











"Well, all I have to say is that at least now I only have two more years left", says Sophomore Carl Hutcherson.






#### Storm Warning

#### Trouble Strikes Somalia

On Wednesday, December 9, 1992, the American military landed on the shores of Somalia, a small country in Africa. Operation Restore Hope is America's largest military humanitarian mission and the main goal is to feed Somalia's starving people.

This tragedy mainly resulted from the rivalry of two powerful factions led by General Mohamed Farah Aidid and his rival Ali Mahdi Mohamed. Their "soldiers" continue to loot, steal food and patrol the streets with armed weapons. Over three hundred thousand people have already died from starvation while there are still two million more at risk.

In this year alone, two hundred thousand metric tons of food and other supplies have been delivered but up to eighty percent has been looted or left to rot. Considering that just one metric ton of grain can feed two thousand and five hundred people, it is obvious Somalia needed the United Nations' help.

On December 4, 1992, the Pentagon assembled a force of almost twentyeight thousand soldiers while other countries were still debating on sending troops. The troops have cleared the streets of the faction's "soldiers" and continue to protect the food supplies and other necessities. Due to this protection, thousands of people are fed daily and the fatality rate is slowly decreasing.












#### Boys basketball: bouncingback to new levels






#### Going for the gold







#### **NHS Sets Standards for Excellence**


The 1992-93 National Honor Society Inducted 26 new members on October 20, 1992. The new membership is now 50 members.





your communication skills very much. You learn how to think fast and control your emotions while arguing. And it is a great way to meet people from other schools," said Junior Trisha Campbell.










