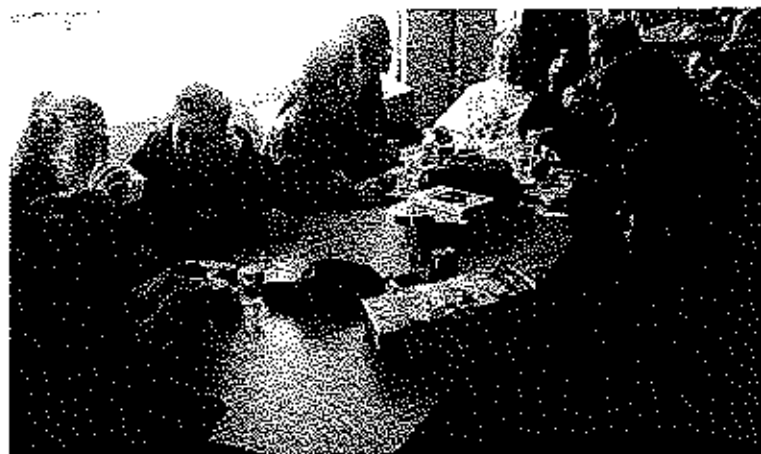

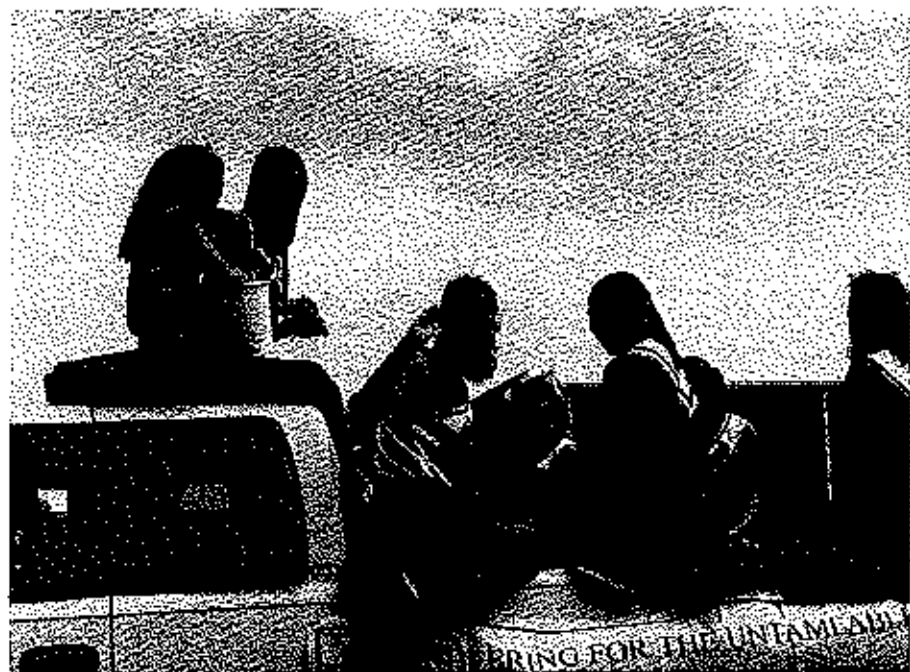

This year, students seemed to gain new perspective on before school activities. People enjoyed playing hackey sack and also using the computer lab to cruise the Internet.

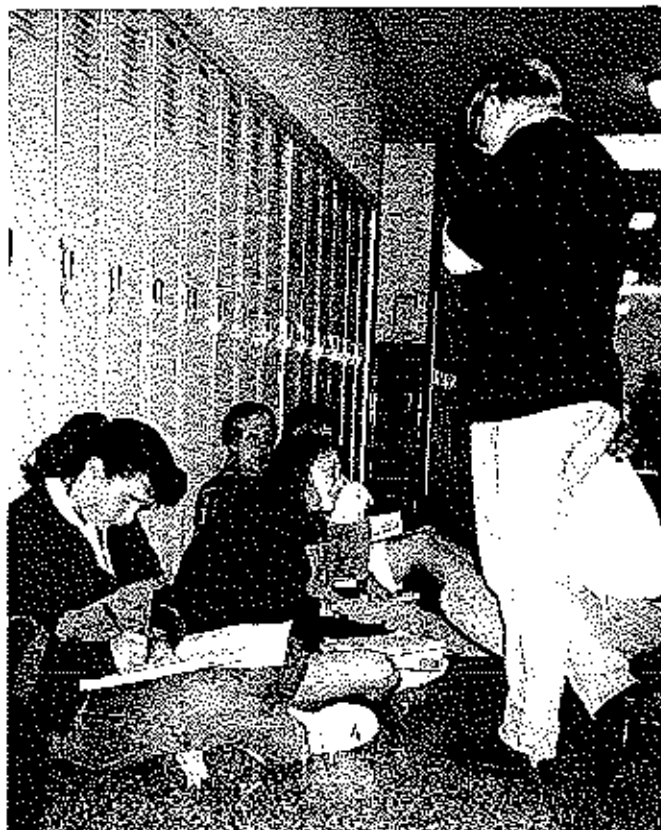

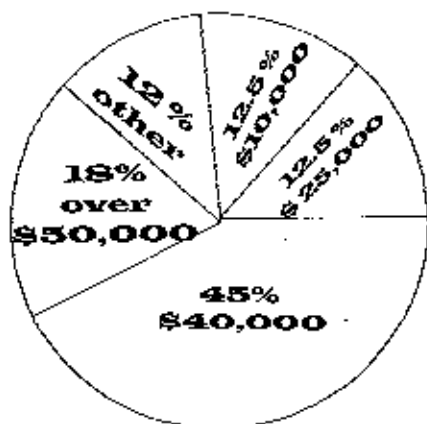
During the school year it is hard to try and balance your time to even have a job. Between practices, clubs and games I only have 1 or 2 nights a week to work," states a senior employee.

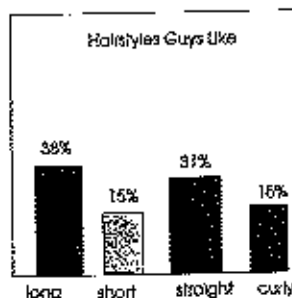
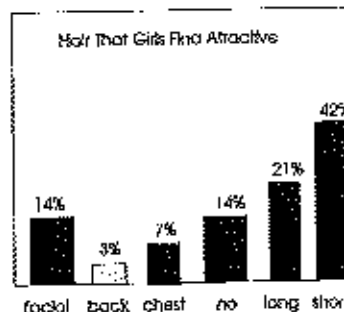
The Style Difference

