Our cafeteria is a public place. It is used by the entire Eidon community for dinners, dances, and meetings; it is used by the entire district. We considered this as being critical to the selection of images. Our underlying character of Eidon is rural; it is a country town that still

holds to traditional values. Music is a traditional place of connection. It brings people together in fellowship. It is real, and people who make nusic are real. Those who dance, clap, and sing along are connected to everyone in the room. We chose the antique photo of the "Tadpole Dancers." They represent a time that our nation was united as the children in the circle. They are young, but the generation who plays the music is elderly. They are handing down and instilling in the young people a love for music, a feeling of joy,

celebration, and congregation. Interestingly, we discovered that the musicians actually did play for the Tadpole Dancers in the 1950s. The people in the painting are actual residents of the area; Leo Barnhart, guitar; Joe Jefferies, guitar; Eddie Cotton, banjo; Jimmy Stiles, fiddle; Wane Jarret, mandolin; and Sue Wineman, bass.

There is a feeling of a semi-circle as we stand in front of the mural. Those that understand the feetive occasion in the mural will understand as well that they complete the circle. The quote "What you do in your work hours determines what you have; what you do during your leisure hours determines who you are" is really the key to the picture.

The Fine Arts mural is Eidon. It is our beautiful countryside, actual places along Highway Y, Highway 54 and down Beacon Road. It is a hazy Ozark morning in early fall. It is the railroad and its influence on the community. It is the Lake and its influence on our leisure hours, our

economy, our landscape, and our lamilies. It is the turkey representing our wildlife and the turkey farmers, Turkey Festival, and turkey dinners. There is a fisherman holding a huge fish representing a local myth about the "catfish as big as a man." Our principal's face is shown on the fisherman's body.




ONDAY SOME


While Eidon High School students prepared their floats for the streets of Eidon, the Marching Mustangs were headed down the streets of Stockton in the Walnut Festival Parade.


Stadents from EHS helped out with the festivities. FFA worked the Kids' Corner, and some students dressed up as the famous turkeys Sassy and Strutter.


This play was not only a great experience for me, but it also gave a chance for some new actors to take the stage and show off some of their skills. We still saw some of the faces that we know all too well.


There was much preparation that went into the Judge's courtroom. Many hours were spent building, advertising, and getting the script in the actors heads and into the audience's ears.

Up to the last right of practice all of the actors hearts were pounding with excitement, and it all turned out great on stage opening right.




During the feast the choir served as entertainment singing several ballads. Several students also put on a puppet show.


Some audience members participated in the show. Mr. Wartin was brought on stage and wenched by the maids on the first evening's performance.
