



Jim Herriman and Amanda Herriman-Reichel have more in common than their father-daughter family connection; they are both published authors. Now they share a love for their family, a love for education, and also a love for telling a story. Amanda is a 2005 Eldon alum and the daughter of Jim and Clare Herriman, who have together served over 80 years in the Eldon School District.

Anyone who graduated from Eldon with Amanda will definitely remember the bubbly girl with the bright red hair who demonstrated a zest for life. Well, the hair and the zest for life are still the same. She strives to spread positivity in all that she does. Her achievements since then are devoted wife, loving mother, caring teacher and now...published author. Her book, My Word of the Year is available on Amazon.com. Asked how she chose the subject matter, Herriman-Reichel explains, "I have applied the practice of having a word of the year to my life since 2017. This concept allows my mind to hyperfocus on one central theme for an entire year."

Her parents taught her early in life the importance of setting goals and she has made it a lifetime practice. "A few years ago, I paired goal setting with my word of the year, and it has set my journey along a unique path to which I am forever grateful. I started 2021 with my word of the year, "Prayer." I also set three goals; one for the mind, one for the body, and one for the spirit. Her goal to develop her mind was to read one book per week, which would add up to fifty-two books by the end of the year. A goal for her body consisted of a nutrition plan, physical training, and weight loss. This plan would allow her to be ready to complete a half marathon. "My goal for spirit was to read the Bible from start to finish. This was the year that 'Prayer' allowed me to surpass my limitations so much that I felt a great calling to write this book."

As a wife, mother, and teacher, time spent writing must be accomplished with intentionality. "I spent every spare minute I had available working on this project, including several late nights." My Word of the Year was completed December of 2021. "I hope My Word of the Year brings readers inspiration and joy! I hope to get the opportunity to talk with my readers as I truly want to hear their word of the year and the three goals they have selected to pursue. I would also love to know that my book has inspired a more robust practice of prayer that sends my readers on their spiritual journey."

Amanda's newest book, published at the end of March 2022, carries the title, One Kid. One Word + Goals. One School Year. The book is a fictional

story for kids. The story is about a fourth grade boy who chooses one word and three goals for the new school year. After Herriman-Reichel came up with the storyline, she also decided to illustrate the book using her own ink drawings and watercolors. "This project stretched every creative muscle I possibly have to its limit, but I stayed focused on the ultimate goal: creating a book for children to enjoy reading."

The completion of her first book inspired her father, Jim Herriman to finish a book he had started 20 years prior. "There were things I saw in my job as a teacher and coach that I thought someone should write a book about," he explains. "Learn and Serve student Jordan Drake-Bysor typed a few chapters, however, had trouble reading my handwriting," he explains. So, Herriman put it on the back burner and didn't think about finishing it until Amanda published her first book and quickly began work on her second. Jim Herriman's book is named Eldon HIStory. It is a history of one teacher's journey in a school district over decades. Jim says he wants people to understand what educators go through. His hope is that every former Eldon student that reads his book, winds up taking their own walk down memory lane. Amanda considered it an honor to help her father self-publish his book. She remembers, "First, it started with a phone call, 'Amanda, I'm getting back to writing my book. Can you type it for me if I handwrite it on notebook paper?' Which resulted in a somewhat hesitant, 'Sure, Dad' response on my end," she explains. "After many phone calls, texts, and in-person typing sessions, we got all 20



We supported each other, and we lifted each other up. Truthfully, I don't recall having to ever shake anyone's hand and introduce myself until I went to college. Knowing everyone, made me feel safe. It is truly a comfort to feel as though you are amongst friends everywhere you go, and this is a luxury I will never take for granted."

Mrs. Herriman-Reichel also pours herself into her 3rd grade students whom she adores. After graduating from Eldon Herriman-Reichel furthered her education by attending William Woods University and double majoring in Elementary Education and Art Education. Later she obtained a Master's Degree in Athletic-administration and a Specialist Degree in School Superintendency, all from William Woods University. Her first teaching job was at the High Point R-III School District teaching art, computers and physical education. Gary and Amanda both teach for the California R-1 School District and their children are enrolled there as well. Addison is a second grader, Allison is in first grade and Aiden just started kindergarten this year.

The desire to become an educator started with her mentors who were her parents. Herriman-Reichel was born and raised an Eldon Mustang. "I will always love my hometown. She is the daughter

of Jim Herriman, a retired social studies teacher, former football coach, former administrator, and former school board president for the Eldon R-1 School District. Her mom is Clare Herriman, the current transportation director for Eldon Schools, and also former girls P.E. coach and athletic director. # Compassion in the Court


#### Jason Burks -'92

Caring for customers at an early age in the family business and appreciating the diversity of students throughout his Eldon school days, led Jason Burks on a path to become a criminal defense attorney and recently a judge. Judge Jason Burks is a 1992 Eldon graduate and has recently been appointed by the Chief Justice of Hawaii's Supreme Court as a per diem district court judge. Although he has achieved much, he was humbled and appreciative to be chosen as a feature in the Maroon and Gold Alumni magazine.