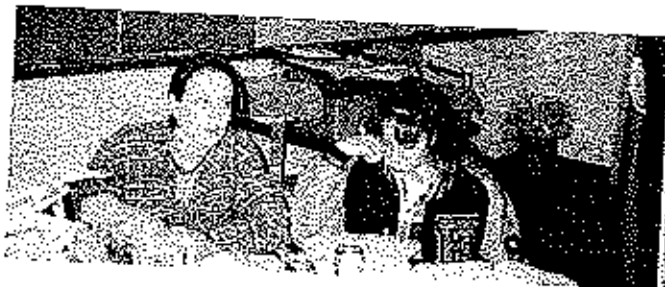

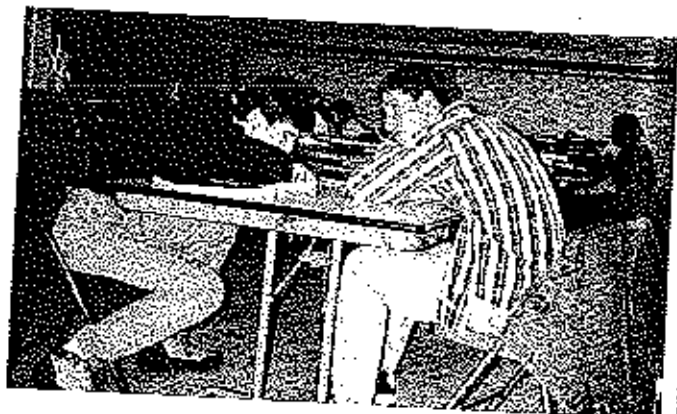

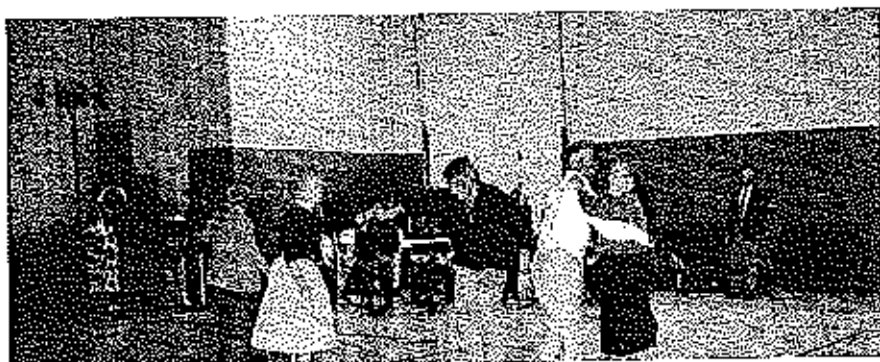

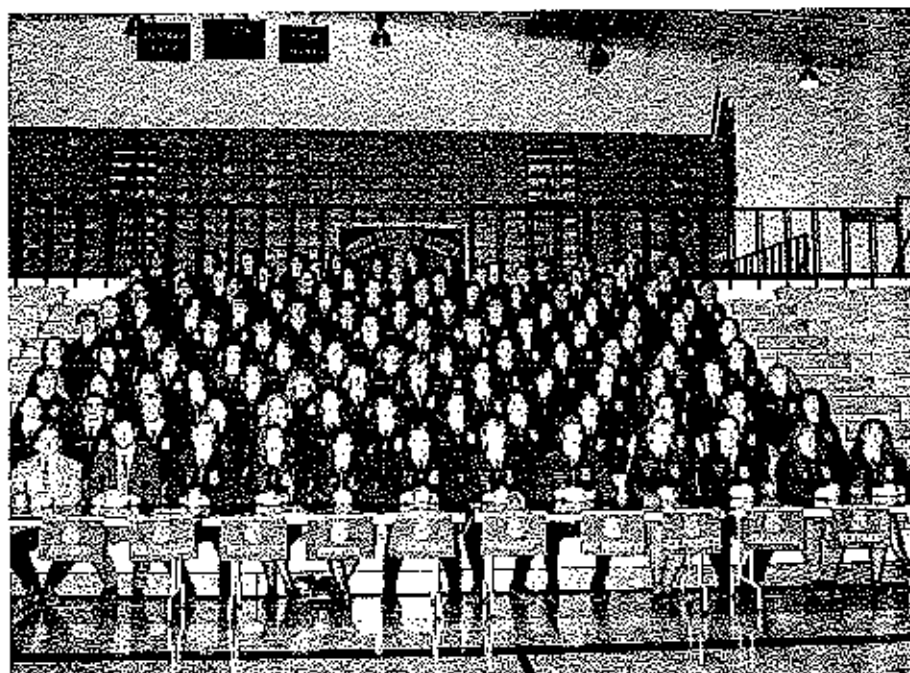
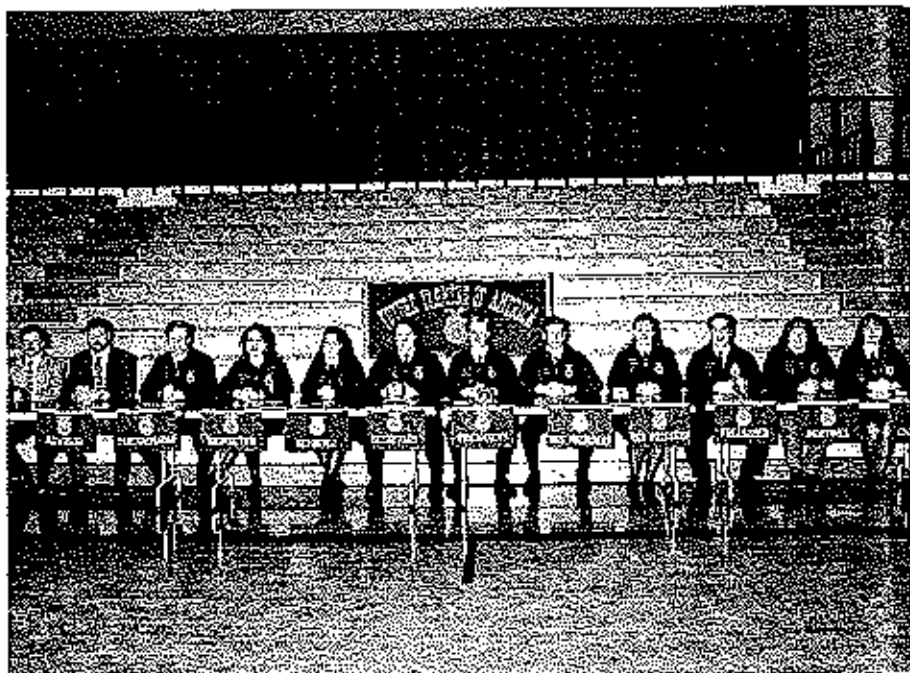
FFA Sports Largest Organization Membership

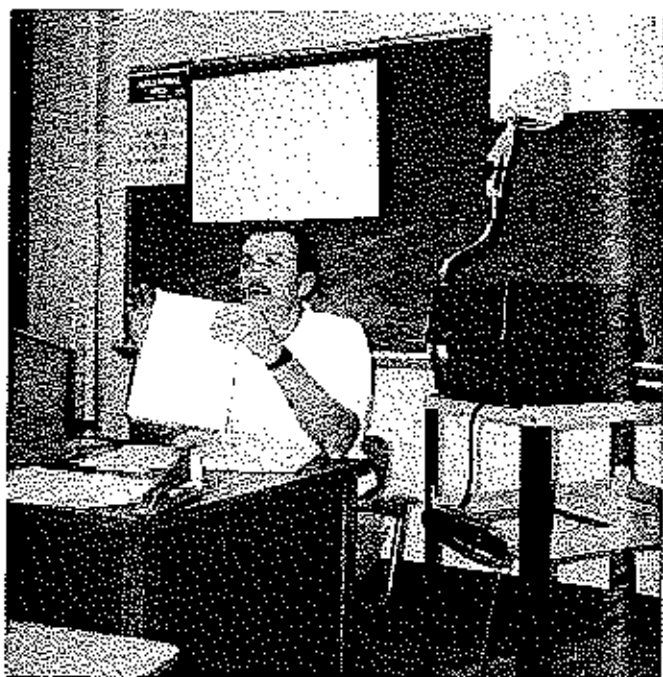

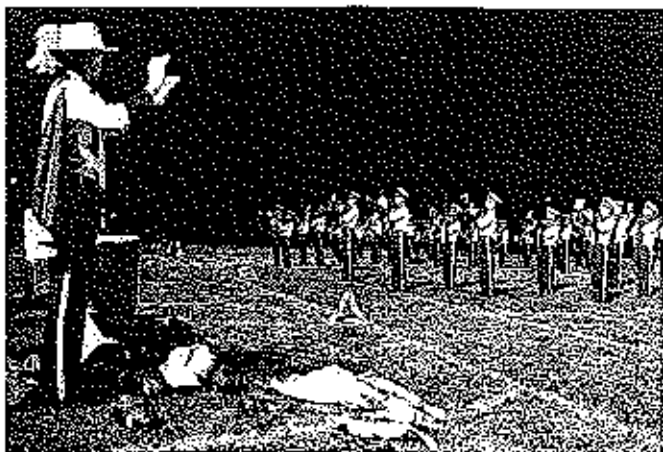

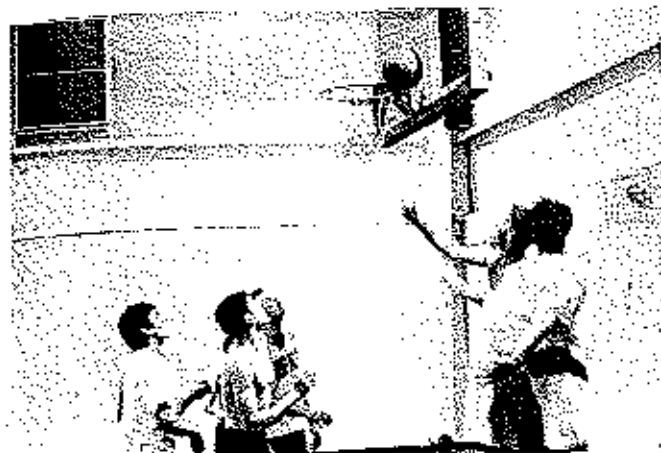

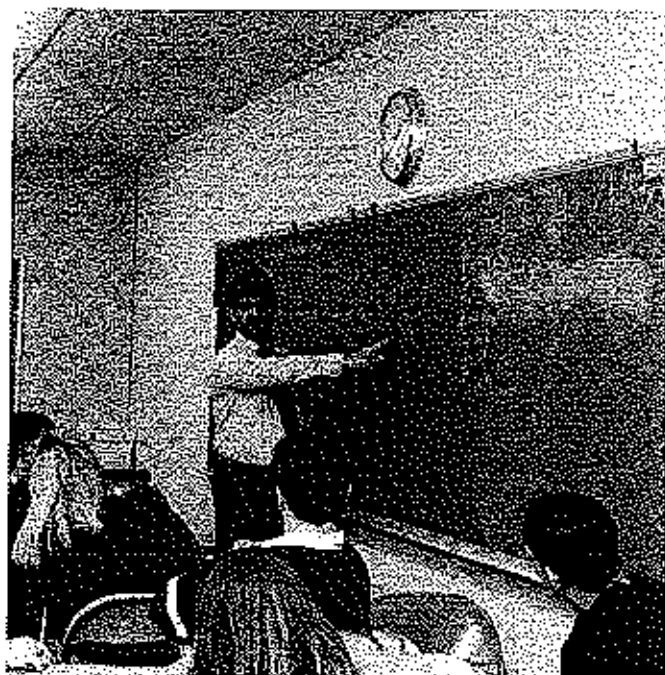

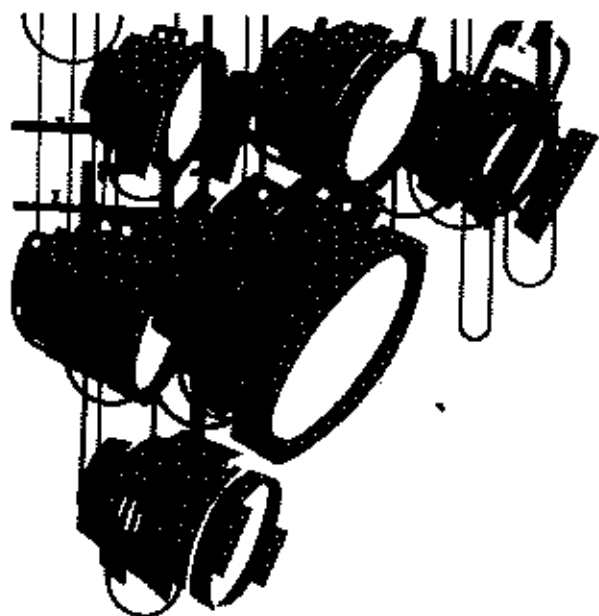

music department to successfully perform "Anything Goes." Prior to that, the department played "Arsenic and Old Lace." As with the musical, the cast did a good job with this mystery classic.



