

Sarah is the Manager of Business Services for the Eldon School District.

Ken fondly recalls his time at Eldon High School, cherishing memories of teachers like John Dowler, Coach Hodge, Roger McCreery at the Middle School, and John Murphy. He attributes his positive experiences and lifelong love for Eldon to the good people and friendly business community he encountered daily. This sense of community has kept Ken rooted in Eldon throughout his life.

One of Ken's greatest passions is building houses, a hobby he has pursued with enthusiasm. Since starting remodeling houses in 2003, Ken has constructed many homes in Eldon, with his family contributing in various capacities. This

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

Growing up in Eldon and attending school from K-12, Jonathan's journey from a small-town athlete to a distinguished orthopedic surgeon is an inspiring tale of dedication, hard work, and a passion for giving back. Jonathan's formative years were marked by a deep involvement in sports, participating in football, basketball, and track at Eldon High School (EHS). His brothers Scott and Stephen also graduated from EHS, making the Granthams a prominent family within the school community. "I loved sports and the camaraderie that came with it," Jonathan recalls. "The experiences of laughing, dreaming, competing, encouraging, and occasionally getting into trouble with friends are memories I cherish deeply."

After graduating from EHS in 1986, Jonathan pursued a six-year medical program at the University of Missouri Kansas City, where he obtained his MD degree. His medical journey took a pivotal turn during his surgical internship at the Naval Medical Center San Diego, where he met his wife, Angela. The couple married in 1994 and embarked on a remarkable journey together.

This honor reflects her extraordinary contributions to the Eldon School District and her impact on the community. As Harwood retired from her role as principal of Eldon High School at the end of the school year, she leaves behind a legacy of remarkable achievements and heartfelt dedication.

Kris Harwood is the daughter of

Doug and Lois McConnell. She has two sisters, Angela Rush and Kim Mueller, and one brother, Doug McConnell, Jr. Harwood's father worked as a flight engineer for TWA, leading the family to move several times. Born in Kansas City, she spent a few years in Oregon before returning to Missouri, finally settling in Eldon at the age of ten.

Reflecting on her path to education, Harwood shared, "I received an excellent education, graduating Salutatorian from Eldon High School, Class of 1988. I knew I wanted to work with kids and have a schedule that would benefit my family." Influenced by her mother and her grandmother, Wilma Kilgore, both dedicated Sunday school teachers, Harwood found her calling in teaching. She pursued her education at Mid-America Nazarene University and later at Lincoln University, where she completed her bachelor's degree in education with a major in mathematics in three years.

began at Helias High School, where she taught for three years before joining Eldon High School in the fall of 1994. Over the next 16 years, she taught various levels of mathematics, touching countless lives with her passion for teaching and her belief that every student could grasp mathematical concepts with the right instruction.

In 2007, Harwood transitioned to the role of Instructional Specialist, working with Debbie Lacy-Anderson on curriculum and teacher training. Two years later, she became the assistant principal at Eldon High School, working alongside Principal Ryan Neal. Harwood played a pivotal role in the school's partnership with High Schools That Work, embracing the mission to graduate every student prepared for post-secondary education or a career.

In 2012, Harwood was named Assistant Principal of the Year for the State of Missouri and subsequently became the principal of Eldon High School. Under her leadership, the school rose from ranking in the 400's to 24th in the state, achieving numerous academic milestones and fostering a supportive, positive environment for students and staff alike.

Harwood credits her faith and the support of her team for her achievements. "God put me in this position to stand for every student, teacher, and parent. On my own, I would never have lasted. With God, all things are possible, and the blessings are never-ending."

Kris's deep connection to Eldon extends beyond the school walls. She cherishes the supportive and friendly community, which she describes as essential to her and her family. Her favorite memories as principal range from academic achievements to personal moments of impact with students and their families.

Kris is also a devoted to her own family. Her daughter Kara Dinwiddie, a State Trooper with the Missouri State Highway Patrol, and her other daughter Kendra Allee, a sixth-grade social studies teacher, reflect the values of service and education that Kris holds dear.

As she steps into retirement, Harwood plans to

indulge in her love for camping, hiking, kayaking, and biking across the United States. She looks forward to spending more time with her grandchildren, Kinsley and Truitt, and catching up on family moments she missed due to her professional commitments.

As Harwood reflects on her legacy, she emphasizes the importance of her team. "Mr. Davis always asks us what our legacy is. It finally dawned on me that my legacy is my teachers and administration team. I thank God for every opportunity to demonstrate His love and ask for forgiveness for the times I

failed. My ongoing prayer will be for the people and legacy I leave behind. I have every confidence in them because our students are worth our very best effort every single day. Go Mustangs!"