Burks is the son of Redus and Rita Burks. Jason transferred to the Eldon School District in 1980 after attending kindergarten in Iberia. His eldest brother Randy was a graduate of Iberia High School and Darryl was a 1982 Eldon graduate. Their early years were spent on his family's farm outside Iberia. He also recalls spending much time in the aisles of Mid-Missouri Office Equipment and Supply, which his parents owned and operated in Eldon. The interconnection with customers had a great impact on his life. "For as long as I can remember I was interacting with customers at the store and helping them. I could operate a cash register, typewriter, photocopier and even the early personal computers by the time I started second grade. Having that early and constant influence of technology in my life, along with the human interactions I had with customers of all kinds of backgrounds, I believe has helped me tremendously get to where I am today." The work ethic and carry family culture forwarded by his family had great influence on Burk's life. "I couldn't have done it without any one of them. They are all among not only the smartest people I know, but also the most compassionate. And it's that compassion for people that I admire the most and strive to replicate."

Burks points to two Eldon High School teachers who had a



significant impact on his life, speech and debate teacher, David Bailey and math teacher, Merle Matzen. From Mr. Bailey, he received speaking and debate skills which he would skillfully use in his future career. "Mr. Bailey really encouraged me and I think it was from debate where I first got the idea that maybe I would go to law school. Prior to that I don't remember having any ambitions in law." He admired the calm, no nonsense teaching demeanor of Mr. Matzen. "If I ever didn't understand anything, he could always find a way to help me understand. And he never seemed to get frustrated with anything. I always strive to have a temperament like him."

Burks believes that being raised in a small town helped him in life as well as his career. In a large city, students usually group by special interests or socio-economic position. "Growing up in the small town there was essentially one school. Whether you were rich or poor; Catholic or Protestant; athletic, musical or an academic; you all go to the same school and have classes together. I think having that experience is invaluable." He believes the close relationships that were formed in Eldon helped him understand people better. "Throughout my career in law I think while my clients may not look like me or have the same background as me, they can tell I still understand and can relate to their situation and where they come from."

After graduating from Eldon, Burks first attended Southwest Missouri State University (now Missouri State University) in Springfield. He didn't feel like he belonged there though, and transferred to the University of Missouri-Columbia for his sophomore year. While attending M.U. he had the opportunity to study in Mexico. He says learning a new language and experiencing a completely different culture gave him a taste for adventure and he was hooked. After returning from Mexico, he finished his last two years at Mizzou, graduating in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in international studies with an emphasis in business administration and Latin America. Next came major decisions about where to attend law school. He was accepted to Washington University in St. Louis, University of San Diego, and Loyola Marymount in Los Angeles as well as being wait-listed at the University of Hawaii. "I had never been to Hawai'i and really knew very little about it, so I decided I would go to San Diego and I bought my tickets and started looking for apartments. Then over the summer I got a call from Hawai'i that I had been accepted and they offered me a spot in the fall. Hawai'i was the smallest law school in the nation at that point and it was very difficult to get in if you were not a Hawai'i resident. The offer was too good to pass up, so after talking over the

opportunity with his parents, he accepted the Hawai'i opening, packed his two bags and guitar and made the transition to Aloha State in Oahu where he knew not one person.

After a few days in a hotel, he found an apartment and dove into the culture of Hawai'i. "A lot of people who come from the mainland really have a hard time living here because so many things are so different. The food is different. The way people speak is different. The music is different. I fell in love with the food, people and culture here and knew at that point this was where I would be for a while."

Burks would spend the next three years devoting his time to law school. When he graduated in 1999, he took a judicial clerkship with a judge who was on the First Circuit Court of Oahu. The clerkship gave him the opportunity to see actual law practice and criminal jury trials. It was the catalyst for his decision to become a criminal defense attorney. Practicing criminal law was his avenue to conduct trials in the courtroom. "I liked the idea of helping people who were in trouble. Most of the people charged with crimes are not bad people, but people who have made bad decisions or have had a lot of other bad breaks in their past that have led them to where they are. And most of them are underdogs and don't really have anyone rooting for them to fix their problems." As a criminal defense attorney he was able to make a difference in the individual lives of people. He has been truly inspired by some of the clients he has helped. "Seeing a client who ended up in jail with a severe drug habit work hard to achieve two years of sobriety and get her children back from CPS is pretty heroic and inspiring to me."

After finishing his clerkship he was hired by the state public defender's office and the




position was in Hilo on the Big Island of Hawai'i. Once again, Burks packed his bags and headed to a new job and a new town. Hilo was a much smaller town with a more rural feel than Honolulu. While in Hilo at the public defender's office he started doing traffic cases and misdemeanors. Through his experiences he developed a yearning to become a judge. In Hawai'i judges are appointed and not elected. As a per diem judge Burks doesn't have to sit full time so he can maintain his private law practice, as long as he doesn't take any cases that are heard in the district court. The district court handles general traffic cases, misdemeanors, small claims, and landlord-tenant cases. The district court does not do felony cases or any jury trials, nor family court/divorce/custody cases. "So presently I sit on the bench in district court 5-10 days per month and the remaining time I am handling felony cases in circuit court as a defense attorney.