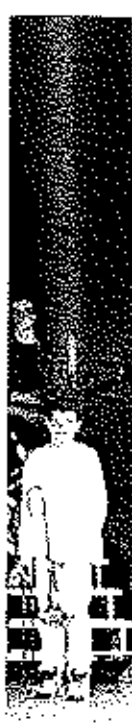

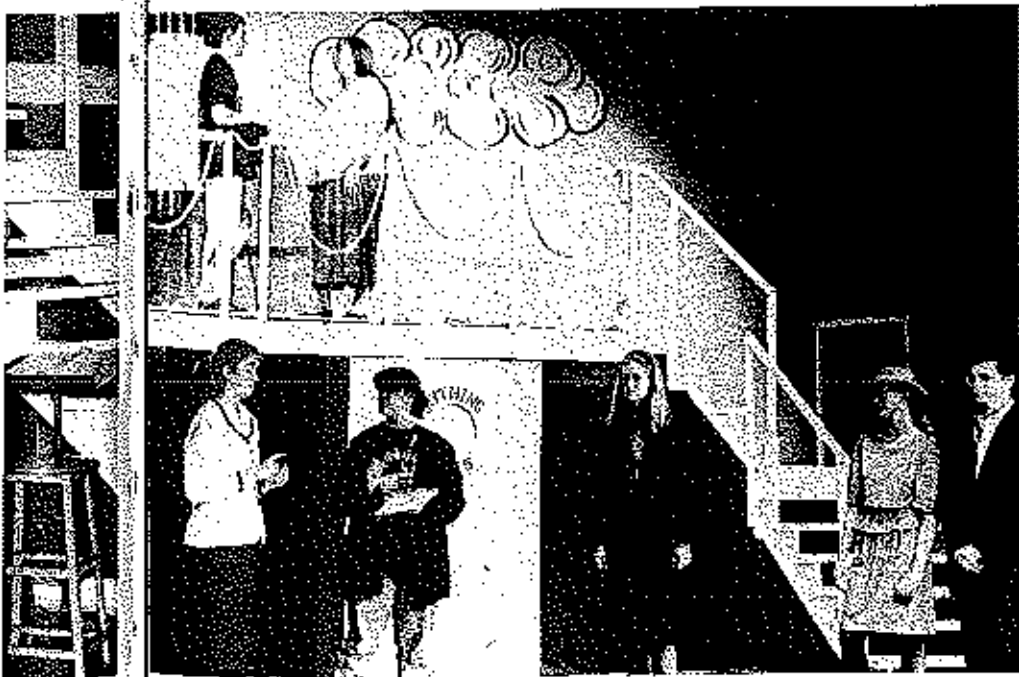

Telling the story of two sweet, not so innocent old ladies who take in boarders to supplement their income, mystery surfaces when bodies are discovered in the basement.

