



The pots were first put into the kiln to start the process. After 10-15 minutes of intense heat, the cover was lifted and students took their pots to a container of wood chips and straw. The containers were covered and the lack of oxygen caused color changes in the glaze. Then the students quickly took their pots to a bucket of water to stop the color from changing. After the pots were scrubbed, the vibrant reds and blues shined.

Ms. Gainey and her art students had a successful and fun day of pottery. "It was very interesting, and I thoroughly enjoyed the instant gratification of my finished piece of artwork," said junior Ashley Duncan.



FFA Members head to Chicago





State Proposes Cuts to Education Funding


Education funding became a critical topic for teachers, students, and parents as the Senate Appropriations Committee heard proposals to cut spending for the 2003-2004 school year. Under the proposal heard on April 14th, public schools and universities would face cuts between 10 and 15 percent during the next school year. Public elementary and secondary schools would lose \$275 million in state aid.¹

Superintendent Rodney Holley met with Board members and school administrators to discuss how these cuts would affect this district. According to Holley, "The Eldon R-I School District receives approximately 37% of total revenue from the state. When state funding is reduced, it affects our school district more than wealthier districts, but not as much as districts with less local wealth. In this geographic area the Eldon R-I District is affected more than some of our neighbors. Any time funding is reduced significantly enough to force budget cuts or to hinder the advancement of improvement it is an important issue. In order for the students of Missouri to compete in the World market, education should be a top priority when state monies are appropriated."²

Funding cuts threatened the livelihood of certain programs. Specifically, the French and gifted programs were listed as possible cuts. The alternative school was also a consideration. Administrators were hesitant to make decisions before the state budget had been finalized.

Parents of graduating seniors would also be affected by education cuts. The proposal included cutting the Bright Night scholarship from \$1,000 per semester to \$850 per semester. Likewise, students receiving funding from the A+ program would receive tuition but not books under the proposed plan.

Educators and parents were dismayed to hear that the school funding dilemma would probably continue over the next few years.

[A week was produced by three separate teams throughout the state. At least 31 died including 11 dogs in Missouri, 10 in Illinois and 13 in Tennessee.]


The first of the deadly storms to hit Missouri struck the Anderson area late Sunday evening between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. The tornado killed three people and left dozen's more injured. Emergency workers labored late into the night looking for survivors and clearing major debris. [including] trees and downed power lines.

The storm also caused damage in Laclede, Miller and Perry counties. In Pearce City, the damage was so devastating that residents questioned whether they would rebuild.

Students dug through the remains of their homes looking for their family mementos; they were struck with fear as siren warnings were issued Monday morning in several Mid-Missouri counties. Residents couldn't believe that they would be hit again.

On Tuesday afternoon, the weather siren sounded in Mid-Missouri. In Eldon the baseball team had to take cover in one of the elementary schools. Many other students took shelter at home. In Jefferson City, the sirens sounded as some elementary students were preparing to board the bus to home. Three schools decided to play the buses to keep the children safe from the storm.

Later in the week President Bush announced that federal aid would be available to 39 Missouri counties that had been severely damaged by storms. In Mid-Missouri, Camden, Miller and Morgan counties would qualify for the federal aid.
