
After the game a dance was held in the Old Gym. Amber 251 was the guest band.

Warm day lifts spirits of '85


Although strong winds kept the graduates' hands glued to their caps, it was a beautiful day for the 1985 class of Eldon High School to graduate.




The Spring ploy was entitled "The Worst High School Play in the World" and proved to be an entertainment selection. Cast members and audience oille seemed to enjoy it.






Cheerleaders add third squad


The Lackes then turned in a nearly flowless performance on their way to district where once again they took it to the Hermann Wildcats. This win advanced them to state sectional play at CMSU.

Season poses challenge

With the spector of last year's 26-3 team hanging over them and having to play their home games in a "foreign" gum, the '84-'85 Mustangs had the cards stacked against them from the stact of the season on. But the challenge was met, and Edon basketball enjoyed yet another successful season.

After a slow pre-Christmas start which saw the Mustangs go 4-4, the second half showcased a different team; one that went 15-5. That big turnaround began at California, where a Mustang sweep of the tournament gave Eldon its first championship there since 1982.


Straky was an understatement this year for the Edon-Osage series, for the lifth straight season, the Mustangs won the series between the two schools.

In the first meeting, held before Christmas in Eldon, the Mustangs come away with a 47-45 triple-overtime victory over the previously-unbeaten indicas. When Eldon Tourney time rolled around. Osage came north with only that one blemish on their record, a π 1 seed, and revenge on their minds. The largest crowd to ever worth a basketball game in the EMS gym witnessed an indian victory over the Mustangs to take the big traphy home.


Institled by Jim Byland in 1979 and now carried on by Jerry Cochron, Mustang basketball pride was at a peak when Eldan traveled to Indian country in early-February. Osage, ranked #4 in state class 2A, took a 31-26 lead into halfitime. The next sixteen minutes, though, sow the Mustargs outscore Osage 46-23 in probably their finest half of the year. The convincing 72-54 win gave 6 dan their third consecutive Tri-County Conference title. Osage suffered three iosses on the entire season, two of them at the hands of the Mustargs (the other in first-round state action to Paris).

Even though state playoffs were a goal that wasn't reached this year, the loss to fultar gave the Mustangs their fifth straight appearance in the district finals. Mustang basketball didn't faiter as many expected this year. They aid deserve to be ranked up there with the great Eldan teams of the 80's. Bit of those obtained great respect on the basketball scene and the one main ingredient that every team looks to achieve: success.






Team advances to State