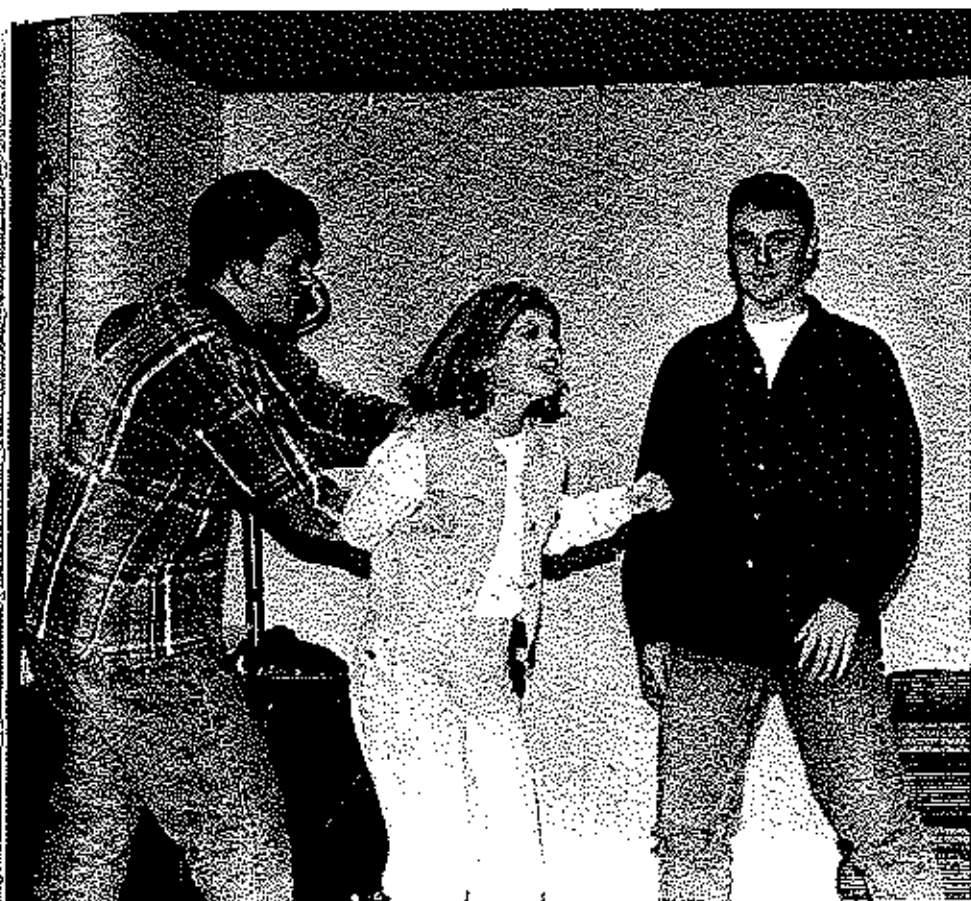
Eccentric characters add to the

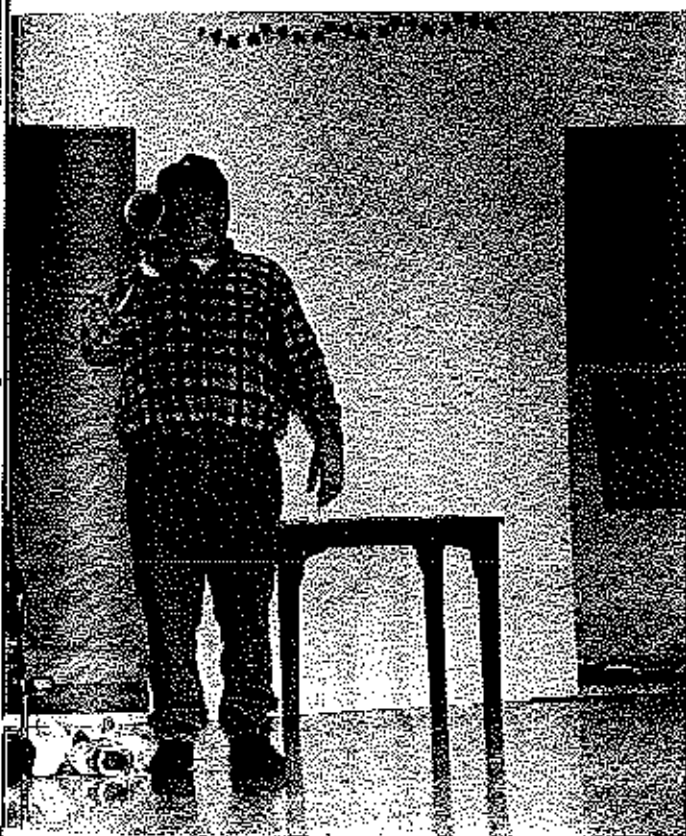

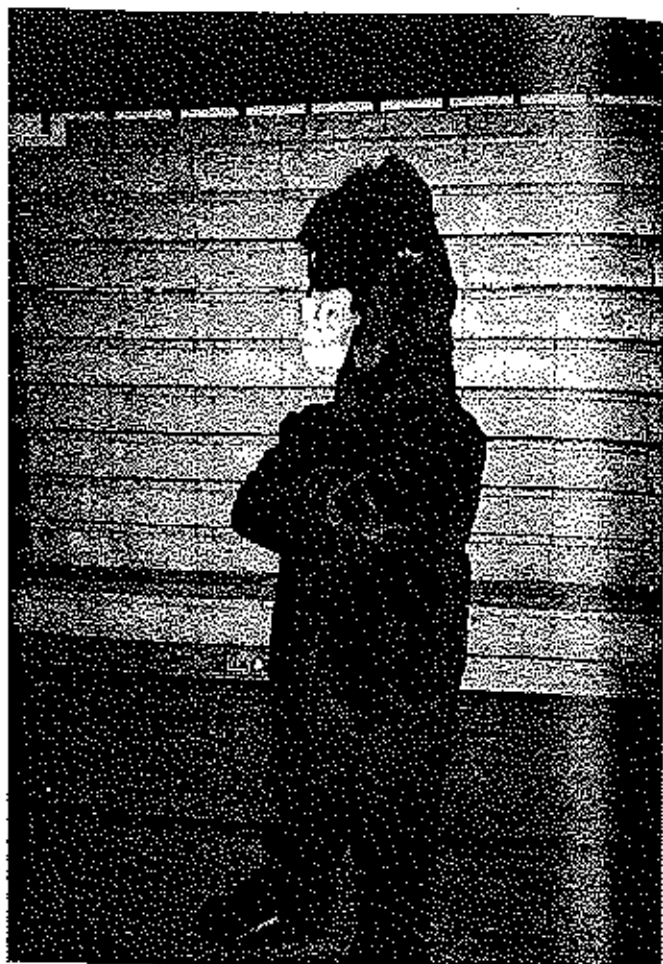

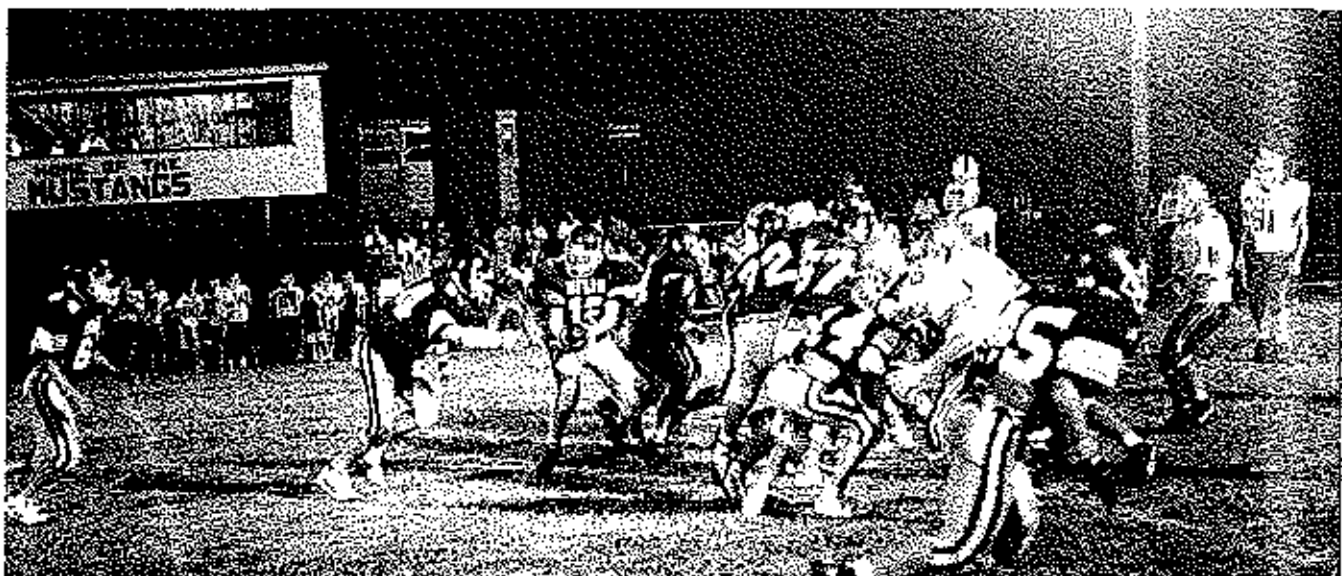