Brian and Christy Kidwell's story is a testament to their enduring commitment to family, community, and service. Hailing from the outskirts of Eldon, Missouri, their journey is deeply rooted in the values and spirit of their hometown.

Brian Kidwell: From Farm Life to Chief of Police

Born in 1975 to Garland Dennis and Cynthia Kidwell, Brian was raised on a family farm in Barnett, Missouri, alongside his grandfather and uncles. The farm, which raised turkeys, cattle, and swine, instilled in him a strong work ethic. "We didn't do a lot outside of working on the farm and attending church," Brian recalls. Except for a brief period in Utah due to his father's job with Gibson Discount Center, Brian has spent most of his life in Eldon. At the age of nine, his family returned to Missouri, and he later became an older brother to Caitlin when he was 14.

In 1998, Brian married Christy. They have three children: Trenton, Taylor, and Tiffani who all graduated from EHS. In 2023, they experienced the joy of becoming grand-parents for the first time. Brian began his career in law enforcement in September 1999, balancing full-time work with academy training. By 2001, he became a peace officer. His tenure with the Miller County Sheriff's Department saw him take on arious roles, from road deputy to detective. In 2008, he joined the City of Eldon Police Department as a detective, later rising to the rank of police captain. In 2018, Brian was elected Chief of Police, a role

that allows him to lead by example and make a significant impact on his community. "This position allows me to make a difference and help people while continuing o work cases as needed," he shares. Despite the challenges, he finds his work immensely fulfilling.

Brian fondly remembers his time at Eldon High School, where he built lasting r elationships with peers and coaches. "Coaches Marriott, Kline, Herriman, and Campbell were always willing to talk and assist us whenever they could," he notes. Although he wasn't a standout athlete, the bonds he formed have endured, and he still refers to his former coaches as "Coach."

What Brian loves most about working in Eldon is the people. "As a law enforcement officer, you deal with 10 percent of the population 90 percent of the time," he explains. "Despite the negative sentiments towards law enforcement in many places, every single day someone from town sees me and the officers and simply thanks us for the jobs we do. The hate has not reached Eldon, and I am thankful for the values of this community and my small place in it."

Outside of work, Brian cherishes time with his family. They enjoy swimming, laughing, and playing games on game nights. Golf has become a favorite hobby for Brian, something he never imagined he would enjoy. He also loves deer hunting, an activity he recently began sharing with Christy. Looking to the future, Brian envisions a peaceful retirement on a piece of land where he can run a few head of cattle, fish in a pond, and hunt.

Christy Kidwell: Supporting Students and the Community

Christy's journey is equally inspiring. Nearly a decade ago, she applied for the position of Middle School Secretary to be more involved in her children's lives. "Walking into the position, I did not expect to be welcomed the way I was," she recalls. The support and dedication she witnessed during her first year made her feel part of a family rather than a workplace. After eight years as a

secretary, Christy took on the role of Community Health Worker (CHW), driven by a desire to extend the same support to others. As a CHW, Christy is a vital resource for students and the community. She works closely with each school to ensure that students in need receive the necessary support, whether it's dental, vision, or medical assistance. "Sometimes it is a struggle for guardians to take off work to make these appointments," she explains. She also collaborates with school administrators and families of chronically absent students to identify and address underlying issues, such as transportation or poor sleeping habits. Additionally, Christy supports the community through initiatives like the Mustang Packs, providing

essential resources to those in need.

The Eldon School District and the surrounding community have a strong family atmosphere, something Christy deeply values. "The Eldon School District as a whole gives off this strong family feeling, as well as the community around it. There is support from someone around every corner for the students, but also employees and community members," she notes.

Brian and Christy Kidwell embody the spirit of dedication and service that defines Eldon. Their contributions to law enforcement, education, and community support reflect their deep-rooted commitment to making a difference. As they continue to serve and inspire, their story remains a shining example of the values and spirit that make Eldon a special place to call home.

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

Gracie Blankenship Norman's path from the small town of High Point, Missouri to a successful career in law is a testament to her dedication, hard work, and the strong values instilled in her from an early age. Growing up on a cattle farm with her two sisters and brother, Gracie learned the importance of diligence and community. This foundation has carried her through her academic and professional journey, making her a proud representative of Eldon High School alumni.

Gracie attended Eldon High School, graduating in 2017. Her high school years were marked by a diverse

array of activities that showcased her multifaceted talents and interests. In the fall, she could be found on the softball field, while the spring saw her active in the FFA building. Even years after graduating, Mrs. O'Donnell's influence remained, as she wrote a letter of recommendation for Gracie's admission to the Kansas Bar.

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