After moving to Hilo, Burks married Tammy, and the couple had a son, Ethan. Two and a half years after moving to Hilo, Burks got the opportunity to transfer back to Oahu. In 2003, the family moved to Oahu. Burks says

he began climbing his way up the ladder to felony jury trials and to the top level of trial attorneys who defended class A felonies and murder cases. In 2009, he and Tammy divorced, but remained good friends and co-parented Ethan. After 10 years in the public defender's office, Burks decided to go out on his own in 2011, taking his first case as the law office of Jason R. Burks. He still operates the office. His son graduated from Iolani High School on Oahu in 2019 and presently attends the University of Hawai'i studying computer science. Ethan took the opportunity to study abroad in Paris during the most recent winter/spring semester. "Of any of my achievements, he is by far the one I am most proud of. He amazes me in some way almost every day."

When not being a judge or an advocate, Burks has a variety of interests that help him relax. In his free time he enjoys playing music, specifically guitar. He is so invested in his music that he turned an extra bedroom in his house into a studio and guitar room. Traveling is also an adventure he enjoys, over the last five years Burks has taken six trips to various places in Europe, as well as Japan. Burks is a busy man and doesn't get the chance to travel to central Missouri that often, but when he does, he always tries to meet up with high school friends. "Thanks to Facebook and social media I have been able to keep in touch with a lot of my friends and classmates and always enjoy seeing what is going on in their lives. Upon graduating, she attended the University of Missouri to study Agricultural Education, but before long, she followed her heart to Alabama for the Ramp School of Ministry. This is where she would meet her now husband, Jonathan Quezada. After spending a year in Houston, TX working for Hurricane Harvey relief programs, Jonathan and Arika decided Eldon would be a great place to start a family.

There's no question if you apply yourself in school, you will gain something that can be carried for the rest of your life. It might be knowledge, friendships, skills or even life passions. Arika Quezada (Myers) is now building a local business and life around the

The following is a brief look into Arika's dream and what inspired her to make it come to life... literally.

I wasn't raised in a farming family. I would say my desire to garden was ignited during my high school years. My junior year I joined our FFA chapter in due diligence to my best friend, who had just become the chapter president. The doors that were opened to me out of that decision were innumerable. I experienced great success with contest teams, where I developed skills in communication and public speaking. I was also introduced to the work of the greenhouse.

Eldon's FFA chapter hosts an annual plant sale to raise money. The students have the opportunity to learn some of the ins and outs of raising plants: planting, watering, fertilizing, pruning and selling.

There is something to be said about the power of a planted seed. I do believe that a seed was planted in me during that season that I



couldn't ever quite shake. My journey has led me down many different paths since high school, but I am thrilled that I somehow managed to find my way back to Eldon, MO where it all started.

Last Spring, we built two little raised garden beds and threw a whole mess of seeds in there to see what would happen. At some point last Summer, I knew it needed to be bigger. I was stirred very deeply to make a greater impact in our community. If you haven't noticed, our little town is quickly developing into a thriving place to be. I have a strong entrepreneurial spirit, so my mind was constantly racing as to what we could contribute. What I learned is that the best thing we can each contribute is something we are passionate about.

Gardening is way more to me than just sowing and reaping. A garden is a place to connect with the earth and with family. My biggest joy in this endeavor is watching my two children soak up each moment. How much richer an education on creation than to dig in the dirt with bare hands. How better to learn the value of hard work than to relish in the fruits of vour labor.

But it's also more than that...

I want to inspire others to take the risk, do the hard things, find their passion and make it happen. want to show people that you don't have to have a 300 acre property to have a farm. You can do it with a borrowed backyard. I purposely named our business Four Loves Urban Farm to break down a few of those boxes around farming. No, we don't live in an urban area. But for our little farming community, a farm in the middle of town is a bit unconventional.

This is only my first year, so I am definitely still in the learning and experimental process. I wish I could put the vision in my head for this business into proper words. There is so much that I want to offer our community through this journey, and I cannot wait for you to see it unfold! There is much to be said about the verse in the Bible which says to "not despise these small beginnings". (Zechariah 4:10) I am thankful for the seed that was planted in me all those years ago, and I am thankful to be in a position where I can "plant it forward".

Located on 7 Hawkeye Lane in Eldon, Missouri is a family owned business called DeGraffenreid Heating and Cooling. It is owned and operated by David Jr. and Cherish DeGraffenreid. Since I grew up in Eldon, I already knew a lot of people who live in the area. My family already had a few businesses around the area, so I knew a lot of people from that".

After working for one Heating and Cooling Company around the area, the DeGraffenreid's eventually decided that they wanted to open their own heating and cooling business. When asked why DJ wanted to open his own business he said, "I have seen other companies around the area that



"The cave is an important piece of history, and we see ourselves as caretakers for a moment in time" he says. He went on to add that Stark Caverns has served many purposes in the local area over the last 100 years, and has recently become an important employer in the Eldon area. Lastly, in the words of Jeff, "how could you pass up the opportunity to own your own cave?"

Additionally, Jeff enjoys more about Eldon than just the caverns itself. The town holds a special place in his heart, and what he loves most about working here is nothing short of heartfelt. 