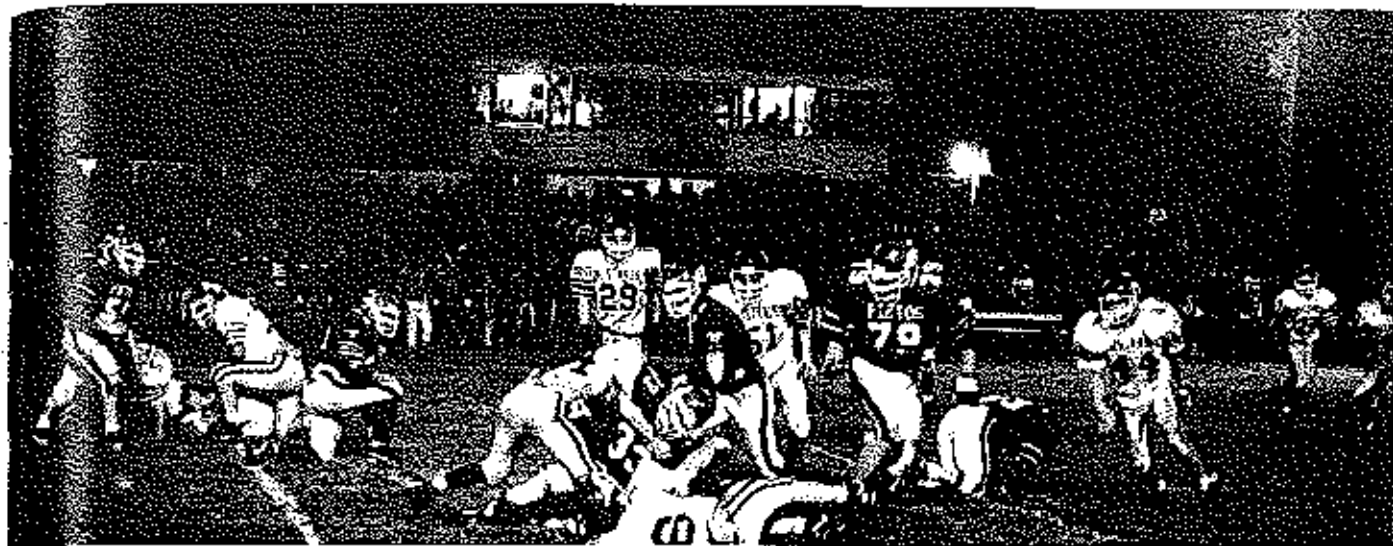

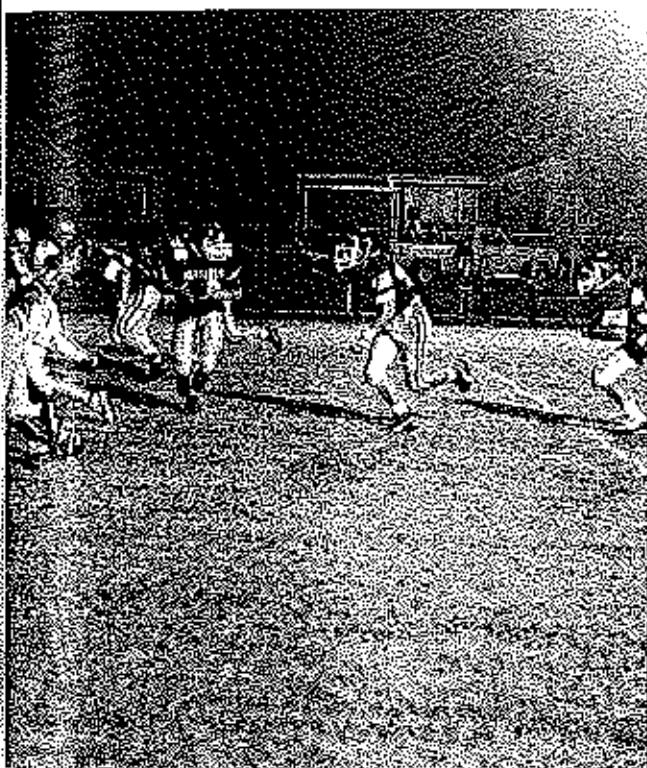

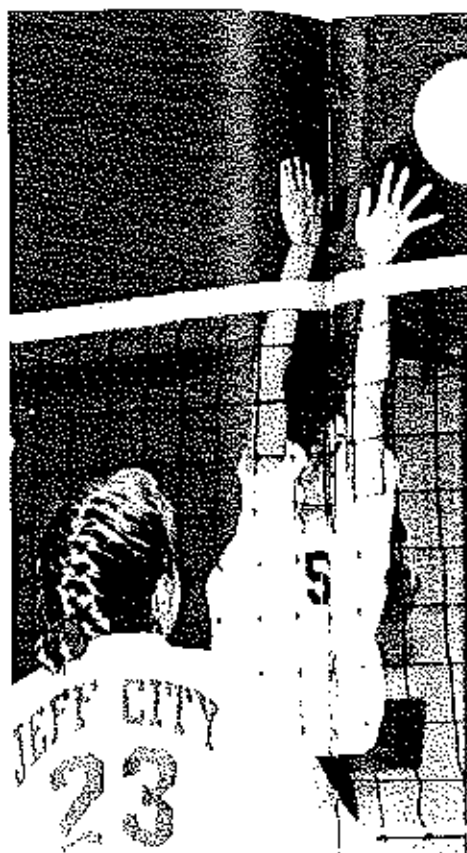

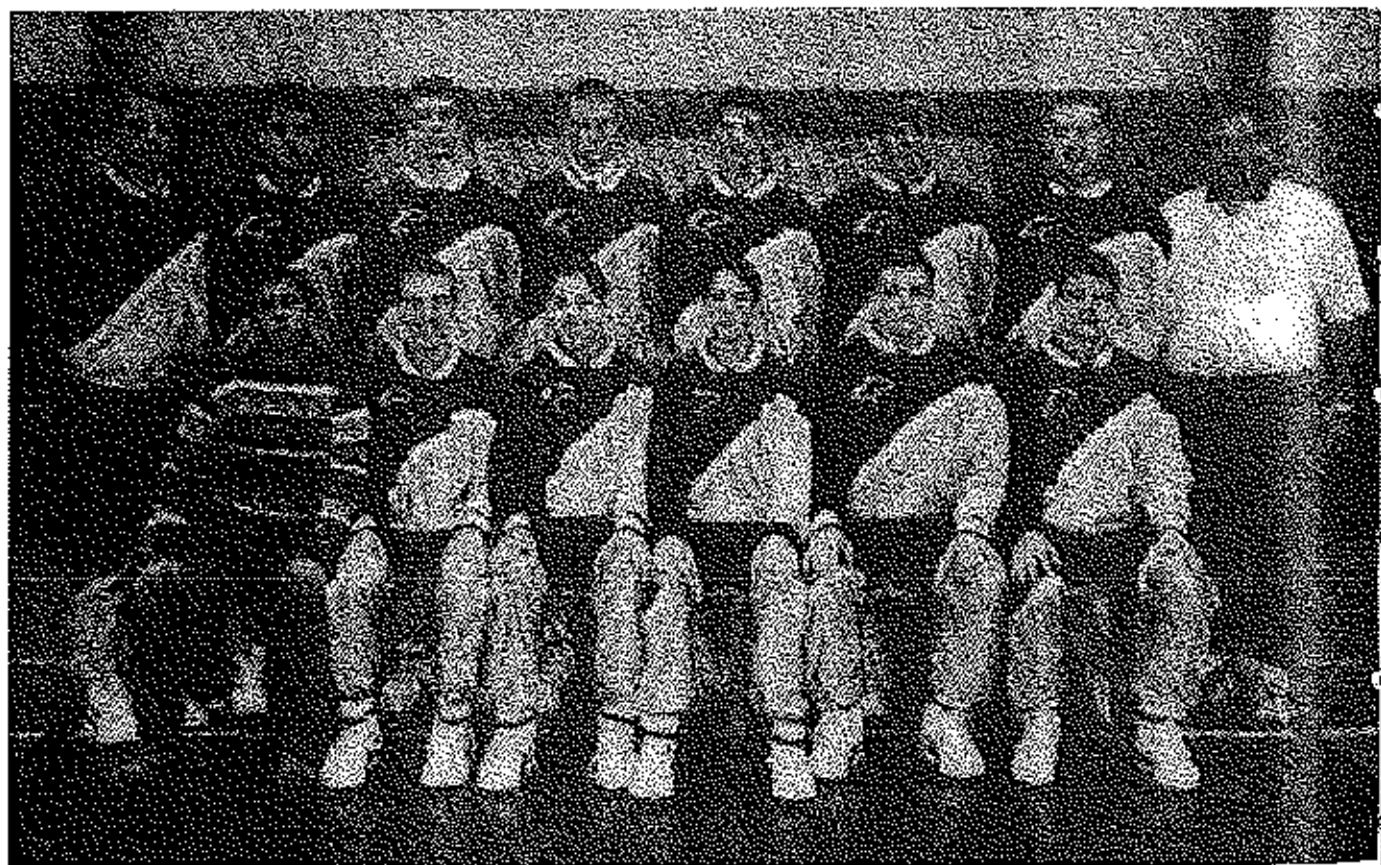

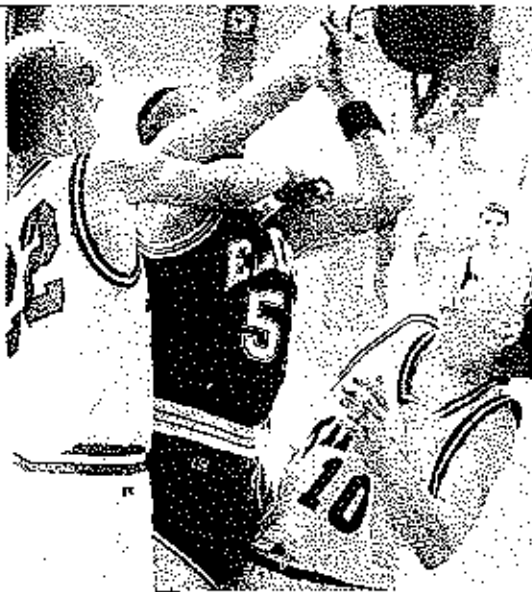

