Other favorites listed here show the diversity of contemporary America's taste in music, television programming, movies and performers. Its true what they say — there really is something for everyone here!



Heavy snow causes collapse


Old Man Winter displayed his fury with a vengeance during 1983-84. Numerous freezing rain and sleet storms moved through the area as well as two major winter storms that almost totally shut down the Central Missouri area. The first occurred the week before Christmas, dumping up to eight inches of snow and ice on Eldon. Eldon schools lost three days to inclement weather at that time but gained three extradays of vacation.

Following the snow, temperatures dropped to record lows. Wind chills reached 45 degrees below zero and daytime highs were recorded at -13 degrees.


By far the worst storm of the season occurred late in February. Before it was over, 18-21 inches of heavy wet snow blanketed most of the Ozarks and under its crushing weight, the 30-year-old EHS gymnasium collapsed.


From First Street, the casual observer could see very little wrong with the structure. Only if one moved around to the west or north sides could the true extent of the damage be seen. The roof, back wall and parts of both side walls lay broken and twisted on the gymnasium floor.













For a few days after, giant steel beams swayed in the breeze, debris continued to fall and lengthening cracks appeared in the remaining supports. By the time school resumed after another unexpected four day vacation, wrecking crews were busy knocking down dangerous portions of the structure and excavating rubble from the interior. Insurance adjustors surveyed the site and preliminary estimates were made.

Much remains to be decided about the rebuilding effort but it is a fact that EHS sports and practice schedules will certainly encounter conflicts during '84-'85. The junior high will be used as much as possible but available time will be a premium.


She says that the most important thing to her in life is good friends. Good friends are very important for a person to have a positive self from the community is also Important.

Graduation means new challenges


The Class of '84 claimed to be many things—

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Band schedules many performances





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
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
Volleyball proves "awesome" power






Four named to All-Conference

Girls post 10-11 record




Coach Clare Herriman commented that the girls "improved in every phase of the game over last year,"



The victory was especially important because there was a lot of pressure on the Mustangs to win a tournament after not having done so in over two years.




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Administration —



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


