






Other things to do may be going to games, the movies, staying home and watching t.v., going to a party with friends, or just "cruising around."






Beginning a new year




There were also five days in which students could participate in spirit raisers as Maroon and Gold day, and Hippy day. At the end of the week they announced the Senior class as the winner.









The 1988-89 Debate squad set many new goals for the season, one of which was to advance in tournaments for debate and not just individual events.


The 1988-89 resolution was "RESOLVED" That the federal government should implement a comprehensive program to guarantee retirement security to United States citizens over age 65.












Later in the season, radio station "Alf-Hit Y107" awarded the 'Stangs football team of the week.






Girls basketball teams complete





spirit to the team





Coach Norman commented, "The season was enjoyable. The athletes really dedicated themselves to being successful. Furning the season around was a good experience for the team and me."






Records fall for the

After a poor showing an the first day of State, the team rebounded to capture a sixth place overall finish, while Bond fied for Medalist for the State Tournament.






Class votes for changes





Juniors have the responsibility of preparing from for the senior class and it is a big event that keeps them busy.


Seniors can choose between Prom and graduation as the last big event of their school year. This will be the last year many EHS seniors will have together before they go in separate ways.