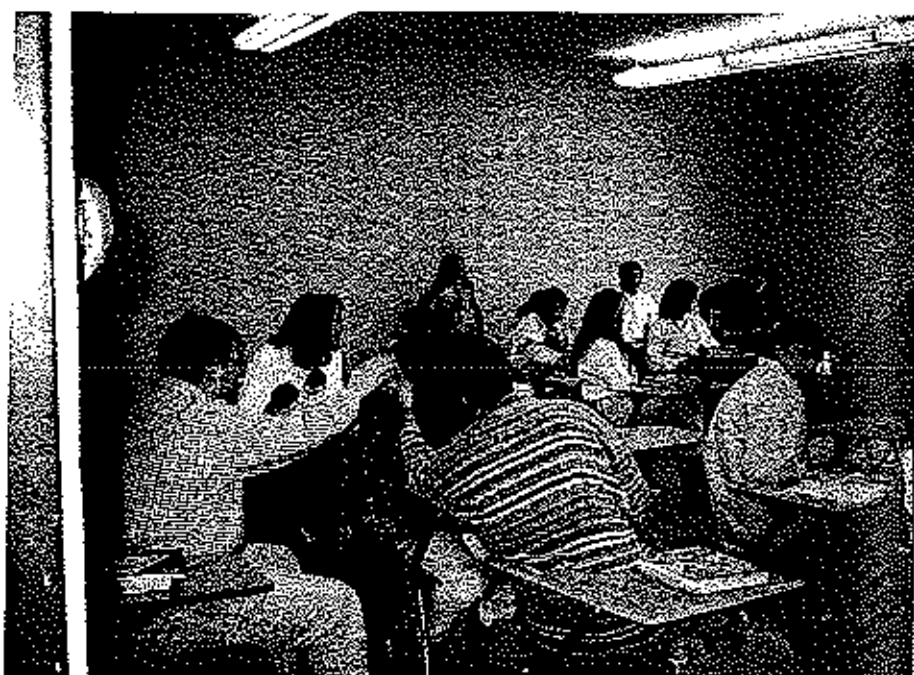

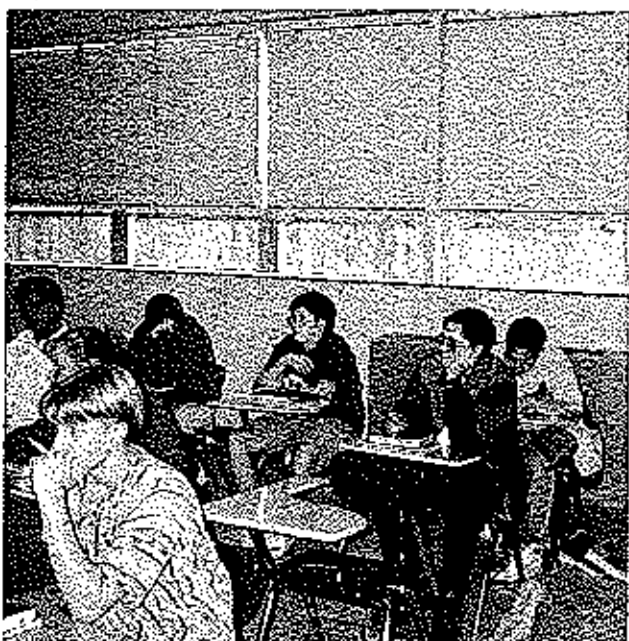

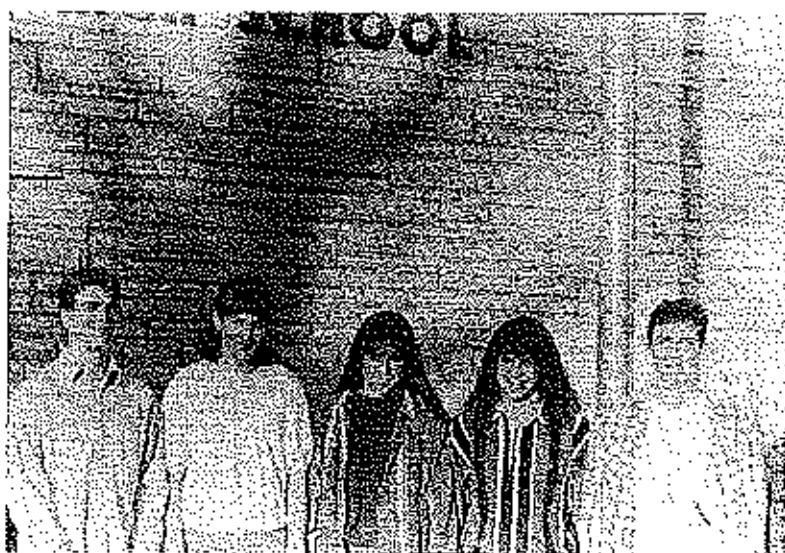

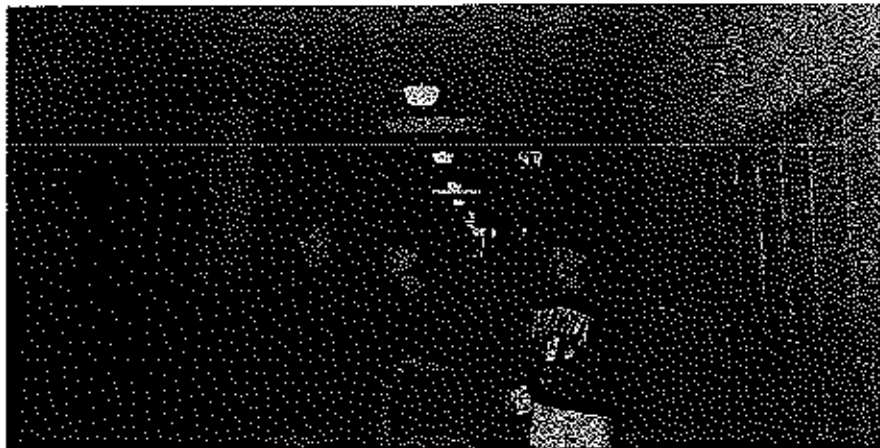

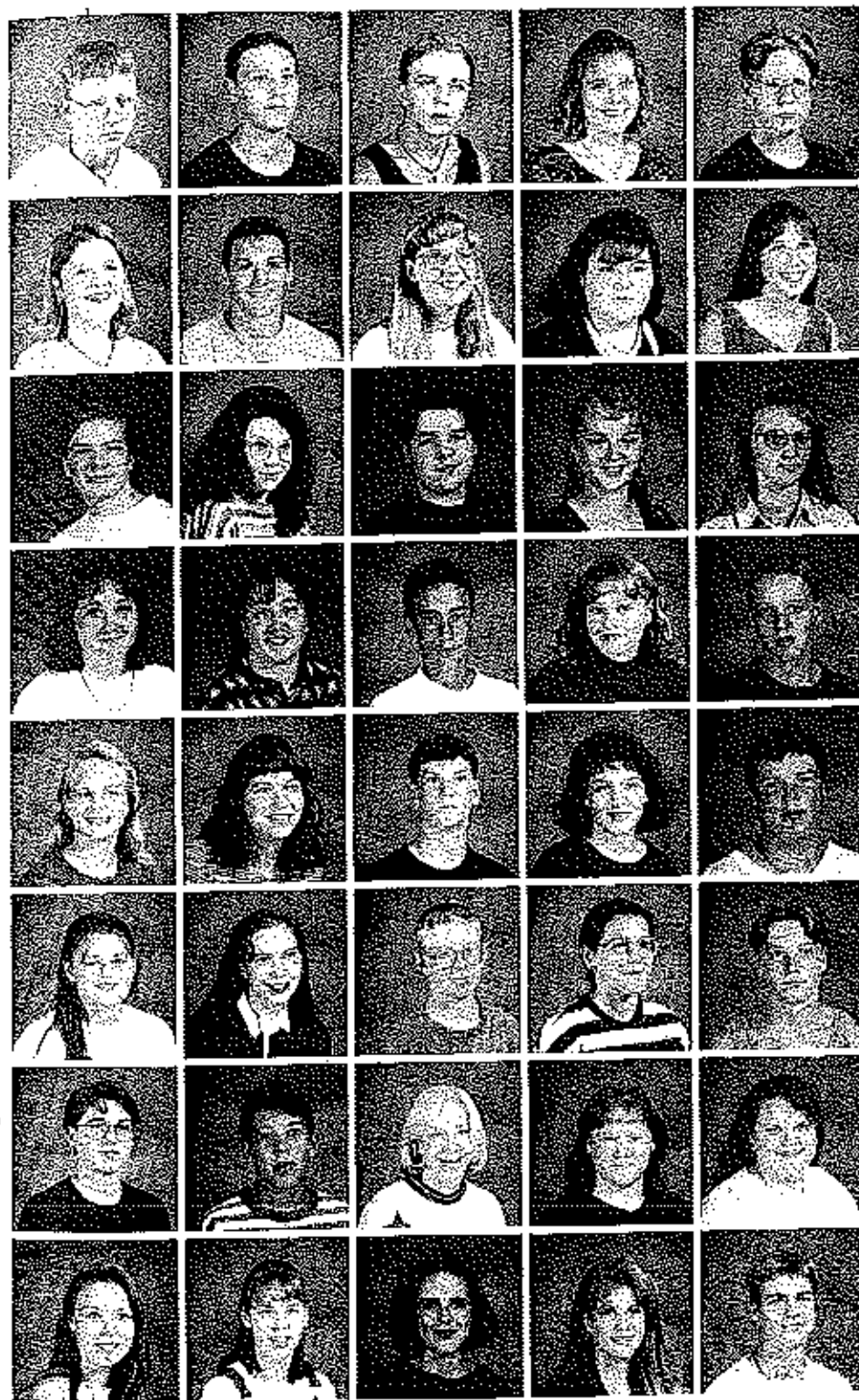

