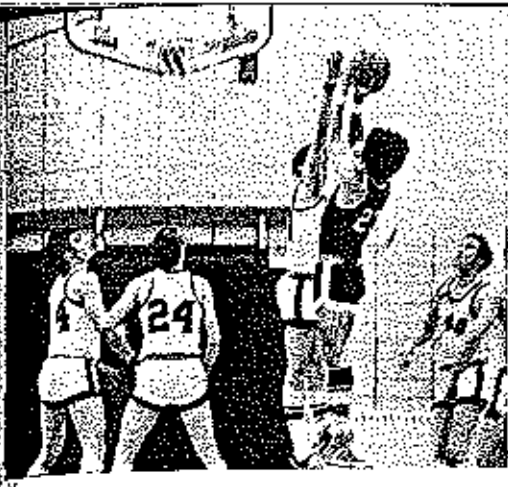
Coach Craine says, "Our record shows that the little man with the big heart still has a spot in high school basketball."



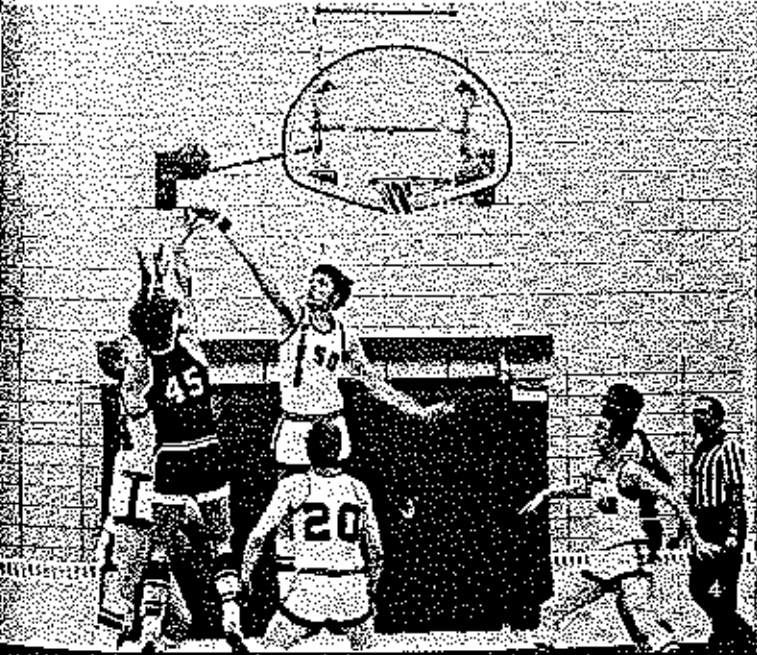

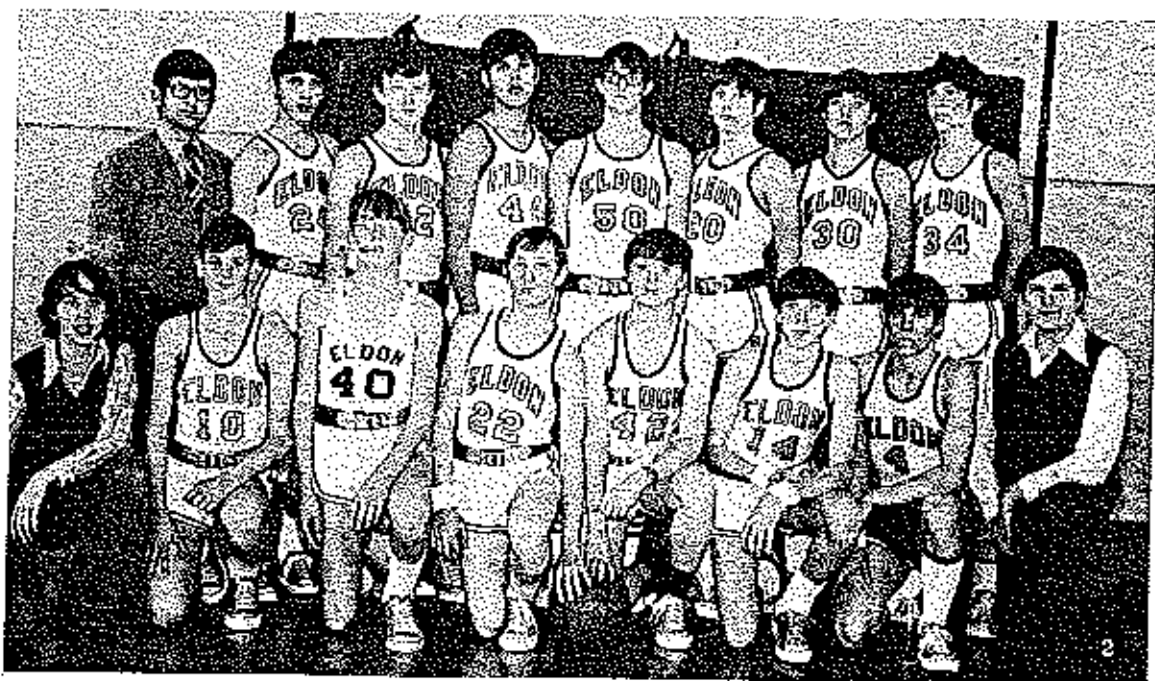