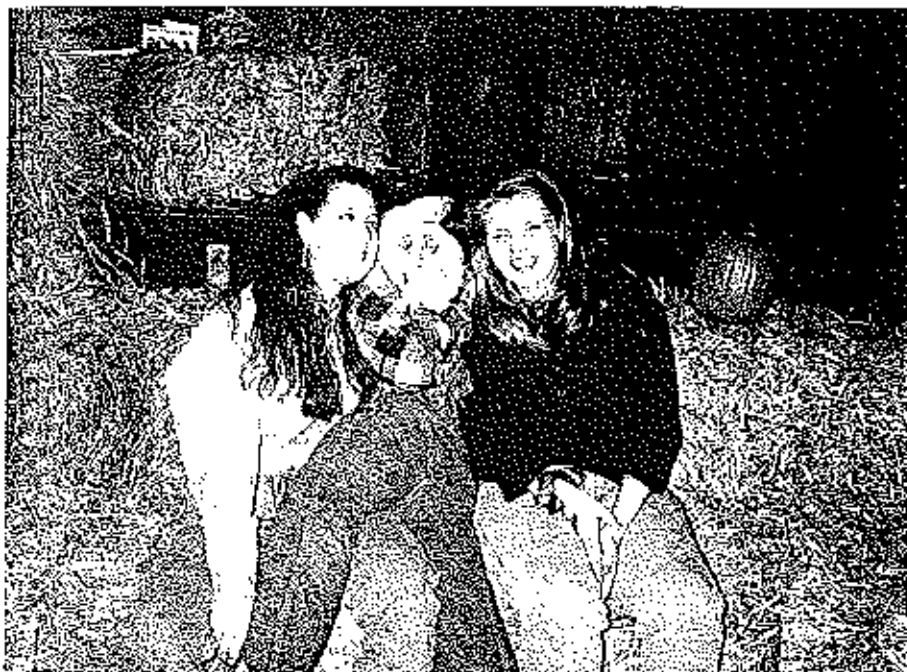

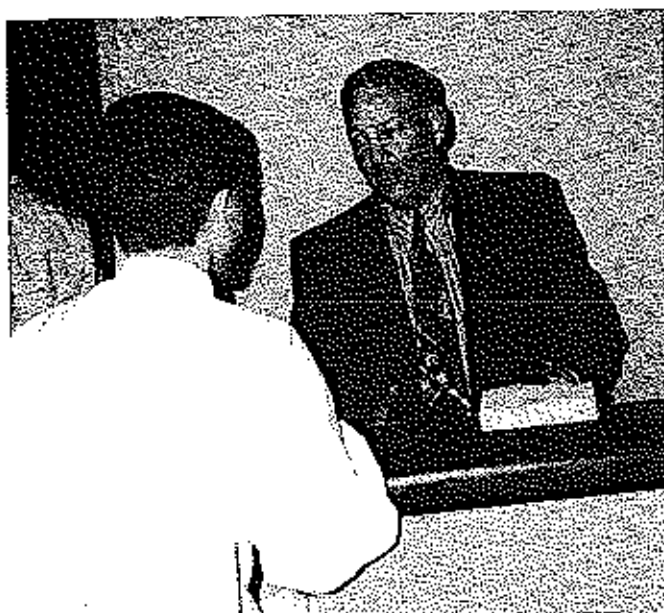

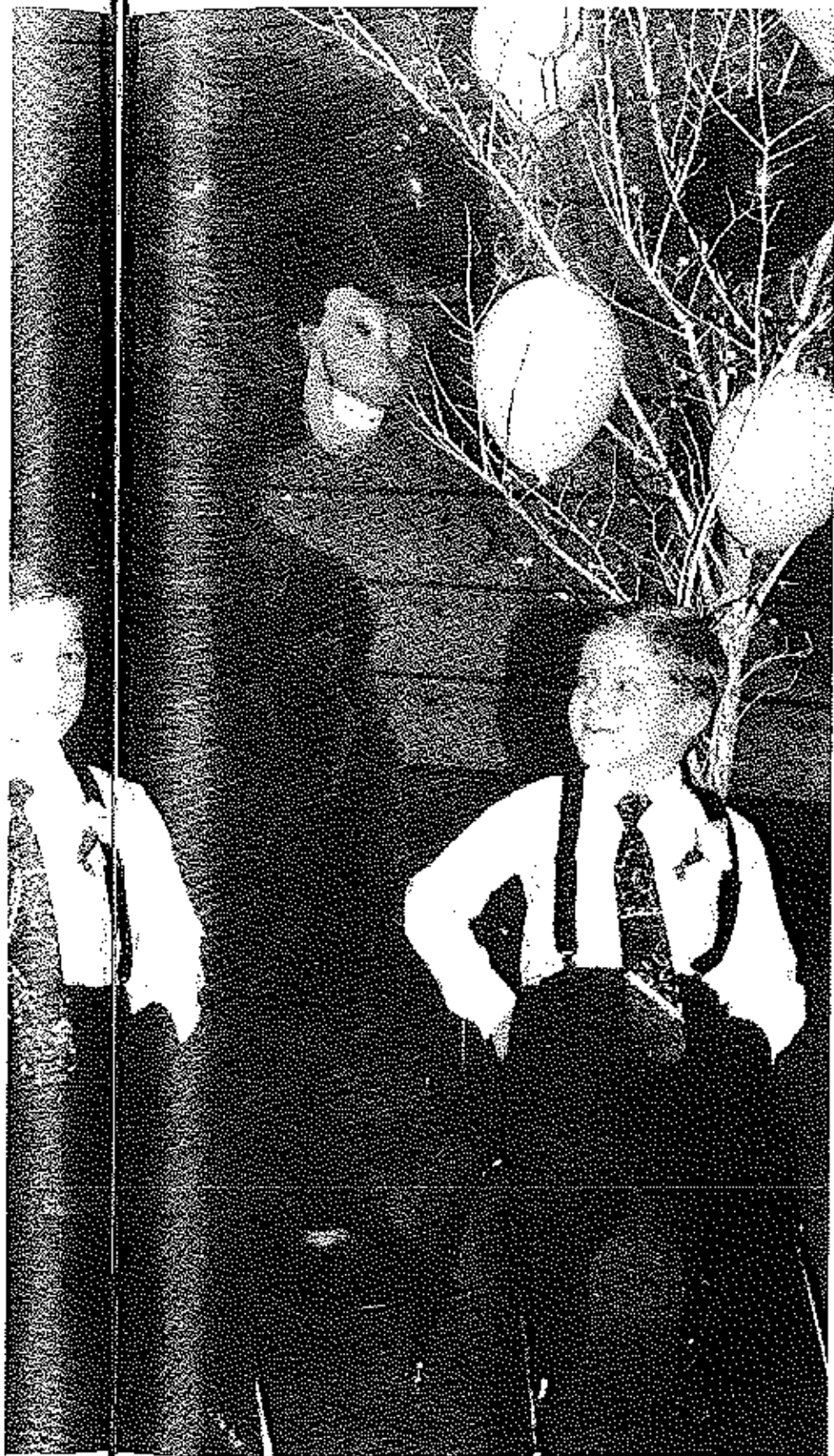

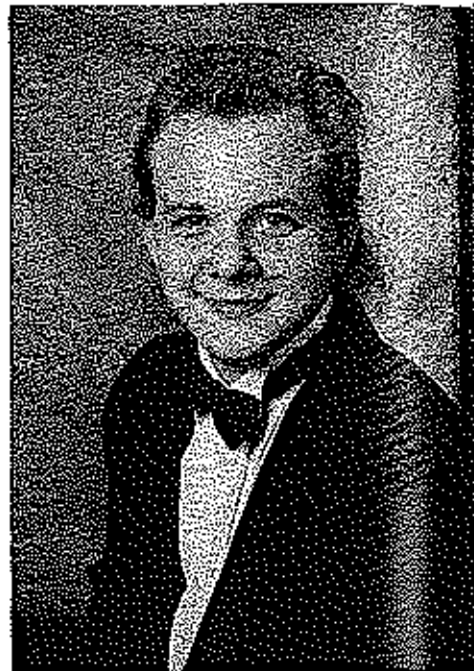

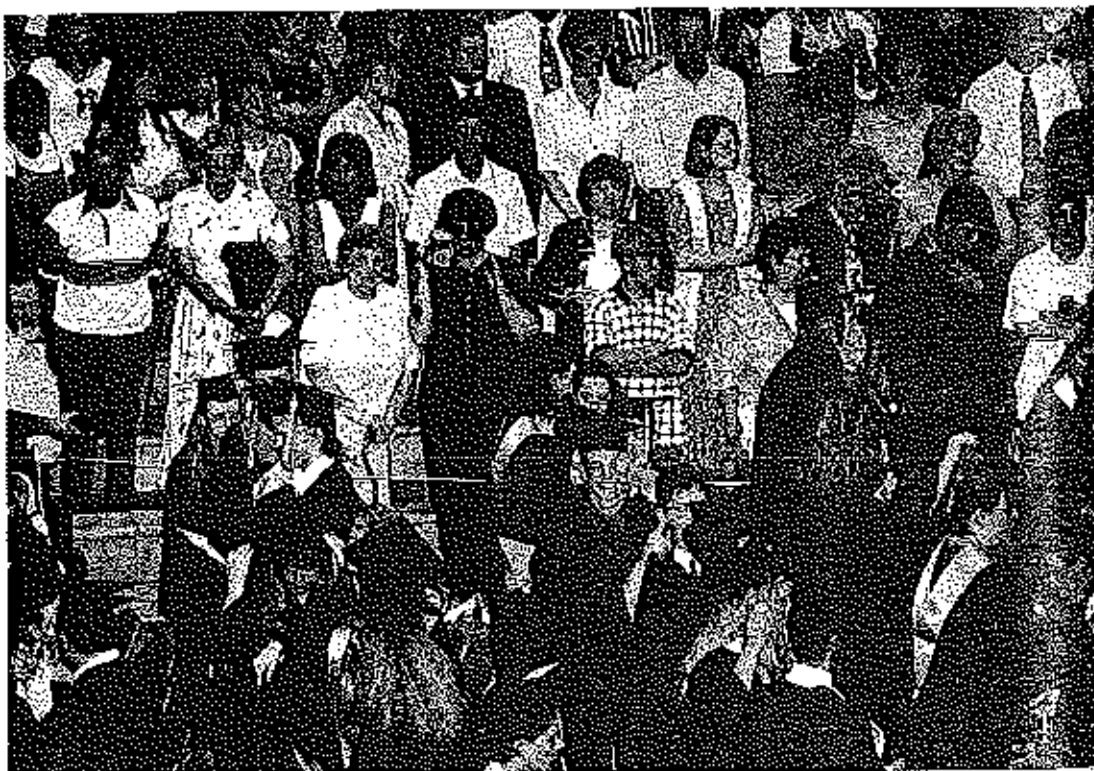

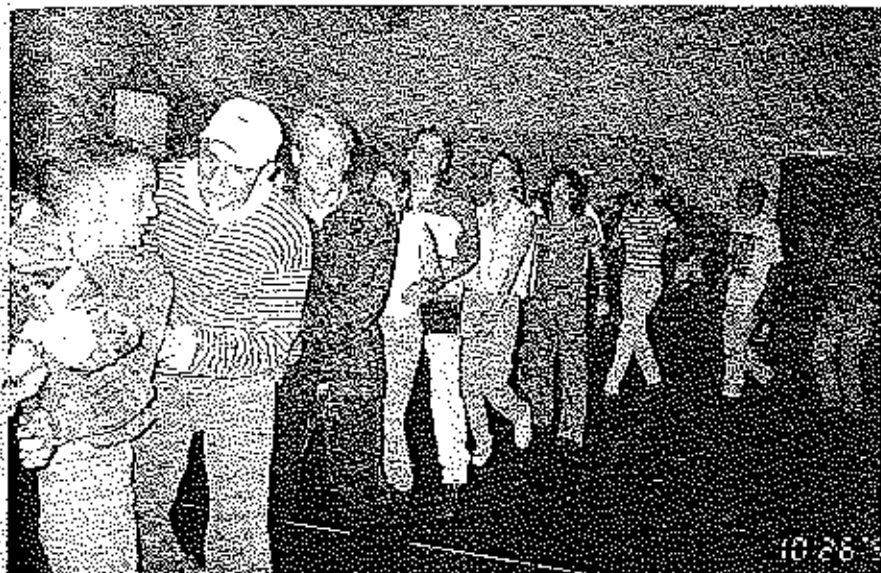

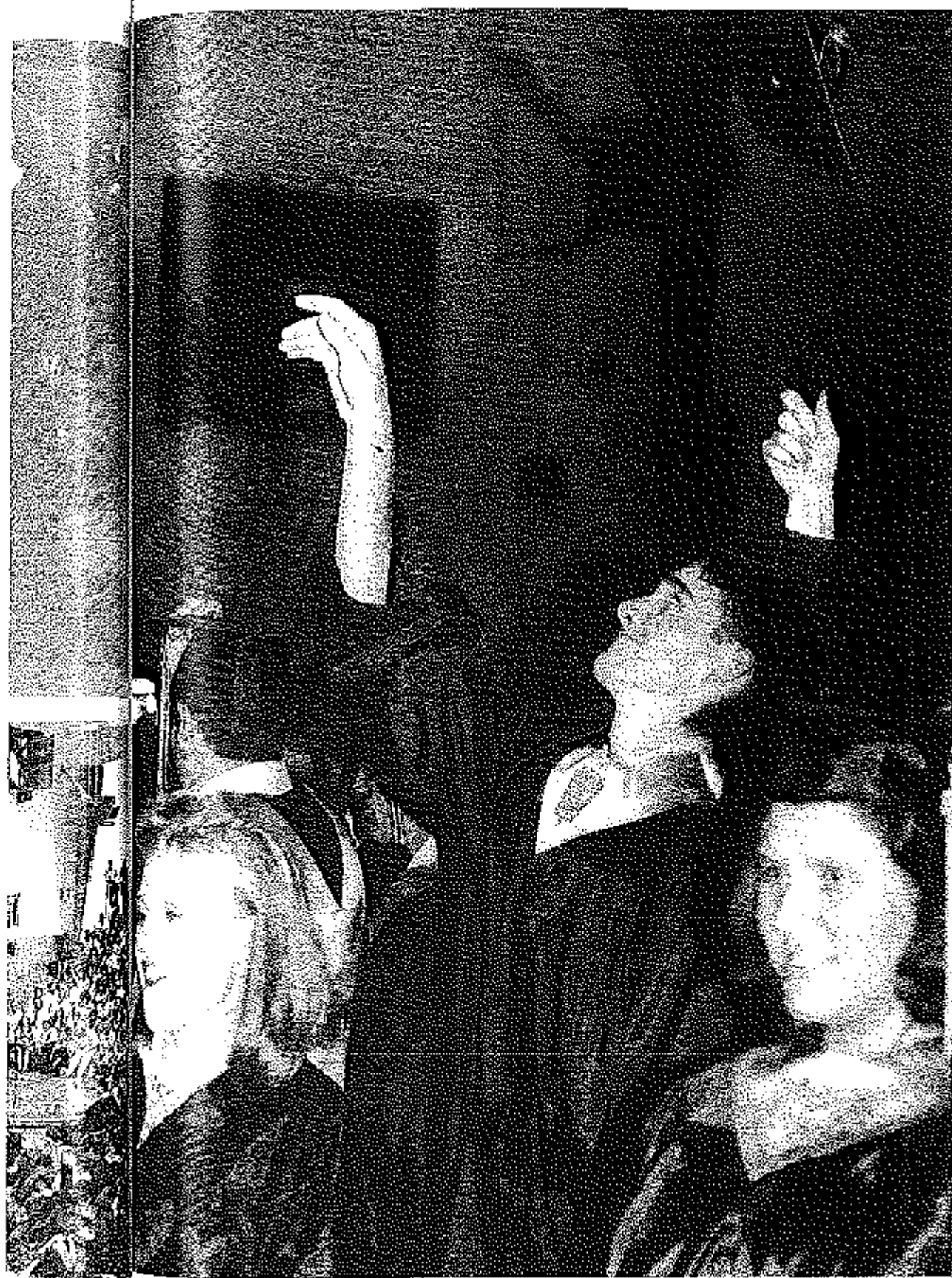

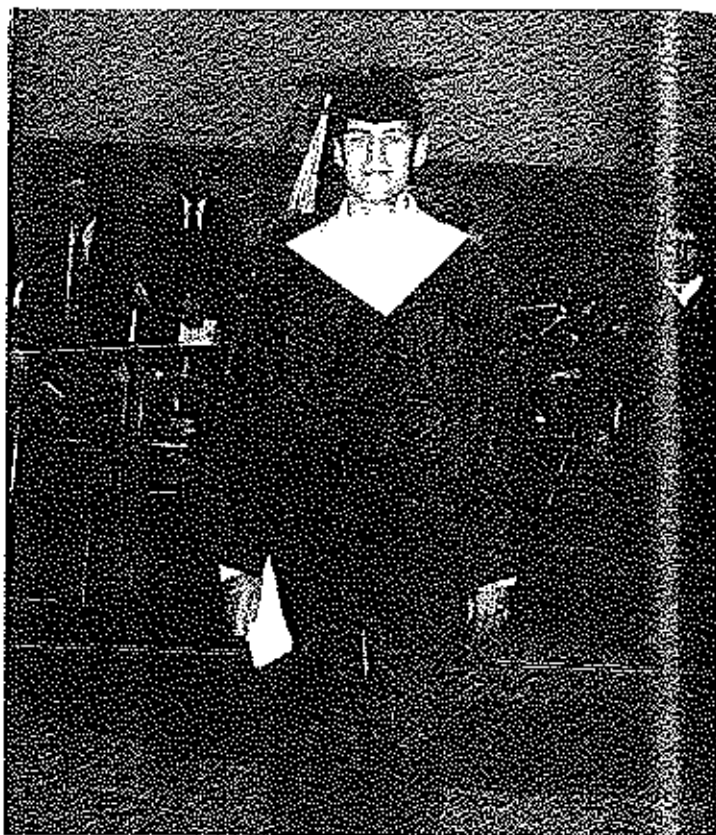

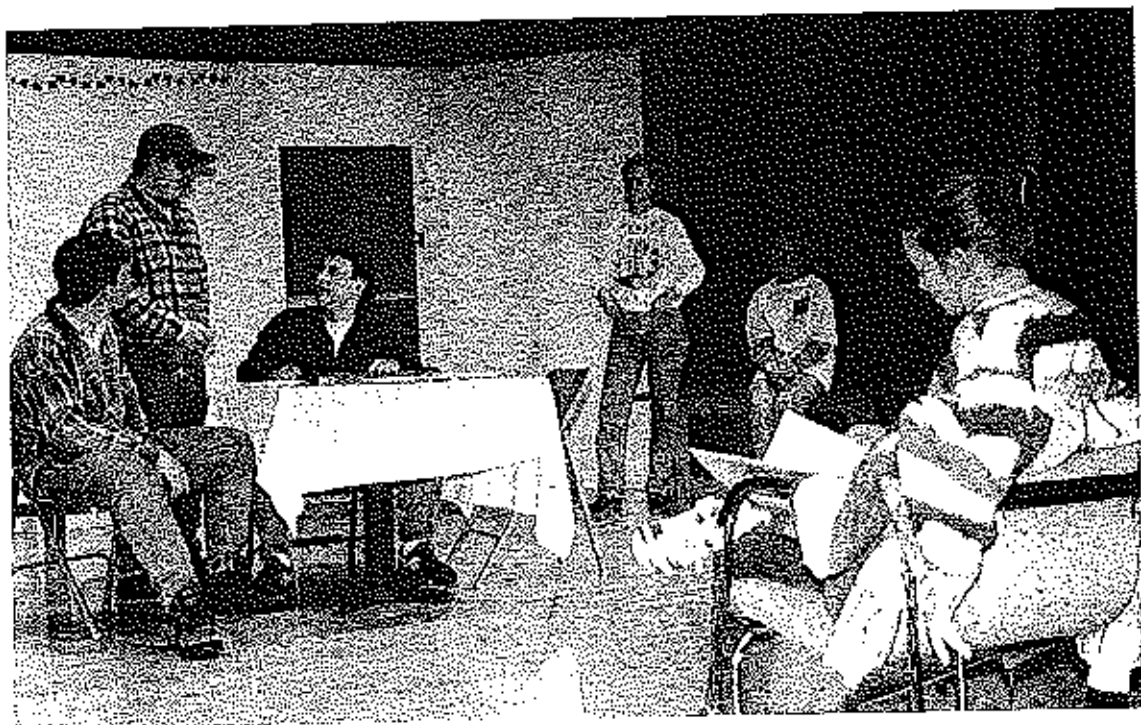

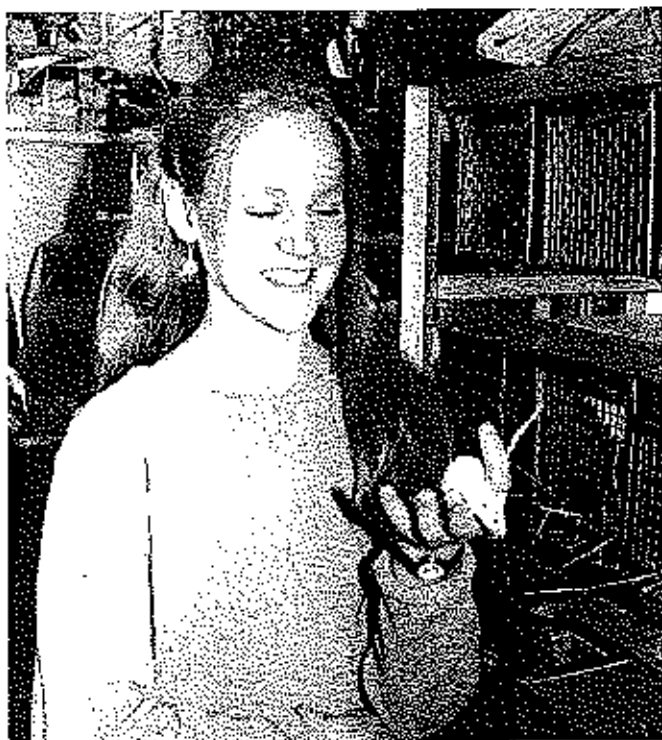
